Jimmy Brown In Court Again

CLEVELAND, Ohio (AP) — Jim Brown pleaded not guilty Tuesday in a paternity suit scheduled for a preliminary hearing Jan. 18 after the end of the National Football League season.

The Cleveland Browns all-league fullback appeared in juvenile court to deny the charge filed Monday by 18-year-old Brenda Ayres. She claimed he is the father of a child she is expecting in February.

Brown posted \$500 cash bond for appearance at the hearing before Judge Walter G. Whitlatch of Cuyahoga county juvenile court.

He told a newsman that Miss Ayres' suit was "an outrageous falsehood" that "makes me wonder just what these people are trying to do to me."

Last July 23, following a two-week trial, a jury deliberated one hour and 20 minutes before acquitting Brown of an assault and battery charge brought by Miss Ayres.

She accused him of hitting her during a date in a motel room on the night of June 19.

Brown, married and father of three, is in his ninth season with the Cleveland club. He is one of professional football's highest paid players, earning upward of \$50,000 a year.

Bob Nevin's Stock Rises In Eyes Of N.Y. Rangers

It's probably no great secret Toronto Maple Leafs would jump at the chance to regain the services of rightwinger Bob Nevin if the right deal could be made with New York Rangers. And it's even conceivable the Ranger captain would consider playing in Toronto again.

CLASH IN NEW YORK
Rangers and Leafs clash in New York tonight in one of three mid-week National Hockey League games. Boston Bruins see action twice when they visit and Detroit Red Wings Thursday at Chicago Black Hawks tonight.

The Leafs weren't really anxious to part with Nevin, but they knew they had to give up something to get something. It was almost two years ago Toronto sent Nevin, Dick Duff, Rod Seiling, Arnie Brown and Bill Collins to New York in exchange for veterans Andy Bathgate and Don McKenny.

The Leafs' reasons for acquiring Bathgate and McKenny were simple. They needed scoring power to help win a third successive Stanley Cup.

GOT EARLY DIVIDEND
The deal paid off that year as both Bathgate and McKenny played major roles in the Cup win. But since then it was all downhill for the pair. Prior to this season Bathgate

and McKenny were traded to Detroit. It appears now the rebuilding Rangers got the better of the deal. While Duff was traded to Montreal Canadiens last year and Collins is buried deep in the minors, Nevin, Seiling and Brown are Ranger regulars.

The spotlight, however, is on Nevin. He currently ranks fifth in the NHL scoring race with 10 goals and seven assists and looms as a top candidate for all-star honors.

One of those most happy with the Nevin deal is general manager Emile Francis of New York.

"Name me a better two-way player today, checking and attacking, than Nevin. He has always been a very good defensive player, but he has the ability to be a big scorer, too."

GREAT ROOKIE YEAR
Nevin showed signs of a high-scoring forward in his rookie year with Toronto when he scored 21 goals and assisted on 37 others.

During the next two years, Nevin's goal production dropped to 15 and 12. When traded he had only seven goals to his credit.

At first Ranger fans were unhappy about the trade because Bathgate was a favorite. "At the time," recalls Francis, "we got an awful lot of criticism. . . . But we had our eye on Nevin right along. We would have taken him for Bathgate even up."

In his first full year with the Rangers, Nevin scored 16 goals and 14 assists. His quick start this year sug-

gests he might have the best season of his career and help Rangers, who have lost their last three games and are in fourth place, two points back of the Leafs.

Toronto coach Punch Imlach said Brit Selby, sidelined with a bruised ankle, may be ready to play tonight, in which case Brian Conacher will be returned to Rochester Americans of the American Hockey League.

Red Kelly, out with a groin injury, did not make the trip to New York.

Munich Announces 1972 Olympic Bid

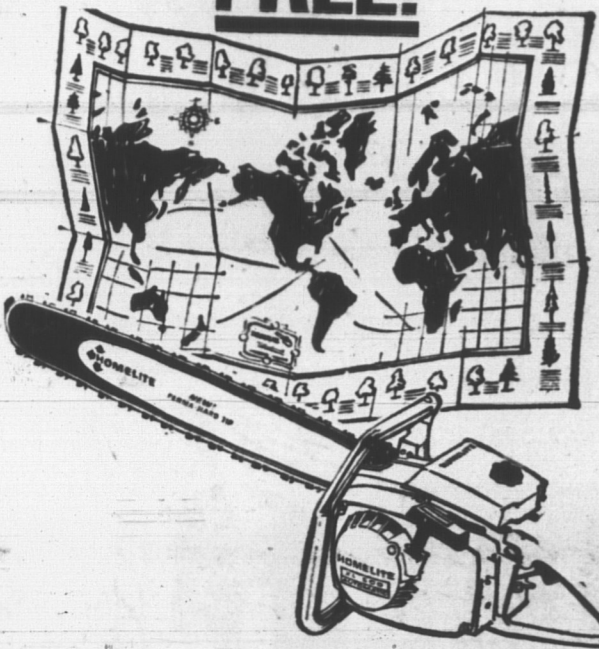
BONN (CP)—Munich has decided to seek the 1972 Olympic summer games, the first Olympic bid by a German city since the Second World War, Agence France - Presse reported here Monday.

The decision was announced by Mayor Jochen Vogel of Munich after a meeting in West Germany's capital with Chancellor Ludwig Erhard and Willi Daume, chairman of the West German Olympic committee. Erhard promised the full support, including financial support, of the West German government, Vogel said. The best-and-carnival metropolis also received a guarantee of full support from the state of Bavaria, whose premier, Alfons Goppel, accompanied the Munich delegation to Bonn.

Montreal is also a contender for the 1972 summer Olympics. The bid by Canada's largest city was announced earlier this month by Mayor Jean Drapeau and the Canadian Olympic com-

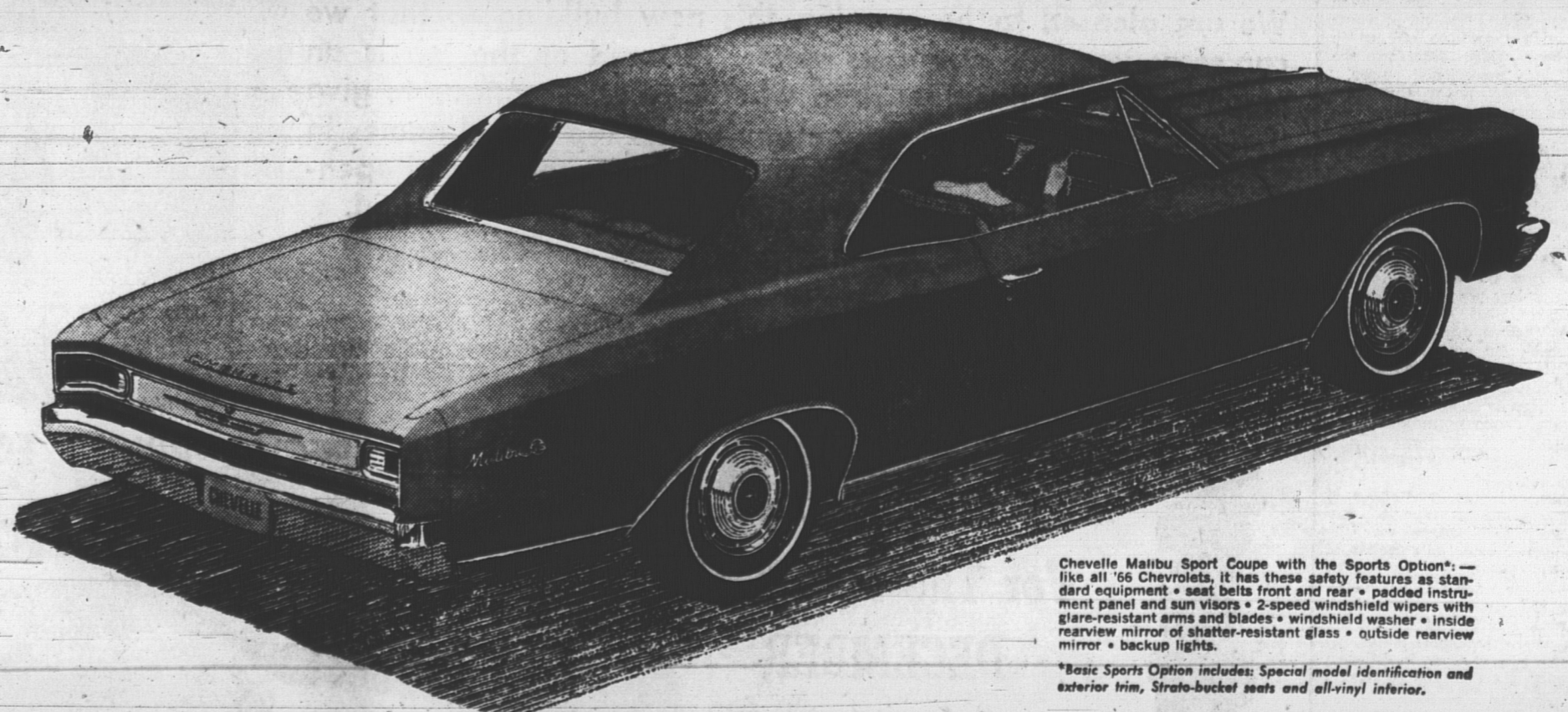
