

Montague's First Music Festival Officially Opens

Mrs. Ethan Stewart, Kings County vice-president of the Music Festival Association, introduced Mayor Bruce H. Yeo, who welcomed the adjudicator, Mr. George Smale, officials, contestants and visitors to the official opening of the first Kings County Musical Festival held at Montague yesterday morning and afternoon.

Following Mayor Yeo's warm welcome, Mrs. Stewart introduced Mr. Smale, who throughout the day pleased the contestants and audience alike with his humorous comments and gentle criticisms. Mr. Smale was very high in his praise of the quality of the contestants, and reminded the audience that little children have little voices and should keep them light and airy.

The high mark of the festival, 87, was given Gwyn Phillips for his solo, "The Fiddler Of Dooney." Mr. Smale said that no explanation of the song was necessary, because the contestant had offered such an excellent interpretation.

Helen Shaw Burke and Florence MacDonald were both complimented on their excellent voices, clear wording and good tone. Joyce Dewar of New Perth also received the high mark of 87 for her excellent piano solo "Gavotte."

Judge J.S. DesRoches briefly addressed the audience, and as president of the Montague Home and School, expressed the deep interest of this organization in the Musical Festival.

Mrs. Stewart then extended the greetings of Mrs. Wood, secretary of the association, and Hon. Kier Clark, both of whom were unable to be present. She also thanked the president of the association, of the executive, committee members and those who made festival radio broadcasts, for their wonderful support and co-operation. She also expressed regret at not having the contestants from Souris taking part in the Kings County Festival. Their absence was due to road conditions.

Mrs. Stewart said that it was the hope of the committee, that there would be a greater number of entries from the rural areas of Kings County participating in the festival next year.
