Peters, President; S. L. T. Robinson, Associate Vice-President; Frank Seaman, Secretary; Mrs. G. A. Scribner, Treasurer; Wm. McKeuzie, Financial Secretary.

Good Luck.

Mr. C. E. Thompson, of Montreal, has fallen heir to a fortune of \$200,000 by the death of an uncle in the East Indies, from whom he never expected anything, as he parted from him on cool terms.—Mr. Robert Terry, formerly of the Guards band in Ottawa, has gone to Australia to take possession of a fortune left by his deceased brother. The legacy consists of £5,000 sterling in cash, and property valued at £3,000—A Long Island, N. Y., despatch of the 16th says that one Hoff, residing there, by the death of a relative in Holland, has fallen heir to several million dollars.—It is to be hoped they will all remember the printer.

More "Utterly Utter" than Oscar Wilde.

The aesthetic movement has more than once furnished a theme for the dramatist; it has now found a historian. The author of the work which professes to set aestheticism—now, since the departure of Oscar Wilde, rather moribund in London—once more on its legs is Mr. Walter Hamilton, a young gentleman who appears to be more "utterly utter" than the renowned Oscar himself. He abuses Du Maurier and Robt. Buchanan in forcible terms, and maintains that there is no such thing as literary or artistic taste outside the charmed circle of aesthetes. Mr. Hamilton is himself a resident in the unaesthetic neighborhood of Clapham, sacred to cockneys, and never before remarkable for devotion to the arts.

Protection in England.

The introduction of a resolution in favor of protection at the annual gathering of the English Associated Chambers of Commerce indicates that the fair trade movement is still full of vitality. It set out that a serious and compulsory reduction of wages and profits had been caused owing to the heavy import duties levied with impunity by foreign manufacturing nations, which are reaping a rich harvest of trade for their manufactures by the English system of free imports. Of course free-traders were ready to vote down such a resolution, but mechanics still leave free trade England for protected America, and manufacturers go on removing their establishments across the Atlantic.

A Hotel Keeper Wounded by an Arricat Barrister.

About 11 o'clock last Wednesday morning, Mr. Joseph R. McDonald, barrister, of Arricat, C. B., being in his bedroom at Mr. James Crowdes' Bras d'Or House, broke the window, threw a pitcher out, and, extending his arm from the window, discharged a pistol several times. Mr. James Crowdes, who was standing with several men on the road in front of the hotel, was struck in the chin by a pistol ball, which lodged in his neck and remained there. As soon as possible Mr. McDonald was arrested, and is now in jail. He was intoxicated and making much noise, and it is not known that he intended to shoot Mr. Crowdes. He came from Arricat on Saturday to attend the sitting of the Supreme Court here.

Crazed by "Arrears."

An extraordinary case of suicide occurred recently at Tralee, county Kerry. Mr. Daniel De Courcy Magillcuddy, justice of the peace, agent to the Magillcuddy of the Reeks, was found dead in bed at his residence at this place, having shot himself with a revolver. At the inquest it transpired that the old gentleman had been for some time in a state of great mental excitement regarding the details of the Arrears act, which he stated he was quite unable to understand. He had been going about with a long list of tenants who had given him notice of their intention to apply to the Court. The complicated details of the procedure completely puzzled him, and he was going about wringing his hands in a state of intense agitation. There is a numerous tenantry on the estate, and Mr. Magillcuddy, who was advanced in years, was completely unhinged by the work he had to face.

A Remarkable Potato Digger.

De Witt Duell, a farm hand in the employ of John Harris, residing near Middletown Saratoga County, last Tuesday, accomplished a remarkable feat in the way of potato digging. Harris wagered \$50 that Duell could dig fifty barrels of potatoes within twelve hours, and at 6 o'clock Tuesday morning, on the farm of Charles Coeus the task was begun in presence of farmer-friends surrounding country, who risked their money with the abandon of professional sports. At 7 o'clock Duell had uncovered twelve barrels. During the next hour he dug eleven barrels, the next hour he dug eight, and the next seven—a total of forty-seven barrels in five hours. His ability to dig the three remaining barrels in the seven hours still to his credit was conceded. He was allowed to use either a beak or a fork, or both. His employer will now wager \$500 that Duell can dig 100 barrels in twelve hours.

Chinese Cheap Labour.

In the course of a recent letter to the *Times*, Mr. H. M. Hyndman, writing of the proposed project of importing Chinese labourers to England, assigns the following reasons why he and those who think with him will do what they can to keep the coolies out of the country:—(1) They live on a much lower scale of diet and are content with worse lodgment than the mass of our people, consequently if they came in large numbers they would necessarily reduce the already too low standard of living among our wage-earning population to the gain of the capitalist class alone; (2) they never combine with the workers of the country in which they settle on trade disputes and never really assimilate with the people around them in any way; (3) they form a Chinese quarter in the cities, where they ignore sanitary rules and carry out their own laws and punishments quite irrespective of the laws of the country; (4) they bring no women with them save a few of the vilest sort—a very serious matter, whatever Mr. Bevan may think; (5) they are so numerous that if once freely admitted they may come in overwhelming hordes.
