ISLAND PRODUCE AT HALIFAX.—Six schooners arrived at Halifax on Tuesday from P. E. Island with produce. The combined cargoes embraced 10,672 bushels potatoes; 3,274 bushels oats; and 926 bushels turnips.

THE WEATHER.—The weather since the 5th Oct. has been remarkably fine for this season of the year, particularly so, as compared with last year. The temperature has been moderate, ranging from 62° the warmest, to 37° the coldest, with less wind than usual, and considerable sunshine. 2.50 inches of rain fell between the 24th and 25th of Oct., and .57 inches between the 28th and 29th, with a sprinkling on Monday night, the 30th Oct. Outside of those dates the weather has been dry, fair and mild.

THE BOSTON STEAMERS.—The Carroll left for Boston yesterday afternoon at four o'clock with a general cargo and the following passengers: M. Brennan, Tessie Howlett, Miss Weatherly, Mrs. E. Jane, Miss Wakefield, Miss Brothers, C. McKinnon, E. Nicholson, Miss Mullin, Kate McKinnon. It is understood that this will be the last trip of the Carroll this season.

IT IS ANNOUNCED from Boston that the Britannia has been sold to C. H. Flint & Co., for \$225,000, presumably for the Brazilian Government.

THE COURT OF CHANCERY.—At the Court of Chancery tomorrow morning at eleven o'clock, we learn that decisions upon some very interesting points will be delivered by the Master of the Rolls. In the late Judge Young's estate, all his property was given to the British and Foreign Bible Society, and the question to be decided is whether they can hold land, as we understand they are not incorporated. There is also another case of Gillis, a man who, residing on the western portion of the Island, who left a farm with instructions that it be sold and the proceeds paid for masses for the repose of his soul. He, we believe, the first time that the questions have come up for decision, and the matter involves intricate and difficult considerations. The decision is looked forward to by the profession with much interest.

ASSAULT CASE.—Yesterday afternoon William Alchorn, of Rocky Point, appeared before Judge Macdonald, Esq., J. P., and James Macdonald, J. P., charged first, with breaking and entering, and, second, with attempting to break and enter, the house of Mrs. Ann McKinnon. Mr. Alchorn admitted that he did try to obtain an entrance, but alleged as a reason that he feared the old lady was sick or possibly dead. The plaintiff on the other hand contended that his intention was to assault Mrs. McKinnon's grand-daughter, who was there at the time. As the evidence on this point was so conflicting, and as the whole affair seemed to be the result of a long-standing feud between the parties, the Magistrate dismissed the case. Arthur Mellich, Esq., for plaintiff; William Strickland, Esq., for defendant.

WHERE NONE WILL VOTE.—A late Plattsburg, N. Y., despatch says:—The fourth district of the town of Belmont, Franklin County, is perhaps the only district in the United States where there will be no election. The district is situated in the south part of the town. Its only inhabitants are contractors and wood choppers of the Chateaugay Ore and Iron Company. There were thirty-four votes there last year, but now the number is but fifteen. Among them all there are only two men who can write, and these do it but clumsily. They were elected inspectors last spring, and they now refuse to qualify. Because of this refusal, and also because seven men able to read and write are necessary for the board, it is impossible to hold any election in the district.

IN HIGHLAND COSTUME.

The Governor-General of Canada at Montreal on Monday night, the Earl of Aberdeen attended the Hallowe'en concert at the full Highland costume. His excellency wore a black velvet jacket, adorned with diamond shape silver buttons, a scarlet waistcoat, cut low, a kilt of the Gordon tartan, with a handsome silver-mounted sporran. He also wore a short claymore by his right side and a pair of leather as a loutonnaire which had been brought over from Lord Aberdeen's own estates in Scotland by the Calcedonian Society. When His Excellency sat down the large silver ceremonial knees were distinctly visible. This mark of courtesy on the part of the Governor-General was enthusiastically received by the immense Scottish audience who on the entrance of the viceregal party, headed by a half a dozen pipers playing "The Campbells are Coming," rose to their feet, and when the pipers ceased playing sang with all their might and main the "Save the Queen" hymn. An illuminated address was presented to the Governor-General and an immense basket of flowers draped with the Gordon tartan was duly accepted. His Excellency in reply made a humorous address and it was at his suggestion that Piper McKee played a lament on the bagpipes, and with slow measured tread the piper strode across the platform to the joyful strains of the dirge while the audience listened with bowed heads and allowed their thoughts to rest on the bereaved household of Sir John Abbott, the ex-premier, who lies dead at his residence.
