To Be Noted Down.

At the last-banquet in honor of Sir John  
McDonald, the Finance Minister made the  
following statement respecting his latest  
loan:

"I had scarcely landed in England before I saw heralded through the press, statements to the effect that the Finance Minister and Ministers of the Government, were going over to float a loan, that the revenues for April, May and June were something like a million dollars less than they were for the same quarter of previous years, and the Finance Minister had stated in Parliament that he expected to receive two millions more than the actual receipts furnished. There appeared, in addition, an article with the same intent, in the Manchester Examiner, written, as the editor stated, by a leading member of the Opposition in the Dominion. I have no doubt the writer of that article was either Mr. McKenzie or Sir Richard Cartwright. (Shame.) There were some statements in it which were taken up and refuted by a gentleman from Montreal, whose name I don't know, but whom I desire to thank for so clearly demonstrating the fallacy of these statements.

"What was the result of the attempts to deery our credit? Having now received all the deposits for that loan, I am prepared to state that the loan of three million pounds sterling yielded \$550,000 more than the loan of similar amount floated by Sir Richard Cartwright in 1877, and \$770,000 more than he accepted for his loan in 1874."

ONE OF BISMARCK'S LOVE AFFAIRS.—Previous to his marriage with Baroness Puttkammer, Prince Bismarck, on whom his father-in-law was rather loth to bestow his daughter's hand, as he had become acquainted with his future son-in-law's reckless pranks, was known for his wild life, which gained for him the subriquet "eccentric Bismarck." Many stories were afloat of his love affairs, some of which did great honor to him, showing as they did his chivalrous regard for pure womanhood. One of these accounts was lately recalled to my mind by the news of the Chancellor having bestowed a handsome present on the daughter of a Tryolese peasant girl whose acquaintance he had made in his youthful rambles through the mountains. This country maiden, whose father, a bigoted Catholic, was a wealthy peasant, had so enchanted young Otto von Bismarck, then probably not dreaming of the greatness in store for him, that he seriously proposed for her hand, an offer which was categorically refused by the parent on account of his Protestant faith. He was sorely disappointed at the rebuff, but tore himself away from the object of his affection, who, a few years afterward, was against her wish forced to marry a strict Catholic. She settled at Salzburg, and died there, after giving birth to a daughter, in whose welfare the Chancellor took a warm interest. On hearing of his protegee's engagement and approaching wedding, Prince Bismarck sent her his best wishes accompanied by a valuable gift.—Berlin Correspondence of the London Globe.

**NEWS BY TELEGRAPH.**

CANADIAN.

HALIFAX, Dec. 1.

The Government Savings Bank deposits for November were \$94,009.52, an increase over November, 1878, of \$2,309.85.

Schooner Moselle, at Port Williams, is being loaded with potatoes for New York. The patrons of husbandry in King's County are loading several vessels with potatoes and apples for Great Britain and the United States.

The Dominion line S. S. "Quebec" arrived from Liverpool this afternoon. She brought 100 emigrants and 264 tons of freight for Halifax, 135 tons of Government stores and 150 tons through freight.

The St. Andrew's dinner held at the Halifax Hotel to-night was a great success. There was a large attendance of members and guests.

Mr. D. B. McKenzie addressed a mass temperance meeting to-night, and was presented with an address.

OTTAWA, Dec. 1.

Mr. Robertson, of Porthshire, Scotland, has arrived in the city. The object of his visit to this country is to secure homes for a number of Scotch small farmers who desire to better their condition. He proposes the setting aside of a certain tract in Manitoba to be known as New Scotland. He has submitted a scheme for the carrying out of this design to the Minister of Agriculture.

There is a marked improvement in the condition of Mr. W. A. Himsworth, who has been so dangerously ill.

The St. Andrew's Society have forever made themselves popular with the ladies of this city by the gallant determination they arrived at some time ago to dispense on this occasion with the annual dinner and have a grand ball instead, and a successful gathering of stalwart Scots and fair ladies. Advantage was taken of the decorated Rink Music Hall of banquet fame a few nights ago to use it again for this purpose, and it served most admirably with a few additions in the shape of flooring and other small items.

LATER.

The ball of St. Andrew's Society to-night eclipses anything in the previous history of the society here. The rink is decorated most appropriately, even surpassing the decorations of the recent banquet. The presence of Lord Lorne and suit adds materially to the success.

UNITED STATES.

PHILADELPHIA, Dec. 1.

Fire started in the cellar of Collins' paper-manufacturing, Decatur street, thence communicated with Magargie's paper and rag warehouse, and soon enveloped the latter. The flames shortly reached Magargie's store, Sixth street. The walls of Decatur Street Place are falling rapidly. No estimate of loss.

NEW YORK, Dec. 1.

The U. S. debt statement submitted to Congress yesterday, shows a decrease since Nov. 1st, of \$79,799,823.

Gen. Jeff. C. Davis died at the Palmer House, Chicago, on Sunday afternoon, of pneumonia, aged 53 years.

Col. J. G. Tucker, of Texas now at Washington, reports that the removal of troops from Santa Maria has exposed that section of the country to renewed depredations from marauders from the other side of the Rio Grande. Tucker is urging upon the war Department the necessity of an immediate re-occupation before the residents of that vicinity are compelled to move away.

A special to the Denver Tribune says the White River Utes came into Los Pinos on Saturday and went before the commission. A new plan of examining witnesses has been adopted, and a number are allowed to enter the commission room at once. They all wear arms, though concealed. The members of the commission and their attaches all keep guns and revolvers near that they may be used on quick notice. Great distrust prevails on both sides.

The Board of Trustees of the Brooklyn Tabernacle Church have instructed pastor Talnage to initiate measures to separate the Church from the Presbyterian denomination on account of what they allege to be the wanton and persisted pursuit and persecution of the pastor by wicked, malignant and malicious men, under the garb and pretext of ecclesiasticalism.

U. S. Secretary Schurz received the following telegram from General Hatch yesterday:—Los Pinos, Nov. 29th: "The advance of the White River Utes are coming in. Word is sent us that there seems to be more in the Mormon influence than was at first supposed."

A sensation was created in New York by a rumor that there was every reason to believe that Clarkson N. Potter will receive certificate of election to office of Lieut. Governor. Haskins' apparent majority has dwindled below 100, and as the board of State canvassers is Democratic, any technical quibbles are likely to be decided in favor of Potter.

EUROPEAN.

LONDON, Dec. 1.

Gortschakoff, after having an interview with the German Emperor, proceeded on to Russia.

Rev. Alexander Mackonochie conducted services at St. Alban's Church, Holborn, on Sunday. No steps were taken against him for contempt of Lord Penzance's order.

The publication of the St. Petersburg "Golos" is suspended for five months.
