

NEWS BY TELEGRAPH.

The Result at Moosepath. Messenger Boy Wins Second Money!

ST. JOHN, N. B., Oct. 9. In the three-minute class races, finished on Friday morning, Messenger Boy won second money, being defeated by Richmond Girl—a mare said to be able to trot in 2.24.

Messenger Boy won third money in the 2.45 class. He should have got second, but the judges were prejudiced against him.

AMHERST, N. S., Oct. 7.

James Andrews, farmer, of Fort Lawrence, was digging potatoes this afternoon, and seeing plover on the flats, near Musquash Creek, which was almost dry at low tide, went across to shoot. The tide came in before he was aware, and he was drowned in attempting to return. Inquest now going on in Court House at this place.

EUROPEAN.

NEW YORK, Oct. 7.

A Dublin despatch says Parnell has formed an alliance with the physical force party, and the Land League and Nationalists (or Fenians) must be considered friendly organizations, working side by side for a common object. The agitation is no longer merely a land movement. It is becoming more far reaching, and it will be difficult to conjecture the result. The Fenians hope for open rebellion; the Land Leaguers firmly expect to obtain home rule, and it will be idle to deny, if a general strike is made against rents, which becomes more and more possible every day, that the movement will be well nigh irresistible.

CONSTANTINOPLE, Oct. 7.

Five members of the Cabinet drew up the last note of the Porte. It was approved by the Sultan and finally revised by the Plenary Cabinet Council. The Sultan is still convinced that the European concert has a solid foundation; and that certain powers are anxiously seeking pretext for withdrawing from united action.

LONDON, Oct. 7.

Special despatches from Vienna, Rome, Berlin, Paris and St. Petersburg say the note is condemned as highly unfavorable.

LONDON, Oct. 7.

Reports from various parts of the kingdom show considerable damage by heavy rains and floods.

A new armor-clad corvette, 4,200 tons, for the Argentine navy, was launched yesterday.

A despatch from Badsick says: It is stated that Admiral Seymour, commander-in-chief of the united fleet in Turkish waters, has requested the admiral commanding the Russian squadron to hold himself in readiness for sailing orders.

ROME, Oct. 7.

The Pope nominated a coadjutor with the right to future succession to Archbishop McCloskey, of New York, in order to permit the latter to leave his diocese. The Pope is displeased with McCloskey for participating in the reception of Parnell, and that displeasure will be manifested if the Archbishop comes to Rome.

ATHENS, Oct. 7.

The Government has made dispositions to summon 20,000 men of the reserve.

VIENNA, Oct. 7.

All the inhabitants around Scutari, Albania, have been summoned to arms. The Montenegrin chief has arrived at Belgrade.

GREENOCK, Oct. 7.

A fire last night in the worsted mills here caused a damage of \$50,000. Nine hundred persons were thrown out of employment.

VIENNA, Oct. 7.

The British and Russian Cabinets have given their opinion of the Turkish note that it is altogether a unit to form the basis of further negotiations. While communicating this opinion, the British Cabinet has urged the immediate resumption of combined action on a larger scale, namely to make a naval demonstration nearer Constantinople without abandoning the demonstration at Dulcigno.

LONDON, Oct. 7.

Wm. Lassell, F. R. S., L. L. D., the eminent astronomer, is dead. Dr. Lassell was born at Bolton, in Lancashire, on June 18th, 1793, and was therefore in his 82nd year at his death. He had but a limited education when he had to go into business, his father dying when he was but seven years old, but when he had time he engaged in his favorite study of astronomy. He invented a number of improved telescopes and discovered several satellites. His last work in astronomical science was the construction of a larger equatorial telescope than had previously been made, the description of which and the work done with it constitute the 36th volume of the Astronomical Society's Memoir.

UNITED STATES.

NEW YORK, Oct. 7.

James Slinger and Geo. Forster were arrested on their arrival from England last night, for forgery in London.

BOSTON, Oct. 7.

An accident is reported on the Fitchburg Railroad (tunnell express) about nine o'clock this evening at or near Littleton, Mass. Few particulars are at hand, but it is said that Enos Varney, master car builder, and a Mr. Faulkner, a stone cutter, a resident of Ayer, are killed, and several others injured. The train left the track. The cause of the accident has not been ascertained.

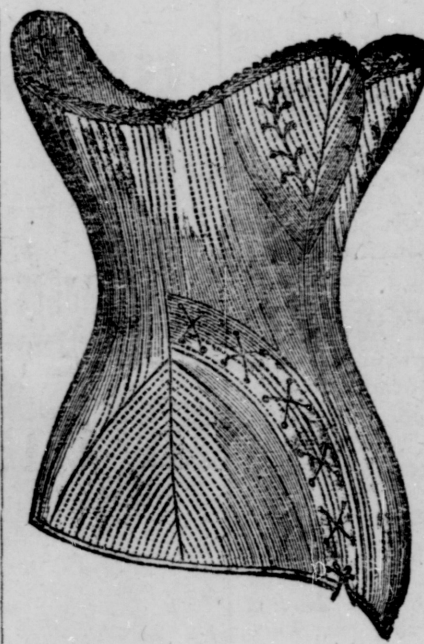
