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White Sox Clip Yank Lead To One Game; Boston Hands Cleveland Second Defeat

The red-hot American League pennant race kept pace with the torrid eastern temperatures Wednesday with Chicago White Sox clipping the New York Yankees first-place margin to a single game while Boston handed another defeat to Cleveland Indians.

Walt Drogo drove in three White Sox runs with a trio of singles to lead the Chicago attack against New York and even the series at a game apiece in Yankee Stadium. The score was 7-4, with the rubber game of the series set for today.

At Boston, the Red Sox made a pair of errors and singled and Pierson barked one of Art Houtteman's sitches into the centerfield seats. Three more runs in a 6-2 verdict that left Boston runs in the fifth inning. The Beantowners only three games out of first place. Cleveland is sandwiched in between Boston and Chicago, two games behind the Yankees.

The only Maritime hurler in the league that draws heavily on promising American players sent here for seasoning, MacLeod has an impressive 9-0 record for the league-leading Liverpool Larrupers. Cool under pressure, MacLeod showed a good mixture of stuff and speed as he started out as a relief expert for Danny Seaman's Larrupers and soon won starting assignments.

In all 11 games so far, he came into five in relief and saved three. In a starting role he has two shutouts and a three-hitter. Don is a student at Boston University where he will be entering his sophomore year in liberal arts this fall. Not too sure what he wants to do—"I have been giving some thought to dentistry"—he admits a sports career has its appeal.
