SOURIS HOSPITAL
Souris Hospital was chosen as "Hospital of the Month" for December by the Maritime Hospital Association. The idea of a hospital at Souris to service the Eastern portion of King's County first took root at a meeting of the Eastern King's Board of Trade. The building, financed by public subscription, was erected and equipped at a cost of \$75,000 and opened its doors to the public on December 1st, 1948. The fact that the present debt is only \$4,000 is indicative of the measure of support given to the project by the people living in the area serviced by it.

With a maximum capacity of 25 beds, equipped with operating room, case room, X-Ray and lab facilities, the hospital is filling a long needed want. In 1951 one hundred and fifty-two Blue Cross patients were treated here for a total of 1100 days.
