RASPBERRY PIE.—A raspberry pie that can be eaten cold and is without the harmful element of pie—the pastry—is made as follows: Butter a deep dish and line it at bottom and sides with thin slices of stale bread from which the crusts have been removed. Put a pound of raspberries and less than half that quantity of red currants, (for these may be omitted, adding, instead, to the quantity of raspberries), with a little sugar, in a small stewpan, and boil them up once or twice. Then remove the fruit from the syrup and heap it in the centre of the dish, cover with thin slices of bread and saturate the whole well with the boiling syrup. Place a plate with a weight on it on the pudding and leave for some time on the ice; then turn it out, sprinkle with powdered sugar, and serve with whipped cream.

The Moncton Tragedy.

MONCTON, Aug. 6. No new new developments have been made in the Steadman murder case. Jim is still at large. A mysterious woman who arrived in Moncton was identified as the wife of a well-known thimble and pea fakir, and she was allowed to proceed to Bangor yesterday. At the trial yesterday an important witness examined was Frederick C. Baker, formerly of Fredericton. He testified that he saw the scuffle between the prisoner and Steadman.

Conscience Money.

MONTREAL, Aug. 6. City Treasurer Robb has received a draft from a Baltimore man for \$950, and that institution refuses to disclose the name of the drawer. The officials here believe the same to be conscience money.

Burglars Captured.

HALIFAX, Aug. 6. The two men who burglarized the Rev. D. M. Gordon's house during his absence in Charlottetown, were captured last night while disposing of the stolen property.

King's College.

HALIFAX, Aug. 6. Lothar Bohar has been appointed Professor of Modern Languages in King's College, Windsor.

OTTAWA, Aug. 6. The Premier has quite recovered from his indisposition.

General Telegraphic News.

WINNIPEG, Aug. 4.—A despatch from Calgary says the liberation of four Chinamen, who were pronounced cured by the doctors, from smallpox quarantine, caused a disturbance there last night. The mob, three hundred strong, raided every Chinese laundry in town, demolishing the buildings and razing the contents, maltreating the inmates who in many cases barely escaping with their lives. During the melee the police kept out of the way, and when the mounted police came the mob dispersed. The Chinamen have consulted lawyers and will make a claim on the town for damages.

HALIFAX, Aug. 4.—The Artillery had beautiful weather to-day, and progress was made in catching up to the time lost by yesterday's rain. The firing was by the Montreal batteries. In the 20-pounder competition No. 5 Battery made 49; No. 4 battery, 29; No. 6 battery, 12. In the 64-pounder competition No. 3 battery made 49; No. 5 battery, 38; No. 2 battery, 34; No. 4 battery, 19; No. 1 battery, 17; No. 6 battery, 12.

CHICAGO, Aug. 4.—An attempt was made last night to blow up the residence of Charles D. Irwin, a wealthy board of trade operator, by a woman. She evidently became frightened by passers-by and ran off, leaving a can containing ten pounds of giant powder behind her. This amount was sufficient to have blown the building to atoms. The woman was dressed in deep mourning.

LONDON, Aug. 2.—The privy council today unanimously dismissed on all points the appeal of Mr. Head and others, members of the Church Association, from the judgment of the Archbishop of the court in the case of the Bishop of Lincoln (Dr. King), and upheld that judgment, which declined to inflict any penalty or censure upon the bishop for alleged ritualistic practices.
