

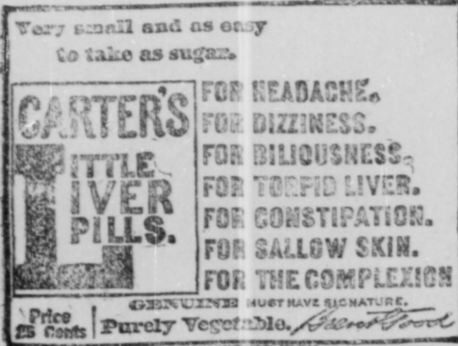

"THE TRICK" AGAIN.

ONE of THE EXAMINER'S many cor-
respondents reports that the gov-
ernment and its friends are giving
the electors assurance that if again
returned the party will obtain a mil-
lion or a million and a half from the
Dominion Government. This is the
trick of 1897 over again.

Unfortunately Sir Wilfrid Laurier
wrote a letter to Premier Farquhar-
son in reply to a memorial of the
Warburton Administration, in the
course of which he said:

"I gather from the memorial that
the substance of your complaint
under this head is that a very much
larger sum has been expended on
the canals and the railways of the
Dominion than was anticipated
when the terms of union were agreed
upon, that in addition large sums
have been expended by the Domi-
nion in subsidizing the construction
of railways in other parts of the
Dominion, in which expenditure
Prince Edward Island has not
shared, and that you think the com-
pensation of \$20,000 annually which
was voted and paid by the Dominion
to your province since 1887, substancially
on the grounds on which your
memorial claims further compensa-
tion, is altogether inadequate.

"Without attempting at present
to argue the matter, I desire to
point out that my colleague, Sir
Louis Davies, who especially repre-
sents your Province in the Cabinet,
has been pressing very strongly upon
as the necessity of immediately con-
structing a branch line of railway
in Prince Edward Island, from
Charlottetown to Murray Harbor,
including a bridge over the Hills-
borough river. The surveys and
plans of this road and bridge have
already been made by the
order of the Minister of
Railways, and the question of
entering upon its construction can
now be discussed and determined.
As the proposed plans contemplate
a railway and ordinary traffic bridge
combined it will of course be neces-
sary, in case its construction is de-
termined on, for the Local Govern-
ment to contribute a reasonable sum
towards its cost. I understand Sir
Louis Davies has had a good deal of
correspondence with you and your
predecessors on this point, and that
the government of the province has
passed an Order-in-Council agreeing
to contribute \$12,000 annually as its
share towards the cost of the bridge
in case the Parliament of Canada
should authorize its construction,
while it is contended your fair share
should certainly not be less than \$12,-
000 annually. I do not presume, at
present, to discuss these details, but
I desire to point out to you that the
claim you have made in the mem-
orial, for a re-adjustment of your
financial terms of union, on the
ground of alleged under-estimate of
expenditure upon the Intercolonial
Railway, Canadian Pacific Railway,
and Canals, &c., would, even from
your standpoint, present an ALTO-
GETHER DIFFERENT ASPECT if
the Dominion was to undertake
the construction of this railway and
bridge. Until some final determina-
tion is reached upon this point,
and the amount of the expenditure
actually ascertained, it would be
QUITE IMPOSSIBLE FOR ANY ONE TO
PASS ANY RELIABLE JUDGMENT UPON
THE VALIDITY OF YOUR CLAIM, EITHER
IN WHOLE OR IN PART. I am not
without strong hopes that we will
be able to reach a favorable con-
clusion, and make the necessary
recommendations to Parliament
this session. The question has al-
ready received some discussion in
Council, which will I hope, soon be
resumed."

Since this letter was written, ar-
rangements have been made for the

construction of the Belfast and
Murray Harbor Railway and Hills-
borough Bridge, referred to by Sir
Wilfrid Laurier, and consequently
according to Sir Wilfrid, the claim
of the Province "PRESENTS AND AL-
TOGETHER DIFFERENT ASPECT" and
"IT IS QUITE IMPOSSIBLE FOR AN ONE
TO PASS ANY RELIABLE JUDGMENT
UPON THE VALIDITY OF YOUR CLAIM IN
WHOLE OR IN PART."

The assurance in this regard given
by the government and its canvass-
ers is, in view of this deliberate
statement of Sir Wilfrid Laurier,
the veriest humbug.

SIGNIFICANT!

THE Attorney-General's office, for
a long time vacant, has not been
filled. The Commissioner of Public
Works has been turned down and
there is no one, apparently, to fill
his position. The Hon. Benjamin
Rogers, a member of the Govern-
ment, has, also, been retired.

It is customary for Governments
to go to the people with a full house,
except in cases where all hope for
the Government is gone. Some of the
old standard-bearers are also leav-
ing the ship, notably Hon. P. Sin-
clair. Another significant point is
the date fixed for receiving tenders
for jail, poorhouse and asylum
supplies which is placed, at Dec.
6th instead of the 20th, as in other
years. This will enable them to
award another year's contracts to
their friends and relations before
the Conservatives take charge!
