

France And West Germany Settle Dispute Over Saar

BONN (Reuters) — France and West Germany stand on the threshold of a new era of friendship with a centuries-old dispute—the industrial Saar territory—apparently settled.

West German Chancellor Konrad Adenauer and French Premier Guy Mollet Saturday night reached agreement to return the Saar to West Germany by Jan. 1, 1957. All the territory's economic ties to France will be cut by 1960.

Agreement on the Saar opens the way for realization of the 80-year-old chancellor's dream—a confederation of European states—which was also part of the discussions.

Adenauer said in a statement the time has come for European countries to co-ordinate their policies in order to preserve Europe's "weight and position in the world."

WELCOME INTEREST

Both leaders urged Britain to take an "active participation" in European integration and wel-

comed the "growing interest" which they said the British government and people have shown in the problem.

A joint communique pointed to development of atomic energy as one way in which European nations could seek to improve their position. The two leaders agreed to propose a survey of how much atomic energy could be produced by Euratom—the pending six-nation atomic energy pool.

They also agreed to examine the possibility of establishing a European armaments community, an arms pool to co-ordinate and standardize armament production in western Europe, which was authorized by the 1954 Paris agreements.

SETTLEMENT TERMS

Under the agreement, West Germany will gain almost 1,000,000 former citizens who voted 2 to 1 last October to dissolve the 10-year Franco-Saar economic union, which was awarded to France after the Second World War in lieu of war reparations from Germany.

In return, West Germany will

pay France an undisclosed lump sum as compensation for French francs issued in the Saar. The French are believed to have demanded a 500,000,000-mark (about \$120,000,000) settlement.

France will also be entitled to dig 20,000,000 tons of coal during the next five years in the Warndt mine field. After this period, France will retain the right to exploit a limited area of the Warndt, ensuring a yield of 40,000,000 tons for 20 years. In addition, West Germany will deliver 24,000,000 tons of coal to France during the 20-year period.

One of the thorniest problems in the negotiations—conversion of the French franc to the German mark in the Saar—was solved by setting an exchange rate of 83 francs to the mark, though the Germans considered the mark had a buying power of 100 francs.

Under the currency exchange, West Germany is expected to destroy 40,000,000 francs circulating in the Saar. Conversion of currencies will take place "by surprise" any time before the 1960 deadline, officials said.
