WASHINGTON, (AP)—President Eisenhower declared Thursday his Formosa policy is purely defensive—and he reserved to himself alone any decision to strike the Chinese mainland in safeguarding the island stronghold of Chiang Kai-shek.

"In this grave juncture of world affairs," the fight-if-we-must resolution, George declared, must not be robbed of its psychological impact by long delays or "trifling amendments."

Planning Atomic Plant For N. S. Power Generation

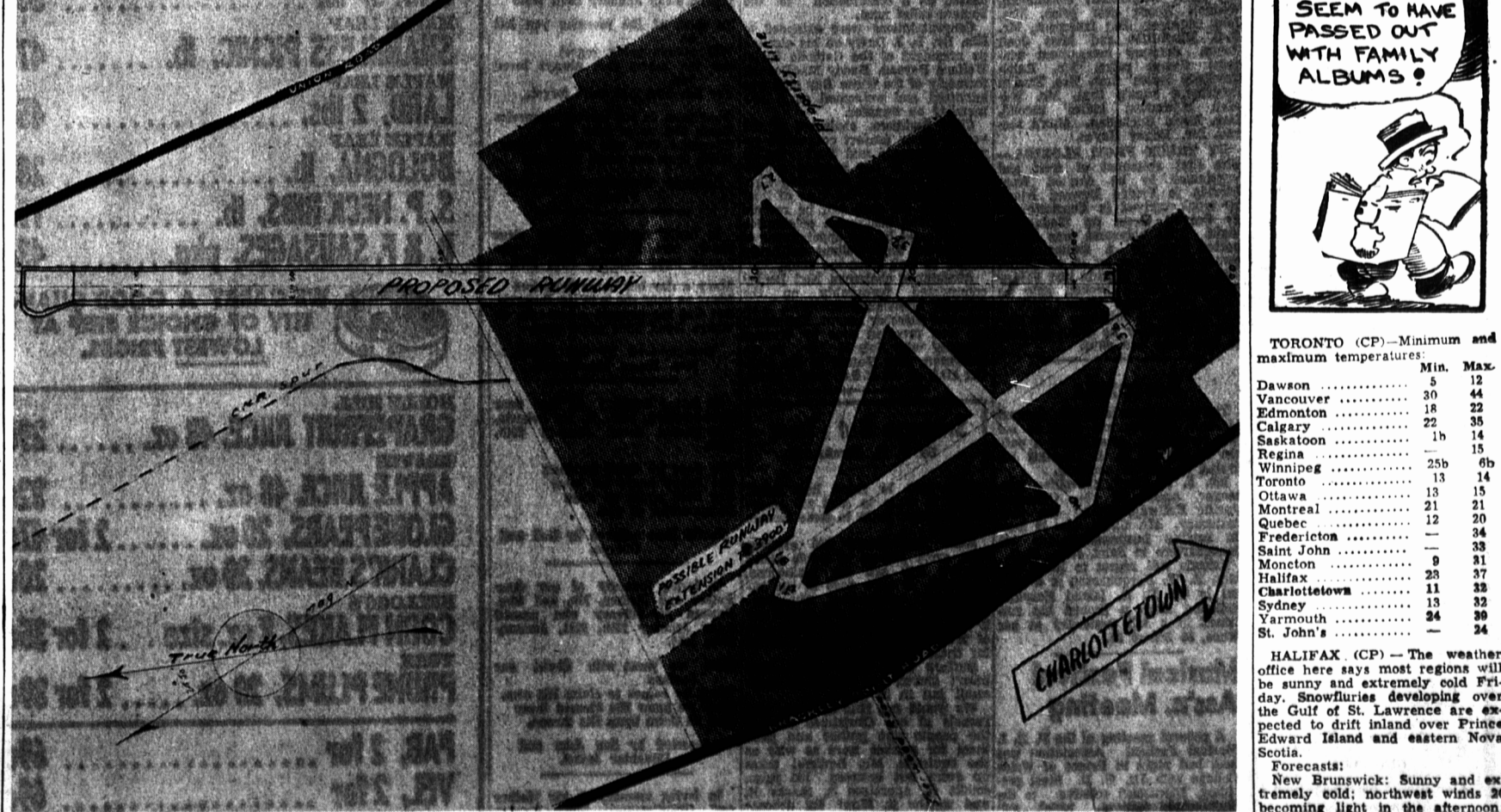
HALIFAX, (CP)—The Nova Scotia Light and Power Company said today it is studying the possibility of building the continent's first atomic plant for the generation of electric power.

Board Of Trade Presents New Airport Runway Proposal

A concrete proposal, illustrated in the above plan, has been prepared by the Charlottetown Board of Trade regarding extensions to the Charlottetown Airport runways and submitted in the form of a brief to the Minister of Transport, Hon. George Marler, at Ottawa.

(c) The City of Charlottetown has agreed to purchase the additional land required.

The letter states: "With regard to your proposal to extend the 18/38 runway, we wish to advise that this runway points to a much travelled highway, the Brackley Point Road and does not lend itself to further extension beyond the 3,900 feet due to the considerable residential property in the immediate vicinity. While such an extension of runway 18/38 to 3,900 feet is surely desirable, yet this Board, following consultation with our civic authorities, most strongly recommend that the proposed runway be given precedence."
