

Repercussions Expected From Ban-He Bomb March

LONDON (CP) — The three-day running battle between an anti-bomb-ban march and civil authority during the normally passive Aldermaston march is likely to have serious repercussions.

The government, faced with a blatant breach of the Atomic Energy Act, is intent on tracing the leak of information contained in a widely-distributed pamphlet naming the sites of regional government survival shelters.

In fact, Prime Minister Macmillan took a personal hand Tuesday in the search for the so-called "Spies for Peace" extremists who made public the civil defence secrets.

Angered by the breach in security, the prime minister called his Easter holiday short and returned back to London from his country home in Sussex. He met with Home Secretary Henry Brooke to discuss the problem, bound to create a storm in Parliament.

 Meanwhile, police, many disguised as beatniks complete with blue jeans, beads and musical instruments, pressed a search for those responsible for preparing and distributing the pamphlet, persons Brooke has called "traitors."

More fundamental is the effect the pamphlet and the ensuing skirmishes with police is likely to have on public opinion and the whole campaign for nuclear disarmament.

When this year's Aldermaston march began Friday it was generally believed the anti-nuclear movement in Britain, devoid of many of its founding lights, was fading into a mildly muted protest movement.

John Connell, writing in The Evening Standard, says the Committee of 100 has "introduced into British politics a reckless element of mass lawlessness and violence."

Both The Times and The Daily Telegraph editorially condemn the publishers of the pamphlet and the marchers who tangled with police. They charge that the CND is a cloak for a radical and subversive element

Bond Theft Witness Dies in Leap

NIAGARA FALLS, Ont. (CP) — A death among Niagara Falls police believe was swept to his trust company manager who was found to have testified in December Friday in connection with an \$837,000 bond theft in 1959 from the company he managed.

The man, William George Dales, 56, manager of the Premier Trust Company office at St. Catharines, Ont., was reported missing earlier in the day by his wife after failing to return home from a service station. The body has not yet been found.

Dales' car was found near a parapet overlooking the falls, after hundreds of tourists searched a man jumping from the roaring Niagara River and carried over the 165-foot drop.

Dales was in the flow to Vancouver Monday to be a witness at the assize court trial of David Wilson, 32, of Victoria, charged with two counts of possessing coupons from stolen government bonds.

The St. Catharines office of Premier Trust was broken into Feb. 1, 1959. Thieves using automatic equipment looted securities and safety deposit boxes.

Freighter Sinks

Opening lead — five of clubs. Here is an interesting hand played in a team match. At the first table, South lost no time arriving at six clubs on the bidding shown.

North led a trump, avoiding the spade lead which would have been fatal.

At the second table, in dummy and played a low heart and finessed the queen. West took the queen and led another trump. There was then no way for South to avoid another heart loser and he wound up down one.
