### Rotarians Enjoy Annual Rural - Urban Gathering

A brief but comprehensive sketch of three major activities of the Experimental Farm by Department heads, followed the Rotary turkey dinner prepared and served at Birch Court at noon yesterday by the ladies of Parkdale Women's Institute with their traditional efficiency.

The meeting was presided over by Col. F.L. Andrew with Neil A. Matheson as co-chairman and arranged for by the Rural-Urban Committee of Rotary which included also Russ Seller, Ernie Reid, Reuel LePage and Malcolm Reeves. More than thirty representative agriculturists were present as guests.

Frank Tinney, chief of the poultry research department stressed the advances which have been made in the past few years through co-operation of the six stations throughout Canada and leadership given by the Central Experimental Farm at Ottawa. "Poultry rank third in the agricultural economy of this province where 15,000 birds have been banded yearly since 1951," Mr. Tinney said. An increase to 20,000 banded last year indicates the more recent activities of the department.

Mr. Tinney described feed tests, egg content etc. and concluding invited inspection of certain aspects of the work as set up in an adjoining tent.
