STORM KILLS BIRDS

TORONTO (CP) — An Ontario naturalist Saturday reported a mass killing of wildlife over Lake Huron a week ago. David Johnson of Sarnia said thousands of migrant birds were struck down while flying over the lake April 27. He said he counted 233 birds of 31 species lying dead. A. M. Crocker of the Toronto meteorological office said strong local storms may have accounted for the deaths.

Player Steals Four Bases

BREMERTON, Wash. (AP) — It's impossible, but it happened — a baseball player stole four bases in one time at bat. While Olympic college was walloping Skagit Valley junior college 13-2 Friday the Olympic third baseman Don Jacobs, reached first on an error. He stole second, but a teammate on the bench thought the batter had fouled off the pitch and yelled "no, no!" Jacobs calmly stroled back to first while the Skagit pitcher held the ball and stared. Then Jacobs proceeded to steal second, third and home — and he was credited with four steals in the official scorebook.

Breaks High Jump Mark

BELFAST, (AP) —Thelma Hopkins, 19-year-old British coed, Saturday broke the women's world high jump record by clearing five feet, 8 3/4 inches. The old mark of five feet, eight inches was held by a Russian woman, Miss Hopkins' mark is subject to confirmation. She made the jump at a dual athletic meet between Queens University and Manchester University. Miss Hopkins, a dental student at Queens competed in the last Olympics at Helsinki and is one of Britain's brightest hopes for a gold medal in this year's games at Melbourne.
