Supreme Court At Summerside

The adjourned November sitting of the Supreme Court of Prince County in Summerside resumed yesterday morning with Mr. Justice Mark R. MacGuigan presiding.

The court was informed that the case of Johnston versus Brooks that was being heard when court adjourned on Tuesday had been settled between the respective parties. Terms of settlement were not released.

The docket consisted of two appeal cases, one civil non jury case and one civil jury case.

The appeal of Junior John Joseph Gallant vs The King, from a conviction under the Temperance Act was dismissed for lack of due notice of appeal.

In the civil non-jury case, Hyman Kashetsky, plaintiff, vs George Bishop, defendant, was an action based on a promissory note.

The civil jury case, J. Ernest Johnston, plaintiff, administrator of Charles Avarad Johnston, deceased, vs William Edmund Brooks, defendant, a civil suit for compensation of \$2,112.00 re the loss of a child killed in a highway accident at Knutsford on June 6th of this year.

On motion of Attorney-General Walter A. Darby, two Charlottetown barristers, Allison MacMillan Gillis, and Robert Graham MacLeod, were appointed Commissioners for taking affidavits for the Supreme Court.

Montrose Woman Passes Following Long Illness

The death of Mrs. Fulton Gordon of Montrose occurred in the Western Hospital, Alberton, early Tuesday morning, Nov. 27th, following a long and trying illness.

Besides her husband, Mrs. Gordon is survived by two daughters and three sons, William McMurdo of Kentville, N. S., Mrs. Fred Oliver of Greenmount, Albert McMurdo of Trenton, Ontario; Mrs. Kenneth Hamill of Greenmount and Frank McMurdo of Montrose.

Temperance Act; 4 drunk, Indian Act; 6 driving while intoxicated; 2 driving while ability is impaired; 1 breaking and entering with intent; 9 theft; 2 assault; 2 breach of Excise Act; 4 breach of P.E.I. Temperance Act; 1 possession of stolen goods; 2 causing a disturbance; 1 vagrancy; 1 indecent act.

Alberton Plant Likely To Be Taken Over On Dec. 1st

Contingent upon the signing of the contract within the next two days, the Maritime Electric Company will take over operation of the Gordon Electric Light Company at Alberton on Saturday, Dec. 1st.

Plans are to continue to supply the Alberton area with the existing facilities for an indefinite time. It is understood that the contract calls for the purchase of the power lines, transformers, etc., with the present company being leased, and that Mr. Reginald Travers and Mr. Hillard Bell, presently in charge of operations, will continue in that capacity.

The town of Alberton was first supplied with electricity by P. W. Leard who, in 1924, acquired the old Gordon mill site about two miles north of Alberton on the main highway to Tignish and there began the development of electric power.

The plant was operated by Mr. Leard, assisted by his sons, particularly Spurgeon Leard who, for a number of years was chief operator.

In the beginning the plant was operated only twelve hours a day and was run solely by water power. Later a 30 h.p. engine was installed and used as a supplementary source of power at seasons when the water was low.

In 1927 the plant changed ownership. It is resolved that we ask the Canadian Federation of Agriculture to study this immigration problem further and to urge the Dominion Government to make some arrangements whereby those immigrants could be instructed regarding those above matters during their crossing of the boat, and for a short period if necessary, after arrival in Canada, and be it further resolved, that our Provincial Government be urged to arrange some form of land settlement policy which will be of sufficient assistance to interest our Island boys, who prefer to farm, but who have not the finances to get established, and which would also extend some assistance to immigrants who are so qualified and inclined to settle on Island farms.

Other Resolutions. Whereas the board of directors does not seem to have any plan re rural electrification to present to our Government, and whereas electrification is urgently needed in a great many districts on this Island. Be it therefore resolved that the directors of this Federation be directed to form some plans for furthering electrification in those districts, and have it presented to our Government at its next session. Whereas we believe the Potato Marketing Board has done excellent work, Be it therefore resolved that this meeting express our confidence in, and appreciation of, said marketing board. Be it resolved that the marketing of other vegetables such as turnips be also placed under the control of the Potato Marketing Board.
