Prime Minister Has Most Spectacular Experience Of Trip

LAHORE, Pakistan, (CP)—Prime Minister St. Laurent visited tribesmen in the Khyber pass Saturday, received an honorary degree from Peshawar's new university and then spent the night here with the governor of Punjab.

The final day of the Canadian leader's visit to Pakistan was the most spectacular experience of the first three weeks of his round-the-world goodwill tour.
His party was driven 32 miles through the historic Khyber pass to Pakistan's frontier with Afghanistan where he was greeted by a party of tribal elders who hung flower wreaths around his neck and presented him with gifts of a revolver and a dagger in a brightly beaded sheath.

They also presented the Canadian Prime Minister with a traditional gift of a goat and three sheep which he acknowledged by patting. He didn't take them with him.
"I hope we can always live in friendship and be mutually helpful to each other," the prime minister said after receiving a friendly welcome from the rifle-carrying, turbaned Pakistani hillfolk.

Driving back to Peshawar from the frontier post, Prime Minister St. Laurent stopped at the officers' mess of the Khyber rifles regiment at Kandikital where he signed a visitors' book bearing such illustrious signatures as that of "Captain Winston Churchill."

During the afternoon, the Canadian visitor received an honorary degree of doctor of laws at a special convocation at Peshawar University.
Then he and his party flew to Lahore where they were met by Punjab's governor, Muhammad Aminuddin and provincial chief minister Sir Firoze Khan Noon.

Ungava Iron Ore Output May Be 20 Million Tons

MONTREAL, (CP)—More than 20,000,000 tons of iron ore may flow annually out of Ungava and Labrador once the St. Lawrence seaway is completed.
W. H. Durrell, general manager of New York Ore Company of Canada, said Saturday present plans call for production of 10,000,000 tons of ore annually from the company's vast deposits straddling the Quebec-Labrador boundary.

"We want to get production up to 10,000,000 tons as quickly as possible," he said in an interview. "But with the seaway we could handle 20,000,000 tons."
The ore will begin its movement by water to Canadian and United States steel mills from Sept. 15, a town on the north shore of the St. Lawrence river approximately 260 miles below Quebec.

A 360-mile railway, built at a cost of \$125,000,000 was completed last week between Sept. 15 and Knob Lake, in the heart of the rich iron ore Ungava district.
Start In August
Mr. Durrell said work now is going ahead on construction of marshalling yards.

Completion of the rail line has practically ended a 20-plane airlift that has been used to ferry supplies to Knob Lake and other points along the line.
Approximately 30 diesel locomotives and 1,200 ore cars now are ready for use on the line. The number will be increased to keep pace with increases in production.

The first shipment of ore is expected to leave Sept. 15 in August.
Mr. Durrell said originally no production was planned before 1955, but two years ago the company decided to speed up plans and try to get production started this year.

Fortune Cove Man Observes 90th Birthday Today

—Today, February 22nd, Mr. R. H. Lockerby of Fortune Cove is celebrating his ninetyeth birthday. A son of the late John and Mary (Hodgson) Lockerby, he was the oldest in a family of three sons and one daughter, and is the only surviving member. He was born at Cavendish but when a small child moved with his parents to Summerside. There, on March 9th, 1897, he was married to Mary Hillman, and there the first few years of their married life was spent.

More than sixty-two years ago they came to Fortune Cove and there established a home which was to become a centre of good influence and wide interests. They had a family of four children: Clara, now Mrs. Russell Leard of Fortune Cove; Pearl, who became the wife of Rev. R. R. Webb, but passed away at Waterford, N.B. in 1940; Erskine in Rochelle Park, New Jersey; and Cuyvel who lives on the homestead. There were ten grandchildren, three of whom lost their lives in the services during World War II, and thirteen great grandchildren. Mrs. Lockerby passed away in 1929.

Some forty years ago Mr. Lockerby was elected an Elder of Alberton Presbyterian Church. He has not been able to attend church for some years but his devotional life continues to be nourished at home through the reading of a sermon each Sunday and other religious literature.

Mr. Lockerby enjoys good general health, although walks with difficulty and is quite hard of hearing. His mind is very alert and he retains an interest in world affairs as in his younger days he does a large amount of reading. One hobby, in which he still indulges occasionally, is the writing of rhymes.

About fifty years ago Mr. Lockerby was responsible for the organization of the Evening Star Social Club in Fortune Cove. This club was very popular with a large number of young people and was of real value not only for its social function but even more for the very worthwhile programs presented and enjoyed by its members.

Mr. Lockerby always had a great interest in boats and was very fond of the water. When in his early seventies he invented and constructed a canvas canoe with pontoons on the sides to prevent its upsetting, and a small sail. Travelling alone, he made several trips to Malpeque in this canoe.

A note of interest in the family history is the fact that Mr. Lockerby's paternal grandfather, who came to this country from Scotland, had a life span which included parts of three centuries, his birth having taken place in 1790 and his death in 1901.
