It has been discovered that a considerable number of Chinamen were smuggled from British Columbia to the United States.

The City Marshal is inspecting houses where liquor is sold contrary to the Canada Temperance Act, with the object of reporting to Stipendiary Magistrate.

The Government of Britain have determined to send to Egypt a British Surgeon-General who has had much experience in the treatment of Cholera in India.

The Marquis of Landsdowne will sail from Liverpool on the steamer Circe, on October 11, for Canada, to assume the duties of the office of Governor of the Dominion.

On Wednesday next, the 18th inst., the Grand Division of P. E. Island will open at Victoria, Crapaud. A public temperance meeting will be held in the evening.

MR. GRAHAM, Dominion emigration agent, reports considerable demand just now for agricultural labor. He thinks Southern Manitoba the best field for this kind of work.

In the most abundant year the agricultural world ever saw, some crops were failures some where. There will be failures in some places this year, but the general prospect has brightened much of late.

At the Drill Shed to-morrow evening Mrs. James Brown, Miss Brown, Miss Fraser, Miss Maud Desbrisay, Miss Surrus, Messrs. Earle, Vinnicombe, Watson and others, will contribute to the musical part of the Festival.

The total vote cast last Tuesday in the Albert election was slightly smaller than the vote a year ago—the number being 1720 against 1749. Mr. Wallace received 68 votes more than last year, and Mr. Rogers 94 less. Mr. Wallace's majority is 146.

The defeat of the Gladstone Government on Tuesday night last on the cattle importing question was another indication of its wanting power. The defeat occurred in a house not full it is true, but still a house counting nearly four hundred of its members present.

AND STILL THEY COME.—Four thousand five hundred and sixteen immigrants made customs entries of effects at the Custom House, Winnipeg, during June. Since January 21, 804 immigrants indicated their intention in this way to remain in that part of the country.

LOUIS PASTEUR, the great French chemist, has offered to organize a mission with the object of investigating the nature and origin of the cholera in Egypt. M. Pasteur has applied to Lord Granville, British Foreign Secretary, to furnish him with facilities to carry out this plan.

DESERTED BY HER HUSBAND.—There passed through Moncton on the morning express train from Point duChene, yesterday, a woman with an infant and two other small children. She was in great distress, and told her fellow-passengers that she and her husband set out from Boston to go to Prince Edward Island to stop the summer. But her husband deserted her just as the boat was leaving the wharf and remained in Boston. How she came to continue the journey further than Portland, Maine, where the boat next stopped, is not explained. Hysterical bursts of weeping led some of the passengers to fear that the poor woman was becoming insane.—Moncton Transcript.

CRICKET MATCH.—A cricket match was played on the Victoria Park grounds Saturday afternoon, between Lawyers and Bankers against All-comers, which resulted in the defeat of the former. As this was the first match the Phoenix has had this summer, and preparatory in a measure to the contest with the Wanderers, considerable interest was manifested in it. For the Lawyers and Bankers J. A. Longworth and R. F. Weeks did some admirable work at the bat. Mr. Longworth getting one clean hit for four. The fielding also was good, especially that of Loman Yeo. Mr. Yeo is a quick "point" and during the game succeeded in making a very difficult catch. The All-comers were rescued from defeat by the batting of T. A. LePage, who ran up 22 runs in a short time. T. Haythorne, Sydney Gray, and H. D. Johnson also batted well. The fielding all round was fairly good, as was also the batting, though the scores made were not very high. There seems to be a determination on the part of the cricketers to play steadily, and let the runs come as they will. This is the best and surest way. For the All-comers Geo. Ings, Geo. LePage, H. D. Johnson and T. A. LePage bowled, while L. H. Davies, V. Longworth and W. A. Weeks bowled for the Lawyers and Bankers. Messrs. R. R. Hodgson and Sergeant Allan acted as umpires with much efficiency.

TELEGRAPHIC NEWS.

Frightful Accident at O'Leary Station.

Struck by the Tignish Train—A Woman Killed.

O'LEARY STATION, July 16. As Number 1 train was to-day about to cross O'Leary Road, a man named John McDougall, of Lot 16, with his wife and granddaughter, in a wagon, attempted to cross the railroad ahead of the train. The team was struck by the engine, and the occupants of the wagon were thrown out. Mrs. McDougall died an hour afterwards from the injuries received. Her husband received severe injuries, but will likely recover. The little girl is unhurt. The Station Master at O'Leary—Mr. G. R. McMahon—telegraphed to Alberton for a Doctor, but he had not arrived up to the time of sending this message.

Communism in Paris.

PARIS, July 16. At a communistic meeting held here for the purpose of protesting against the sentence of Louise Michel, a serious riot occurred, in which a police commissary was fatally wounded. The military had to be called out before the mob could be dispersed.

Too Heavily Taxed.

LONDON, July 16. A despatch from Crete says that an outbreak in that island is threatened, owing to the enormous taxes which the people have to bear.

The Second Suez Canal.

LONDON, July 16. The shipowners of Birmingham and Newcastle have also protested against the second Suez Canal arrangement.

French Intervention.

LONDON, July 16. The French prevented passengers of the steamer "Taymouth Castle" from landing at Tamatave, Madagascar.

Another Outbreak of Cholera.

CAIRO, July 16. A serious outbreak of cholera has occurred at Ghizet only five miles from Cairo. Precautions are being taken to prevent an outbreak here.

Canadian Precautions.

OTTAWA, July 16. A proclamation will shortly be issued by the Canadian Government, which will necessitate vessels coming from the Mediterranean to be quarantined, in order to prevent the possibility of an outbreak of cholera in Canada.

Telegraph Notes.

Tonquin is in a state of anarchy.

Four men were killed, on the 12th, at Lamont, Ill., by the falling of a derrick at the Eureka mine.

The steamer "Margara," lost between New York and Havana, was valued at \$350,000. She was fully insured.

A despatch from Hong Kong says three thousand Chinese troops have been ordered from Canton to Yamachan, on the Tonquin frontier.

Mr. Van Wagner, an American lawyer, residing in London, has been appointed commissioner to hear evidence in Alabama claims cases.

Rioting broke out at Newry, Ireland, on the 13th. The police were powerless and mobs ran from street to street assaulting all persons supposed to be Orangemen.

There was a disastrous hail and wind storm, near Albany, N. Y.; a damaging flood at Harrisburg; and a violent storm, three miles wide, which destroyed all grain in its course through Nebraska.

During 24 hours ended at 8 o'clock on the 13th, there were 25 deaths from cholera at Damietta, 61 at Mansurah, 27 at Samanah, 4 at Shirbin and 3 at Malta. Spain has instituted a system of compulsory sanitary inspection of all vessels arriving at Spanish ports from England.

In the British House of Commons on the 13th, Mr. Childers, Chancellor of the Exchequer, in reply to Sir Stafford Northcote, said the Suez Canal agreement would be submitted to the House by a motion made in committee that the sum to be loaned to the Suez Canal Co. by the Government for building the new canal be chargeable to the consolidated fund. Sir Stafford Northcote gave notice that when such a motion was made he would ask the sense of the House on the agreement. This announcement was received by cheers. Wm Fowler, (Liberal) spoke in opposition to the canal agreement. DeLesseps has declared he is indifferent whether England accepted the canal agreement or not.

The French Consul at Zanzibar has telegraphed to the Government that he has no knowledge of the occurrences in Tamatave, Madagascar, complained of by the English Government, and has requested that a report be sent to him. Lord Edward Fitzmaurice, Under Secretary of Foreign Affairs, stated on the 13th that the Government had no present intention to increase the number of men-of-war in the waters of Madagascar. A hastily summoned Cabinet Council was held in Gladstone's room in the House of Commons on the 13th. The meeting is believed to have been called for the consideration of matters relative to affairs in Madagascar. On the 13th, a telegram dated July 6, via Zanzibar, from Admiral Pierre, reports he repulsed a night attack July 23rd, and another July 6th. The loss was heavy, but the French loss was only one killed. Admiral Pierre does not mention any trouble with the English Consul at Tamatave.

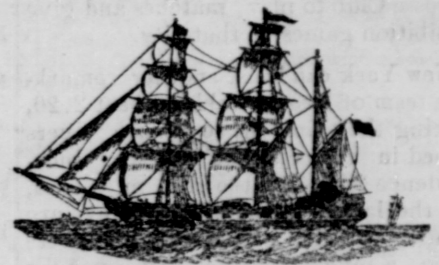
