MOSCOW (AP)—The Russians announced Monday night they used improved new sources of power to fire aloft Sputnik II, the half-ton satellite-rocketing a dog through the empty miles of space. At the same time there appeared to be differences over the life expectancy of the dog, a fluffy little female named Laika (pronounced 'Lay-ka').

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Commons Gives Bill Final Reading At Night Session

OTTAWA (CP)—The Commons Monday night gave final reading to the government's bill to raise federal old age pensions to \$53 a month from the present \$48. The measure now goes to the Senate.

Passage was in the last minutes of the night session, which saw the members complete detailed study of the bill, to benefit some 810,000 Canadians 70 and over.

Health Minister Montei indicated during the debate that the government would give old age pensions a further boost if living costs continued to climb.

"If the cost of living continues to spiral, continued adjustments will be necessary," he said in the Commons. "There is nothing firm or sacred about the amount of \$55 now proposed."

Mr. Montei spoke during the debate, but said he would not vote for the bill.

He said he hopes it will not come out of scheduled defence spending because a sabbatical year would view with disquiet any advance in social security at the expense of national defence.

NO REPLY

There was no immediate reply to Mr. Montei's statement. He said earlier that the present increase and raising of requirements will boost old age pension payments by \$8,000,000 in a full year.

Other measures before the Commons provide for a similar increase in the cost of living.

QUOTES DEFICIT FIGURES

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Eight Provinces Blast Freight Rate Increases

OTTAWA (CP)—Eight provincial governments Monday asked the federal government to review freight rates. They said that the rates are too high and are causing hardship for the provinces.

The railroads originally asked for a 15 per cent increase in 1954.

With the remaining four per cent still in abeyance, the railway companies recently asked that this be increased to 10 per cent which the board now is dealing with.

DISAGREES WITH DECISION

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Russia Withdraws From Disarmament Commission

UNITED NATIONS, N.Y. (CP) Russia today withdrew from the United Nations political committee's disarmament debate late Monday that surprised in some ways the significance of her withdrawal. Soviet delegate Vasily Kuznetsov said without warning announced that his delegation will not participate further in the work of the UN's five-power disarmament subcommittee. The withdrawal was the main working group of the UN on this question—the 12-member disarmament commission which operated under the assembly itself.

Expect Sweeping Reappraisal Of Canadian Defence Policy

OTTAWA (CP)—Russian launching of earth satellites will bring on a sweeping reappraisal of Canadian defence policy officials said Monday. A policy review began soon after the Progressive Conservative government took office in June but it will be intensified in light of the appearance of Soviet man-made moons in the sky. Prime Minister Diefenbaker said Monday in an interview that launching of the second satellite should act as a new spur for Western pooling of scientific information.

Weapons Obsolete

And Defence Minister Peakes told a service club luncheon that what has to be done to counter the dangers of modern attack will involve enormous expenditures. It is no good in trying to fight with weapons which the potential enemy itself has declared and proved to be obsolete. Mr. Peakes also said equipment in the second satellite will provide the Russians with information which will enable them to develop further their means of attacking with intercontinental ballistic missiles or supersonic aircraft.

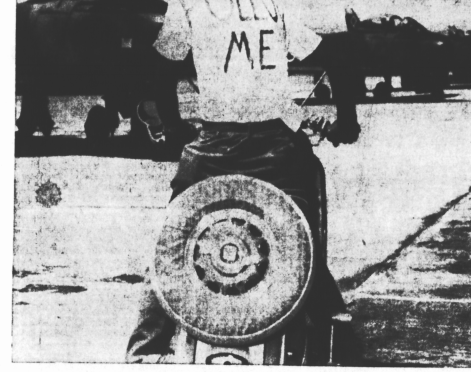
