Gold Mining Communities Ask Higher Subsidies

OTTAWA, Nov. 11 — (CP) — Municipal officials representing gold mining settlements Monday appealed to the federal cabinet for increased aid to gold mines. Spokesmen came away with the feeling that something will be done to spike fears that a "crisis in gold" will bring mass unemployment and destitution to northern areas and collapse of the gold mining industry. Prime Minister St. Laurent and six cabinet ministers, including Trade Minister Howe and Finance Minister Abbott, met the 30-odd delegates. Mr. Abbott conferred with representatives of the industry a week ago, "I am confident that something will be done," said Mrs. Ann Shipley, colorful reeve of Tech Township in Northern Ontario, about 300 miles north of Toronto. The 53-year-old grandmother and others outlined problems at a press conference following the cabinet meeting. Armand Dumas, Liberal member of Parliament for Villeneuve, Que., believed the government will take some action at the next session of Parliament opening Nov. 20. "We're pioneers and not beggars," Mrs. Shipley exclaimed. "We need help and the mines accept the assistance given graciously, but we are not too fond of bonuses." Currently, the government grants a subsidy averaging about \$2.80 per fine ounce of mines selling on the official market. But the municipal spokesmen said that the subsidy formula was worked out when the Canadian dollar was at a discount. With the dollar above par the price was lower than the \$35 (U.S.) per fine ounce official world price when translated into Canadian funds. While the price of gold was declining production costs were climbing. "The industry is in a critical position and many operating mines are threatened with closure," the officials said in their brief. They represented mining towns in Ontario, Quebec, Manitoba, British Columbia, the Yukon and Northwest Territories. The municipal delegation described difficulties in floating debentures for new schools and other community buildings; of mines closing down; of unemployment; and of a shaky future for some \$200,000,000 capital investment in Canada's gold mines. Mrs. Shipley said the only solution she and other officials could see was that one day the official world price will be increased to \$50 per fine ounce (U.S.) from the current \$35. Mr. Dumas estimated that the government has provided some \$40,000,000 in assistance in the four years that a subsidy has been paid to the mines. Most of the gold produced in that period was by mines receiving the subsidy.

Decline Continues In Wholesale Prices

OTTAWA, Nov. 11 — (CP) — A year-long decline in wholesale prices continued during September, when the general wholesale price index dropped 1.8 points to 222.1 from 223.9, the Bureau of Statistics reported Monday. The index, based on 1935-39 prices equaling 100, declined by 21.6 points from the peak of 243.7 in July a year ago. Price drops were noted in most sub-groups with the exception of non-metallic minerals, chemical products and iron products. Biggest drop was in animal products which slipped to 238.6 from 244.9. 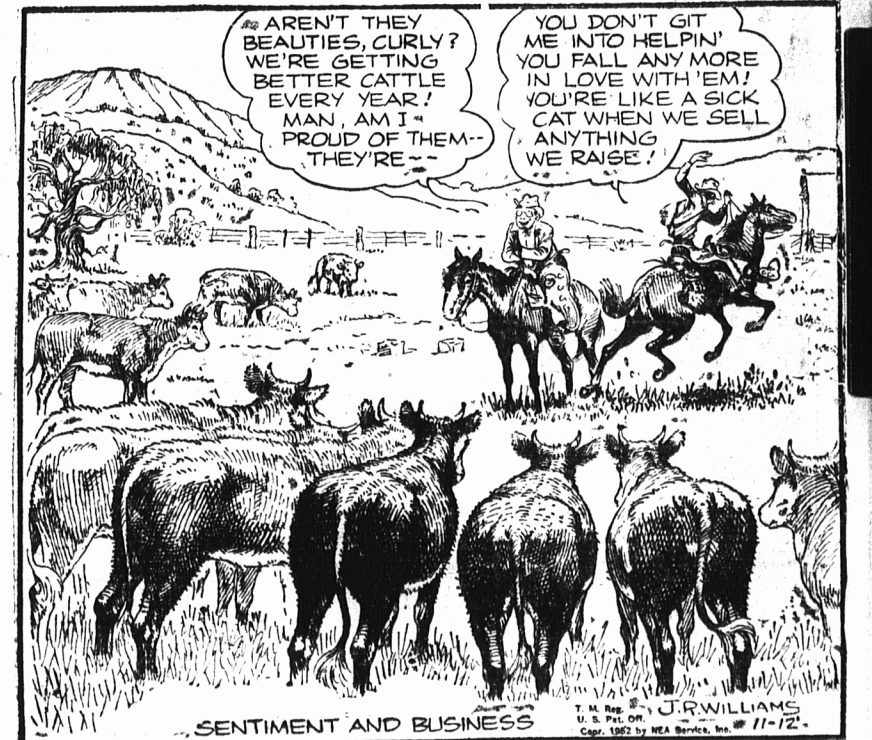
See Eisenhower's Promise To Visit Korea Misunderstood

It's rather amazing the number of people who run into who believe that General Eisenhower made an unqualified campaign promise to end the Korean war. The President-elect said he would go to Korea to see what could be done about an honorable end of the conflict. The Democrats said the solution lay in Moscow, not on the Korean front that Eisenhower was grandstanding. What Eisenhower can do in Korea is judge for himself the military situation which underlies the possibility of political action. Some military men say that nothing can be done about the stalemate except through an overwhelming expenditure of armed force. Others consider a new Allied offensive, aimed at clearing Korea of Communists, to be feasible. These latter point out that when the Communists were taking a bad beating they suggested truce negotiations. Then they got a slackening of Allied war effort, decided they liked the situation, and stalled negotiations. The conclusion drawn from this is that more military pressure might end the war. Eisenhower will be looking into that. He will also be looking into his belief that Asiatics—in this specific case, Koreans—should be doing the main job of defending themselves. The United States has already dropped all efforts to negotiate a truce on a military basis, at the front, and has transferred such work to the political field in the United Nations. If the impression becomes widespread that the President-elect is "going to Korea to end the war," it may prove a handicap to him later on, when he is unable to show immediate accomplishment, but must work down what will, at the very best, be a long and hard road.
