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LET'S EAT

Serve Holiday Salads Sparkling With Color

"No one food can give as much zest to a meal as I said the Chef, "as an appetizing salad, especially during this season of rich winter dishes and holiday treats. However, salads are often omitted at this time of year."

"It is my considered opinion, Madam," observed the Chef, "that the reason more salads are not served during the holidays is because they are not usually prepared to have that sparkling holiday look."

"Be sure the salad greens are as cold as a snowball. Instead of the usual ingredients, toss in something different such as canned carbanza beans, fine cut saclions, diced avocados, shredded red cabbage, diced fresh grapefruit sections, a chopped fresh herb, thin sliced fresh mushrooms, bits of raw cauliflower or thin-sliced raw Brussels sprouts.

"Instead of plain French dressing, make it with half-lemon juice and vinegar; or beat two parts French dressing with one part mayonnaise or salad dressing. Use surprise seasonings, such as dill, salt or seasoned salt.

"Top with a smart garnish of Christmas-red pimiento, tomato, pomegranate pulp, slice of persimmon, or a snowy mound of seasoned cottage cheese and a slice or so of radish, and you have a salad that sparkles with Christmas color and zest."

Tomorrow's dinner: Beet-Horse-radish and lettuce salad; ham slice topped with pineapple and prunes; buttered hominy; diced rutabaga; orange shortcakes; coffee, tea, milk.

ROUTINE

5:30 Put sliced ham with pineapple-pumpkin topping to bake.

5:35 Make individual shortcake.

5:42 Start rutabaga.

5:49 Start hominy (canned).

5:49 Prepare salad.

5:53 Set table.

5:58 Start Coffee.

6:00 Serve dinner.

All measurements are level recipes proportioned to serve 4 to 6.

Canadian To Sing At Edinburgh

EDINBURGH (CP)—Canadian soprano Lois Marshall will appear as a soloist at the 1957 Edinburgh international festival. She will make two orchestral appearances and will also give a song recital.

From preliminary programs, it appears as if Miss Marshall will be Canada's only representative at the music and drama festival, set for Aug. 18 to Sept. 7 next year. At this year's festival, the Stratford, Ont., Shakespearean company placed Canadian talent for the first time on the Edinburgh stage.

Miss Marshall, 31, of Toronto, came to Britain as a protegee of Sir Thomas Beecham. He heard her sing in Cleveland, Ohio, when searching for a soprano to sing in his recording of Handel's Solomon. She was acclaimed by critics for her notable performance at the London debut in the Royal Festival Hall last May.
