ELECTION.—This is Civic election day in Moncton.

PERSONAL.—Hon. Messrs. Sullivan and Ferguson returned from Ottawa this afternoon.

MAILS.—The twenty-four bags of mail matter which crossed at the Capes this morning, arrived in town this afternoon.

BADLY SCALDED.—The four-year-old daughter of Mr. Thos. H. DeMill, of Albert County, N. B., was so badly scalded by falling into a large tub of hot water a few days ago, that it is feared she will not recover.

THEY MIXED THEM UP.—The Calgary Tribune reports that the Salvation Army at that place recently offered special prayers for hotel-keepers, saloon-keepers and the Mayor and Council. The meeting was largely attended.

A RIFE OLD AOE.—An exchange says that Mr. Wm. Moody, of the Gulf Shore, Cumberland Co., N. S., will celebrate his 107th birthday on Saturday, having been born in Dundee, Scotland, on March 10th, 1781. The old gentleman is still in possession of his faculties and delights to see strangers.

A LIVE OLD MAN.—The Toronto Globe reports that a Kingstonian of 75, named Greenfield, recently advertised for a housekeeper, and was so charmed with the appearance of one who applied, a woman of thirty, that he proposed, was accepted, and married her within twelve hours of his first sight.

ALL ABOUT A HORSE.—A truckman and an ex-truckman made things somewhat lively on Queen Street, on Saturday afternoon by engaging in a dispute over the ownership of a horse, which the former had bought from the latter and upon which a small amount of the purchase money had not been paid. The ex-truckman, who had been indulging in something stronger than Hobbs' vinegar, was taken in charge by the police.

DIED POOR WITH \$30,000.—Mrs. Anna Justina Marquis, died recently at New York in the midst of filth and squalor. She had been missing for two days, and when the neighbors broke open the room door she was found dead on the mattress. All her surroundings betokened the most abject poverty but when the public administrator searched the apartments he found \$30,000 in various places. Nothing is known of the woman's relatives and the finder has charge of the money.

MORMONS IN NOVA SCOTIA.—The Presbyterian Witness says: There is a Mormon Church in Nova Scotia. It seems incredible, but it is true. The church is in the district of Rawdon, Hants County. The building is very small, and the members number about a dozen or so. They are "Letter Day Saints," and say "Mormon" is but a nickname. They are not a growing church. On the contrary, they are likely to die out before long. Some sections of Hants and Kings counties have been astonishingly productive of heresies.

RELIEVING HIS FEELINGS.—Mr. P. E. Tremblay, of the legal firm of Mercier, Beaulieu & Co., went to the Central Police Station, at Montreal, a few nights ago, and told the sergeant that he had intentionally broken two windows of Le Music office with a hammer. He was admitted to bail. Being asked why he broke the windows, he said that it was on account of a critique of Mr. L. O. David's history of the rebellion of 1837, which was published in Le Monde, in which critique he, Mr. Tremblay, believed the patriots were treated unfairly.

SERIOUS ACCIDENT.—On Friday last, says the Summerside Agriculturist, a horse driven by a son of Mr. Hiram Thompson, Margate, while passing the station here, became alarmed at an engine, and started to run away. After going a short distance the driver was thrown out, and struck a telegraph pole, receiving some injuries about his head, which rendered him insensible for some time. He was carried to a shop, and after some time recovered, and went home in company with his brother, who was with him at the time of the accident also. The horse had one leg considerably injured. It was attended by Veterinary Gourlie in his usual skillful manner.

A BIG FAILURE.—The Winslow Packing Company, of Portland, Me., and its managing director, Geo. C. P. Mattocks, have assigned. The Company operated fourteen corn factories in Maine and six lobster factories at Boothby and Camden, N. S., Bay of Islands and Sabie Islands. The supply of corn handled required the services of upwards of 2,000 farmers and gave employment during the packing season to 2,000 men, women and children, directly, beside the work to farmers, and about fifty men were employed during six months of the year in making cans. The amount of assets and liabilities, principally in Maine banks, is not stated but must be large, as the factories were mortgaged for \$100,000, and were valued at \$300,000.

THE FUNERAL CEREMONIES.

SAN REMO, March 10. Emperor Frederick III. passed a good night last night. He feels extremely well. He drove to the station this morning accompanied by the Empress Victoria to take a special train to Berlin. The new Emperor was enthusiastically cheered by the crowds.

BERLIN, March 10. All the German newspapers appear this morning with black borders, and contain accounts of the closing scenes of yesterday. All the church bells will be tolled daily from 12 till 1 o'clock for the next fortnight.

NEWFOUNDLAND AFFAIRS. The Confederation Proposal.

OFFICIAL OPINION.

FAVORABLE TO CONFEDERATION.

OTTAWA, March 11. A St. John's, Nfld. despatch states that a deputation will probably leave for Ottawa re the confederation proposal from the Dominion Government. The revenue of the Newfoundland Government last year was \$1,190,900. The estimated revenue for the current year is \$1,347,000, and the expenditure for the current year \$1,253,000. The public debt is three millions. The despatch states that there is much excitement on the federation question, but the Canadian proposals are, on the whole, favorably received.

OTTAWA, March 11. In Prince Edward Count, Platt (Liberal) was elected by 172 majority, and in West Middlesex Dr. Room (Conservative) by 117 majority.

The Sullivan-Mitchell Fight

RESULTS IN A DRAW

After Thirty-Nine Rounds.

PARIS, March 11.

After 39 rounds, the great fight between Sullivan and Mitchell, which took place on Saturday afternoon on the training grounds of Baron Rothschild, near Criel, 32 miles north of Paris, ended in a draw. There was considerable wrangling about securing a suitable spot, which was ultimately chosen by three outside parties, at the request of the pugilists' backers. Mitchell talked as much as usual and felt himself confident of success. Sullivan looked determined, but was somewhat thin in the face. When the combatants reached the ring, forty spectators were present. McDonald and Jack Ashton seconded Sullivan, and Baldock and Kilrain seconded Mitchell. Mr. Angle, of the London Stock Exchange was referee. Jack Bennett umpired for Sullivan, Charley Rowell for Mitchell.
