Speaker Supports New UC Curriculum

Taking to task the critics of the new curriculum of the United Church, Dr. George Johnston, principal of United Theological College in Montreal, said "Some people fear the intellectual. They want religion to be strong on emotion and weak on study, to be activist and practical in the present but not to be at all traditional and historical."

Dr. Johnston, speaking to a group of some one hundred laymen and ministers at Stanhope yesterday reminded his hearers that in the matter of faith, cultivated minds are essential to growth and happiness, and stated "Behind the attacks on the new curriculum are such fears." Dr. Johnston was one of a team of ministers and laymen who contributed to the preparation of the new Christian Education program of the church which involves instruction for all age groups.

Using the subject, "Man The Thinker," the Montreal theologian said, "to be social involves the love of tradition; but to be venturesome requires that man should ever pursue fuller understanding and greater skill."

"If we are wise we will lift our eyes beyond the field where father worked, beyond the market, village or town, beyond the political unit in which we have citizenship; for knowledge is never parochial and wisdom has issued from India as well as Greece; from Israel as well as China and from Europe as well as Africa. Every man worth his salt, then, should be both patriotic and cosmopolitan."

This is the 10th Stanhope Conference for men of the United Church. This year's chairman is Dr. A. E. Ings from Montague. Today Roger Flumerfelt, a Montreal insurance man, will address the group. He will be followed by Allison MacKinnon, eastern field secretary of the board of men.

In the afternoon a panel discussion involving the role of the minister and the role of the laity will take place. Two ministers and two laymen will sit on the panel.

In the evening fraternal greetings will be exchanged between the Baptists and United Church groups. The Baptist men are meeting at Dalry. A special attraction of the conference will be the singing of the Capital City Four, formerly of Montrose, P.E.I.

Illegal Lobsters Net Stiff Fine

James George Neill, Wood Islands, was fined \$100 and costs for possession of 46 lobsters at a place where lobsters were out of season. He appeared in the Queen's County Magistrate's Court yesterday.

Mr. Neill pleaded guilty and Warren Farrar of the department of fisheries asked Magistrate James B. Johnston to impose a stiff fine and confiscate the car the lobsters were found in.

David Livingston Morrison of Flat River also pleaded guilty to the possession of lobsters in a place where lobsters are out of season. He had three lobsters and was fined \$20 and costs.

Nelson Warren Robins of Charlottetown was fined \$20 and costs for driving without due care and attention. He was represented by Gordon Tweedy.

The Crown had two witnesses and Mr. Tweedy called the accused to the stand to testify on his own behalf.

Robert Allison Hennessey, James Barry Bradley and Lloyd Ernest Blaquiere, all of Charlottetown and all charged with robbery, had their cases adjourned to Sept. 13 to fix dates for their preliminary hearings. Earlier all elected trial by judge and jury.

James Urban Buell of Montague and John Alvin Buell of Summerside were both fined \$20

and costs for causing a disturbance near a public place.

James David Robins of Montague was charged with speeding and his case adjourned until Sept. 24 to fix date for trial.

John Charles Hyde of Cornwall had the two charges laid against him adjourned until Oct. 15. Hyde is charged with creating a disturbance and illegally making a turn on the highway.

Ralph Charles Ryder of Parkdale charged with assault was remanded until Sept. 15 with bail set at \$50.

Brudenell To Be Site For Fertilizer Plant

SUMMERSIDE — The general manager of Dynamid of Canada Ltd. bulk fertilizer plant at Kensington, Don Wood, receiving approval late yesterday morning from the company's head office for the construction of a similar plant in the Kings County district of Brudenell.

The plant will be situated on the six-acre Cyril Shaw property located directly across from the Brudenell park. Construction of the plant is expected to get underway within a short time.

The plant, which will be managed by Mr. Wood's brother, Blair, will offer the same services to the farmers as the Kensington one, including on the spot local service, free soil testing, crop consultations and bulk spreading.

Mr. Wood added "we want to maintain and expand these services to all farmers on the island and our new plant at Montague will make this possible."

A graduate of MacDonald College, he has had close association with agriculture and farmers for as long as he can remember, having been born and brought up on a farm at Marshfield.

Blair has also long been associated with farmers and himself farmed for a number of years.

Prior to joining the company last year as sales representative, Blair was foreman at Seabrook's frozen food plant at New Annan for four years. Only recently he purchased the Alden MacLaren farm at Brudenell.

additional loan will be authorized, if warranted.

Of the 547 applications received this year, at least 210 students asked for the maximum \$1,000 loan. Other loan requests vary from \$100 to \$900.

Mr. MacKenzie said he anticipates further applications for loans.

According to Mr. MacKenzie, the federal department of finance has been advised of this province's loan fund situation.

"It has been pointed out to Ottawa," he said, "that most students seeking loans in this province are sons and daughters

of farmers and fishermen whose incomes are not high and consequently most need the full amount of the available loan which is \$1,000.

Asked if he thought many have applied who really don't need a loan as their parents' incomes are high, Mr. MacKenzie said "the percentage is small. Since the Ottawa conference last fall on student loans, a form has been devised to bring out all the facts about the earnings of the student and the income of his parents.

"The parent's income is a factor in the granting of a loan which is based on student's need whether or not he is a resident of the province and whether or not he plans to attend a designated educational institution."

Mr. MacKenzie said some applicants who asked for loans early in the year were wondering why they did not receive them earlier. "It was necessary," he said, "to wait until this year's high school graduates who wrote Atlantic Province Examining Board examinations got their marks back in late August to see whether or not any of them would apply for a loan. If we didn't wait for the Aug. 31 deadline, we might have exhausted our allocation on students who got out of university last May and there would be nothing left for those entering university for the first time this fall."

While this province receives a loan fund allocation of \$248,000 this year, the allocations of other Atlantic Provinces are: Nova Scotia, \$1,722,000; New Brunswick, \$1,520,000; and Newfoundland, \$1,243,000.
