### SUMMERSIDE NEWS.

#### A Day's Budget of Western Items.

CALL at D. Stewart's and see the new lot of tweeds.

Fast horses are receiving special consideration at present.

ONE of the teams engaged in hauling stone for the town broke through the ice Thursday.

REPAIRS are being made to the track on Railway wharf in preparation for the spring shipping.

The County Court of Prince County opened yesterday with a large number of cases in the docket.

The work of macadamizing a portion of the street from the P. O. to Central street began yesterday morning.

The new boiler for the F. C. Batt was expected yesterday by train. The engine has been under a course of repairs at the hands of competent machinists, and it is believed that the F. C. Batt will be ready for sea in the course of a few weeks. Messrs. Allen, Allen & Co., contemplate purchasing the old boiler for one of their factories.

An unusual large number of people filled the side-walks, Thursday, the greater portion of whom came in from the country intent on assisting in celebrating St. Patrick's day. The principal objects of interest on that occasion being a race on the Bay, and in the evening a Concert in the Market Hall. The town presented a lively appearance throughout the day. The most remarkable feature was the absence of intoxication. This fact is indicative of the efficiency of the Scott Act and the manner in which its enforcement in Summerside of late has suppressed the selling of "bug juice," especially on a day of celebration when we would expect to see its effect apparent.

CIVIL Engineer John Ball, who has for some time been making a survey of the Bedeque oyster bed area, finished his observations and while making a call at the GUARDIAN Branch Office explained the nature of the surveys and the points touched by them. The area commences at Railway wharf and across to the Island Park, to the Bedeque shore, along the shore to Hurds Point wharf and thence to Oyster Point, along the shore to Schurman Point and following a direct line to St. farm and thence to a place of commencement, forming a large and most desirable area for the cultivation of this popular shell fish. Mr. Ball C. E. informs us that an early start is permissible by the ice; further observations will be made for the purpose of finding the best bottom suitable for oyster plantations.

The races Thursday afternoon attracted a large crowd of sportsmen who were impatient to see a test of trotting take place between some of the faster horses of Summerside. A suitable stretch of ice having been found the race was called, and after some scoring the signal was given for the start. The following is the result of the races:—Omaha, first, owned by J. H. Henry; Moretta, second, owned by Jas. A. Sharps; Chieftain, third, owned by A. C. Rogers; Wellington Bell, fourth, owned by Jos. O. Arsenault; Margate Beauty, fifth, owned by W. B. Downess; Grey Bell, sixth, owned by John Lefebvre; Judges, 7. D. Egan, William Manson, John McElman; starter, Fred Peters; Patrol Judges: Marj in Finlay, Summerside; Jas Tuplin, New Annan. Onward won in three straight heats and was the object of much favorable comment.
