

Alberta Squad Leads Tourney

MONTREAL (CP)— Alberta, the defending champion, took a three-stroke lead Monday at the halfway mark in the interprovincial team golf matches for the Willingdon Cup.

The four-man Alberta crew came from behind in a drive down the back nine to finish Monday's 18 holes with an aggregate 293 strokes against 296 for British Columbia.

Ontario faltered on the last nine after leading on the opening nine and had a 300 total. When the whole field of about 150 had finished early in the evening over the Summerlea course, 117 Canadians were leading the qualifying parade.

Behind Ontario in the team-play came Quebec with 312, Manitoba with 314, Nova Scotia with 317, Saskatchewan with 319, New Brunswick-Prince Edward Island with 321 and Newfoundland with 330.

Along with Alexander's 71, Doug Silverberg and Bob Wylie of the Alberta team shot par 72s and John Kibura 78.

Weslock and Gary Cowan of Kitchener, Ont. wound up with 73s.

The Quebec team was off to a good start with Don Alexander's 35 on the front nine, but Don took 42 along the back stretch.

He finished with 77. Dave Hardie

was low on the team with 76. Manitoba's team slipped badly on the home stretch after a mediocre start. Bill Pidlaski kept them in the hunt briefly with a one-under-par 34 on the first nine but ran into miseries coming back with 41.

Charles Brace led the Nova Scotia team with 77 and Ed Ross was Saskatchewan's best with 75. Ernest Hachev was low for the N.B.-P.E.I. combination with 76 and John Estabrooke posted Newfoundland's low of 80 with 40 on each nine.

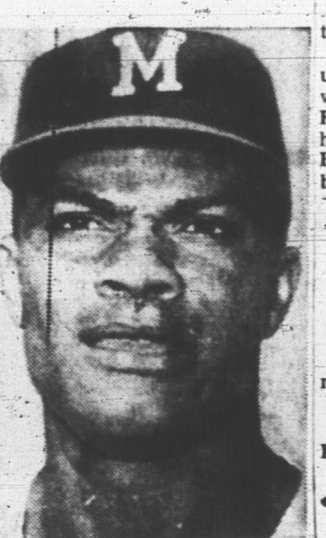

American League Batters Fall Behind .300 Mark

NEW YORK (AP)— It's a good thing for the American League that Baltimore Orioles obtained Frank Robinson from Cincinnati Reds last winter.

The AL is in the red as far as .300 hitters are concerned. Only two in addition to Robinson are in the 300 class and there's liable to be a reduction in the number when final returns are in.

The major league record for fewest 300 batsmen is three. It was set by the AL in 1905 and equalled last season when Minnesota's Tony Oliva won the crown with a .321 average. Only Carl Yastrzemski of Boston with .312 and Vic Davillio of Cleveland at .301 topped the mark with Oliva.

Oliva leads again this year with .322 followed by Frank Robinson .315 and Al Kaline, Detroit, .310. The fourth batter is Brooks Robinson of the Orioles, .298.

Oliva fell six points in last week's games, collecting only seven hits in 30 attempts.

Frank Robinson dropped four points and Kaline lost 10. Robinson turned in a 6-for-24 performance while Kaline managed only three safeties in 20 at bats.

Matty Alou of Pittsburgh Pirates regained the National League lead, boosting his average

Detroit Manager Is Recovering
DETROIT (AP)— Charlie Dressen, Detroit Tigers manager who entered the hospital for the second time in less than three months early Sunday, was reported showing some improvement Monday.

A hospital spokesman said, however, that the 67-year-old Dressen's condition remains serious.

The Tigers manager's latest ailment has been diagnosed as a kidney infection.

He had entered the hospital May 16 after suffering his second heart attack in 14 months. Doctors say there is no evidence of further heart damage this time.

Coach Bob Swift, who replaced Dressen in May, is an outpatient at the same hospital. He is receiving cobalt treatment for lung cancer. Swift entered hospital July 14.

Coach Frank Skaff, appointed acting manager when Swift was sidelined, continues to run the club.

Swimmers Take 4 Medals; Weightlifter Takes Gold

KINGSTON, Jamaica (CP)— Peter Reynolds of Australia won the gold medal in the men's 440-yard individual medley swimming event at the British Empire Games today, with Ralph Hutton and Sandy Gilchrist of Ocean Falls, B.C., hanging on to take second and third place respectively.

It was a world record for Reynolds. He churned the 440 yards in four minutes, 50.8 seconds, breaking the old world mark of 4:51.0, set by Edward Stickle of the United States four years ago.

For the two Canadians, it was a second medal each. Both were members of Canada's 880-yard men's relay team that finished second to Australia Friday. The Australians set a world mark in the 880 as well.

KINGSTON, Jamaica (CP)— Pierre St. Jean of Montreal set a pair of British Empire Games records Monday night as he captured the Games middleweight weightlifting gold medal.

St. Jean, 24-year-old son of Lionel St. Jean, 1958 Canadian weightlifting coach for the Games, broke his own record for the middleweight snatch with a lift of 281 pounds. He followed this with a jerk of 319½ pounds for a three-weight total of 870½ pounds, breaking by 10½ pounds the mark Tan Howe Liang of Singapore set in 1962.

KINGSTON, Jamaica (CP)— The three-man jury of appeal Monday ordered a restart to the British Empire Games women's tower diving competition, which was halted earlier in the day with Beverly Boys of Toronto in the lead.

The jury, Supreme Court of the Games, reversed an earlier ruling by the five-man technical board in charge of diving, which had decreed that the event would continue Wednesday at the point where it was interrupted with two of the five preliminary dives to be completed.

A gusty wind, which bothered all seven divers, led to the stoppage just after Miss Boys had completed her third dive, a corker, that put her ahead of Susan Knight of Australia. Her total was 177.60 points to 174.80.

KINGSTON, Jamaica (CP)— Ian O'Brien of Australia, with 15 yards to spare, Monday won the gold medal in the men's 220-yard breaststroke event at the British Empire Games.

Hamilton, Graham of New Zealand won the second-place silver medal. William Mahony, a Grade 12 student from New Westminster, B.C., took the third-place bronze.

O'Brien went the distance in 2:29.3, which bettered the established world record of 2:30.6 but did not come up to the 2:28.0 he did in heats Saturday. Graham came in with 2:36.9 and Mahony with 2:38.9.

Len Chase of Montreal was seventh among the eight competitors, registering a 2:45.2.

KINGSTON, Jamaica (CP)— Sharon Whitaker of Toronto goes against Angela Birstow of England today for the gold medal in badminton at the British Empire Games.

The two girls qualified for the final in semi-final matches Monday.

Miss Whitaker, 26-year-old school teacher, assured Canada of at least a silver medal by beating Mrs. Jenny Horton of England 4-11, 11-7.

Miss Birstow pushed aside Ursula Smith of England in straight sets, 11-7, 11-3.

A native of Victoria, B.C., Miss Whitaker was runnerup in two men's semi-final badminton events Monday. Malaysia's Tan Aik Huang, unofficial world champion, beat Dinesh Khannax of India 15-6, 15-2 while his compatriot, Yew Chang Hoe, defeated Scotland's Robert McCoig 15-10, 15-7.

England won the gold medal, with Canada second and Australia third Monday in the women's 440-yard medley relay swim at the British Empire Games.

It was a world record. The English girls went the distance in 4:40.8, erasing the world mark of 4:41.4 set by a team from The Netherlands in May, 1964, at Blackpool, England.

Linda Ludgrove, swimming the opening backstroke leg, put England into a lead of some three yards and Diane Harris, breaststroke, and Judy Gegan, butterfly, maintained the advantage.

Marion Lay of Vancouver, who anchored Canada to its world record in the 440 freestyle relay, put on a tremendous spurt on the freestyle leg, but couldn't catch Pauline Sillett.

KINGSTON, Jamaica (CP)— Art Jones of Montreal was eliminated Monday night from the lightweight boxing at the British Empire Games when he lost a narrow decision to Ronald Thurston of England.

The young Canadian, who lost several pounds after his arrival here because of the heat, moved into the lightweight division after Fred Fuller of Vancouver injured his right arm in training and was dropped from the Canadian team.

Jones, 20, had reached the lightweight quarter-finals on the strength of a third-round knockout over Arthur Fry of Australia last Friday.

KINGSTON, Jamaica (CP)— Diane Burge of Australia won the gold medal in the women's 100-yard dash at the British Empire Games Monday and Vancouver's Irene Piotrowski came through in a desperate battle to take the second-place silver.

Mrs. Burge, an Australian typist, came home in 10.6, a tenth of a second off the time she set in a heat earlier. Her heat time broke the Games record set in 1958 by Marlene Matthews-Willard of Australia.

Dillard Returns To Roughriders
OTTAWA (CP)— Fullback Jim Dillard still hasn't settled his financial differences with Ottawa's Rough Riders but he has returned to the Eastern Football Conference team's daily practices.

Dillard walked out on a practice Friday over what he termed a "money misunderstanding" but returned Saturday and Sunday for drills.

Dillard came to Ottawa from Calgary Stampede last season after he threatened to play out his option for the Western Football Conference club. But he later signed a three-year contract with Ottawa.

He suffered a minor knee injury in pre-season play and saw only limited action in last Wednesday's season opener against Montreal Alouettes which the Riders won 10-8.

He is expected to start Wednesday when Ottawa meets Calgary here.

The trouble apparently stems from a bonus clause in Dillard's contract. It is believed unofficially Dillard claims he's due for a \$5,000 bonus this season.
