United Service Veterans.

OTTAWA, Aug. 20.—There is a movement on foot here to enroll the reserve forces of the militia of Canada in a regiment to be known as the United Service Veterans of Canada.

CHICAGO, Aug. 20.—An unknown tramp was lynched by a crowd of farmers yesterday near Mannheim village, west of here, for assaulting a woman.

LATEST NEWS BY WIRE AND MAIL.

CONSTANTINOPLE, Aug. 18.—The Turkish Government has issued a denial of the alleged understanding said to exist between the Porte and the Ameer of Afghanistan, to foment an insurrection in India by preaching through the fanatic priests a holy war, or Jihad, against British rule in India.

SEATTLE, Aug. 18.—The steamer Alki arrived this morning from Alaska. This afternoon Willis Thorp was handed a letter by a man who came down on the Alki from Dyea. It was written by Edward Thorp, and came overland, saying that he had cleaned up \$130,000 in the Klondike in eight weeks and was coming home on the steamer Portland, which is due in Seattle on August 26. Thorp left Seattle one year ago, having gone north with a drove of cattle.

LONDON, Aug. 18.—The British admiralty has ordered the trial by court martial of two of the prisoners on board the British battleship Royal Sovereign, which was about to sail for three years' service with the Mediterranean squadron, so that the whole trouble on board that ship growing out of complaint by seamen, may be sifted.

LONDON, Aug. 18.—Chief Inspector Melville, of the Scotland Yard police, has gone to Dover in order to arrange for establishing the closest watch upon all arrivals in British sea ports. A large staff of London detectives acquainted with foreign anarchists will be engaged in this work. It is rumored that the British authorities apprehend an active continental anarchist plot, with England as the basis of operation.

Sherbrooke, Que., proposes to purchase the waterworks from the Sherbrooke Gas and Water Company. Their value will be submitted to arbitration.

WASHINGTON, Aug. 18.—Ex-Secretary Carlisle today submitted to Attorney General McKenna a brief containing his views on section 22 of the new tariff act relative to the imposition of the ten per cent duty imposed on goods from foreign countries through contiguous territory. Mr Carlisle contends that there are only three possible constructions of the law. According to the first of these constructions it was designed to encourage American shipping interests by discriminating against goods produced in non-contiguous country by vessels not of the United States and thence imported into the United States. A very very considerable portion of the brief is devoted to a discussion of this proposition. It is shown that the section: it passed both houses of congress, related only to goods carried in certain classes of vessels, the conference committee had no right to change its character and did not intend to do so; that it was not understood in either the house or senate when the conference report was under consideration that the purposal of the original section had been changed, and he quotes from the statements of Senator Allison and Mr. Dingley, who had charge of the reports, to show that this was the case.
