THEO M. TAYLOR

In the passing of Mr. Theo M. Taylor, Granville, at the Prince County Hospital, Summerside, P. E. I., on Feb. 29th, the community lost one of its most highly regarded citizens at the age of 73 years. He had been a patient in the hospital for eight weeks, where he had undergone two operations from which he had made good recovery and was awaiting favorable weather when he suffered a sudden and fatal relapse.

The remains were transferred to the Davison Funeral Home, Kensington, and from there to his late residence. The funeral service was held in the North Granville United Church on March 6th, with interment in the church cemetery. Service was conducted by Rev. W. B. McPhail assisted by Rev. W. I. Green. Pallbearers were Percy Howatt, Tupper Taylor, Colin Burt, John Burgoyne, Emerson Matheson and Horace Taper.
