AVENGE THE WATCHWORD.

Western China Said to be Over-run With Rebels.

TACOMA, Wash., Dec. 19.—The steamer Empress of India brings news from Chungking, China, via Shanghai, that business is paralyzed throughout the western Chinese province of Szechuen by the depredations of Yumantz and his band of 5,000 rebels, who are thoroughly disciplined and wear a uniform having for its distinguishing feature the Chinese character meaning "Avenge."
They are determined to rid China of all foreigners and to stamp out the Christian religion. There are six thousand Catholic refugees in Cheng King, and the property destroyed by the rebels is estimated at 5,000,000 taels. During the raids they have rendered 20,000 people, mostly native christians, homeless, and sixty-two lives have been taken, including several European missionaries. Yumantz recently beheaded two Catholic missionaries, which the city of Yun Chang gave up to him as hostages. J. Fleming, an English missionary, has been killed by natives and soldiers at Tsing Ping. France demands five million taels damages for the destruction of the French mission property.

MONTREAL FIRE COST \$900,000.

MONTREAL, Dec. 22.—The estimates of the loss by Tuesday night's fire place the total loss in the vicinity of \$900,000.
Of this Greenshields, Son & Co's stock and building represent in the vicinity of \$600,000, with insurance of \$530,000, McIntyre, Son & Co's \$300,000, with insurance of \$400,000. Almost every fire insurance company doing business in the city is represented, the Royal leading with a loss of \$100,000.

GUIDED HIS RESCUE

A Brave Man's Behaviour Under an Electric Car.

NEW YORK, Dec. 19.—With the wheels of an electric car crushing out his life, and a crowd shouting orders to the motorman, Martin Liston, a flagman, calmly bade the excited men be still. Then he quietly gave the orders that hastened the removal of the iron wheel that pinioned him down. The heavy car could not be lifted, and the motorman started to reverse the current. Poor Liston was jammed the tighter. Then the motorman started ahead and a groan went up from the crowd. Liston, whose left leg was gone, and whose breast was being crushed in from the weight of the car, found breath to speak. He ordered all to be silent, then quickly gave directions to the motorman how far forward to move, then to reverse his current. The motorman, with tears in his eyes, listened, while the crowd stood back amazed at the nerve of the victim under the wheels. Then the car was moved according to Liston's directions, and after many minutes of an ordeal few men could face, his broken body was taken from underneath the car. At the Roosevelt Hospital late that night it was said the brave fellow was dying.

Visit of Persian Royalty.

LONDON, Dec. 19.—Prince Malik Mansur Mirza Shua, second son of the Shah of Persia, a young man of about 19 years of age, is coming to England in January. His visit has not aroused particular enthusiasm in view of experiences resulting from previous visits of Persian royalties. The manners of Prince Malik, who is described as a diminutive, weakly youth, are however said to be pleasant and he fairly cultured.

War Against Consumption.

LONDON, Dec. 19.—There has been a great deal of talk recently of the need of some wide-spread action to cope with the increasing ravages of Great Britain's national disease, consumption. The Prince of Wales has now summoned a private meeting at Malborough House to promote a war against tuberculosis. The Marquis of Salisbury and a number of famous medical men will take part in it. It is hoped the outcome will be something more successful than the Prince of Wales' wonderful stamp scheme to assist the London hospitals, which proved more or less of a fiasco, collectors refusing to touch the stamps as they were not available for postage. The last issue was thrown almost entirely upon the hands of the organizers of the scheme.

UNREST AT HAVANA.

Spanish and Cuban Residents Long For American Occupation.

HAVANA, Dec. 19.—The people of Havana, Spanish and Cuban, long for a American occupation, the Cubans, because they live in unrestrained fear, the Spanish residents, because they are to stay here after the Spanish soldiers depart, and they do not wish the Cubans to become further embittered. General Arlas, the Military Governor of the Province of Havana, is regarded by the Cubans as being responsible for the violent conduct of individual officers and privates. It is asserted that the feeling in Arolas' battalion is the attacks on Cubans who give the least provocation will not be punished. The talk among the junior Spanish officers and privates is that they ought to mark their retirement from the Island by killing 500 or so of the insurgents. They may be said to go about with their fingers on the triggers of their revolvers and yearning for trouble. The Cubans in by-streets and in the suburbs are often insolent and further trouble may consequently occur at any time.

Where Vaccination Killed.

CUBA, N. Y., Dec. 19.—To enforced vaccination is due almost as much sickness as to smallpox, the disease it is intended to ward off. Without going into an abstract discussion to prove this proposition, one case to the point will be cited. Three weeks ago when the excitement attending the outbreak of smallpox in this locality was at its height, Miss Pearl Reed, of New Hudson, submitted to vaccination. It is said that the young woman was fearful of the results and shrank from the operation.

However, that may be, she was innoculated with the virus. It worked vigorously and soon her arm was swollen to abnormal proportions. Naturalists of a nervous temperament Miss Reed became greatly alarmed. Her heart action was weak, Miss Reed was stricken down and in spite of all that could be done for her she died. Residents of this section attribute her death to the effects of the vaccination.
