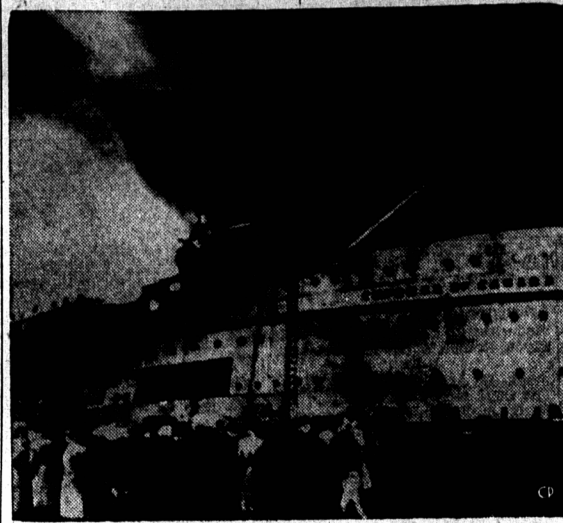

JAMES THOMAS MOBBS James Thomas Mobbs passed away at his home, 57 Lake Street, Winchester, Mass., on Sunday night, December 20, following illness of six weeks.

He also installed all the railings in the Boston subway when it was built.

Upon the dissolution of A. Dickey in 1940, Mr. Mobbs opened his own shop at the corner of Main and Lake Streets, doing the finest cabinet-making and expert re-finishing of old furniture. Many in Winchester entrusted their most cherished heirloom pieces to Mr. Mobbs for restoration and he won an enviable reputation as a craftsman.

Funeral services were held at his late residence Wednesday afternoon, December 31, with the Rev. John Shook, Jr., pastor of the Crawford Memorial Methodist Church, officiating. Burial was in Wildwood Cemetery, Winchester, Mass.
