Tonita F. 2:11 1/4, is a member of the hobbled brigade. She is a small chestnut mare, looks like a thoroughbred and has very little action.

At Rushville, Ills., Derwin, by Bernal, 2:17, recently took a winning race record of 2:20 1/2 in the 2:40 trot and also won second money in the 3:00 trot.
