

Cliff Chambers. Makes Baseball History With 3-0 No-Hit Win At Boston

Cliff Chambers, Pittsburgh's 29-year-old lefthander, made baseball history Sunday as he fashioned a 3-0 no-hit victory over Boston Braves in the second game of a National League double-header at Braves Field.

Chambers, hitherto an unremarkable pitcher, was wild in carrying out his masterpiece, walking eight batters. However, he received topnotch support in the field, especially from centrefielder George Metkovich.

Metkovich hauled down a 390-foot blast by pinch-hitter Walker Cooper in the ninth and followed by grabbing Luis Olmo's long fly for the final out.

The no-hitter was the first in the majors since Vern Bickford of the Braves performed the feat against Brooklyn in a night game last Aug. 11. The last time the Braves were victims of a no-hitter was on June 18, 1947, when Ewell Blackwell of the Red beat them, 6-0.

Chambers is the first member of the Pittsburgh National League club to pitch a no-hit, no-run game. Frank Allen of the Pittsburgh Federal League team turned the trick in 1915. Nick Maddox of the 1907 Pirates pitched a 2-1 no-hitter.

The Pirates scored in the first inning when Metkovich doubled and rode home on Gus Bell's single and added their remaining runs in the sixth and eighth innings.

Braves Win Opener

The Braves won the opener 6-0 behind the eight-hit pitching of Warren Spahn, who turned in his second straight shutout. Earl Torgeson homered in the first to start the Braves rolling.

St. Louis Cardinals blew a first-run lead but bounced back with six runs in the eighth inning to defeat Brooklyn Dodgers, 11-7 at Ebbets Field and draw a half game ahead of the runner-up Braves.

Jackie Robinson's first error of the season, on a potential double-play ball, figured prominently in the Cards' big eighth. Pee Wee Reese of the Dodgers socked a grand slam homer in the seventh to give the Braves a temporary 7-5 lead. Duke Snider also homered for Brooklyn and Solly Hemus banded one for the Cards.

The hard-hitting New York Yankees went to work with their bats with devastating effect as they racked up an 11-6 American League victory over Detroit Tigers, for their eighth straight triumph.

The league-leading Yankees, sparked by Mickey Mantle's three hits, rapped five Detroit pitchers for 12 hits in the game at Yankee Stadium. Pinch-hitter Johnny Hopp homered for the world champions.

The Yankees now have scored 63 runs and smacked 65 hits in the last four games.

Brislie Figures In Games

Southpaw Lou Brislie figured in both games as Cleveland Indians and Washington Senators split an American League doubleheader. Brislie lost the opener which the Senators took 3-1 but saved the second game which went to Cleveland 4-2.

Eddie Yost's three-run homer in the first game of the twin bill at Cleveland helped pitcher Dulo Moreno to victory. Al Rosen hit a two-run homer in the second inning of the Tribe's nightcap success.

Brislie lasted until the sixth inning in the opener and was pounded for five runs. In the second game he took over in the ninth from rookie Bob Chakales. A right-hander making his first major league start, Chakales put the first two Senators on the base. Then Brislie retired the next three men in order.

Philadelphia Phillies and Chicago Cubs split a National League doubleheader at Philadelphia, the Phils outlasting the Cubs in the opener 5-4 and the Cubs rallying for two runs in the 10th inning to win the nightcap 9-7.

Robin Roberts was tagged with his second loss. Johnny Klippstein was the winner. Bubba Church posted his second win in the opener 5-4 and the Cubs rallying for two runs in the 10th inning to win the nightcap 9-7.

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Bill Berna, Cubs' third baseman, broke his wrist sliding into second base in the first inning of the opener and will be out of action at least five weeks.

Chicago White Sox swept an American League twin bill with Philadelphia Athletics, 4-1 and 8-3, before 14,756 chilled fans in Chicago. Ken Holcombe outduelled Carl Scheib in the opener while the wildness of Jimmy Dykes' hurlers virtually handed the nightcap to the Sox. Four A's pitchers dished out 15 passes, within three of tying the major league record.

St. Louis Browns dropped a 10-inning American League decision to Boston 5-4 but roared back with an 8-2 victory in the last end of a double header at St. Louis. The second game was interrupted 45 minutes by rain. Ted Williams homered with none on in the 10th to break up the first game. In the nightcap, catcher Sherm Lollar of the Browns slammed a three-run home run against Mel Parnell to put his team in front to stay.

Big Jim Konstanty, Philadelphia's reliable reliever, last year, went down to his third defeat Saturday at the Cards edged the Phils 4-3 in 11 innings. Gerry Staley was the winner.

Valleyfield Braves And St. Mike's In 4-all Tie

TORONTO, May 6 (CP)—The almost-forgotten men of amateur hockey played for 70 minutes Saturday night and got no closer to deciding the first winner of the Alexander Cup.

Valleyfield Braves and Toronto St. Michael's Monarchs played a 4-4 overtime tie in the third game of the finals for the trophy at stake this season for the first time.

Each team previously had scored a 4-1 win in the best-of-seven series for the championship in hockey's major division. They play here again Tuesday and then move to Montreal for the fifth game Thursday.

A crowd of 3,575 saw the teams put on a fast but close-checking contest. That was almost double the 1,900 who saw the Wednesday game in Toronto but far below the 14,000-plus capacity of Maple Leaf Gardens.

BRANDON, Man., May 5 (CP)—Barrie Flyers were hard pressed Saturday to defeat Winnipeg Monarchs 4-3 for their third straight victory in the best-of-seven Memorial Cup finals. Fourth game is at Winnipeg Monday night.

Chevrefils scored the winning goal at 11:31 in the third period. He had taken a double-play from linemates Jack White and Leo Labine just inside the blue line. The puck went between goalkeeper Don Collins' pads. Gerry James was in the penalty box at the time of the winning goal.

Labine, Bill Hagan and Don Emms were the other Barrie marksmen. Elliott Chorley, Monarch captain, was the big gun for the losers with two goals and an assist. Jim Zarie got the other.

Flyers held a 2-1 edge after the first period but the teams were all square at 3-3 going into the final frame.

In contrast to the first two games of the series in which Monarchs lost by identical 5-1 scores, Saturday's game was close all the way. Monarchs held a 3-2 lead at one stage in the second period—the first time they had held the upper hand in the playoffs.

Barrie again held a fair margin in shots on goal—33-27. Flyers drew eight of the 15 penalties, which included majors to Blair Mitchell and White for fighting in the third period.

Record Crowd Cheers As Count Turf Captures 77th Kentucky Derby

LOUISVILLE, May 6 (AP)—The greatest crowd ever to witness a Kentucky Derby—more than 100,000 fans—saw Count Turf, a field horse, win 77th running of the classic Saturday.

Never seriously considered in pre-race predictions, the bay son of Count Fleet, the 1943 Derby winner, took charge of things about a quarter-mile from home and was running away from his 16 rivals when he went under the wire.

Royal Mustang came up fast in the stretch to place second, four lengths back. Ruhe finished third and Phil D., another of the first horses which composed the mutual field, was fourth. None of the favored colts figured seriously in the big scramble.

Count Turf, owned by J. J. Amiel, a New York restaurant owner, paid \$31.20, \$14.00 and \$6.60.

Royal Mustang paid a whopping \$33.00 and \$24.80. Ruhe returned \$7.80 for show.

The victory was worth \$68,000 to Amiel, the biggest pay-off in the history of the three-year-old classic. Conn McCreary, who gave the winner a brilliant ride, also scored on Calumet Farm's Pensive in the 1944 Derby.

The triumph marked the first time that grandfather, father and son have won the race. Reich Count, the daddy of Count Fleet, won in 1926 from a record field of 22 runners.

McCreary said he never was in serious trouble, despite the traffic jam. He said he received a slight bump at the first turn, when he was running ninth or 10th, but that his horse really began turning it on after that.

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Fort Frances Takes Lead In Allan Cup Series

OWEN SOUND, Ont., May 6 (CP)—Fort Frances Canadians blasted in two overtime goals Saturday night to defeat Owen Sound Mercurys 6-4 and take a one-game lead in their Allan Cup finals.

Canadians now lead the best-of-seven series 3-2. The sixth game is slated for Owen Sound tomorrow night. If a seventh is necessary it will be played here Wednesday.

Canadians caught fire in the second period with three goals within a minute, and came up with a similar offensive midway through the first overtime session.

It was big Alex Kureba and Bobby Fero who gave Canadians the victory.

Kureba drove a screaming shot past Bobby Gilson in the Owen Sound nets at 6:25 of the extra period. He grabbed a loose puck at his own blue line, skimmed past two Owen Sound defencemen and beat Gilson easily.

Fero tallied the insurance marker at 8:18, on a three-way play with Kilmer and Fedork.

The overtime period came after Mercurys staged a third-period drive that netted two goals and tied the game at 4-4.

Ke Elzensoff, Doc Johnson, Ed Kilmer and Johnny Irvine were the other scorers for Canadians. Bob Markle, Jack Invaldsb., Johnny MacDonald and Tommy Burlington were the Owen Sound marksmen.

Referees Dan Cox and Bill McKenzie ruled with an iron hand and handed out 10 penalties. Six of them went to Canadians, and included a major and match misconduct to Willie Tominato in the third period.

Tominato clipped Harry Kazarian across the forehead to get the major. He was ordered from the game for arguing too strenuously over the penalty.

Mercurys moved into a 2-0 lead in the first period, were overcome 3-0 in the second and then outscored Canadians 2-1 in the third.
