"Where now?" Malcolm gasped, as they floundered out on the opposite bank. "Somewhere near here. Let's go up—we may see better up above."

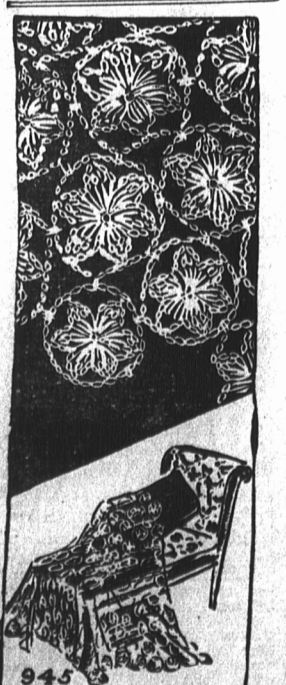

THE COOK'S CORNER

GINGER ALE TEA PUNCH

Make a syrup of 1 pint sugar and 1 pint water, and boil for 5 minutes. Pour this over 1 1/2 cup tea in a shaker, until the liquid is thick and amber color.

FRUIT JUICE COCKTAIL One quart bottle grape juice, 2 No. 10 tin pineapple juice, 2 pints apricot nectar, juice from 1 pint bottle maraschino cherries, juice of 6 lemons, 1 quart dry ginger ale, 1/2 cup sugar, 1/2 cup ice cubes, coloring the cubes, if desired.

Pineapple Ice Cream

2 cups shredded pineapple 1 cup sugar 1 pint whipping cream 1-2 cup coffee cream 2 tablespoons icing sugar 1 teaspoon vanilla 1-8 teaspoon salt

Method: Cook the pineapple gently for about 15 minutes, then add the sugar and cook until this dissolves. Chill. Whip the cream until it will just hold its shape, then add the icing sugar to this and stir until it is dissolved.

Pineapple Sherbet 1 cup crushed pineapple 1-2 cup sugar 1-4 cup buttermilk 1 egg white 1 teaspoon vanilla

Method: Shred the pineapple or cook gently until it is tender. Add the sugar and cook until this is dissolved, adding slightly more if you like these desserts sweeter.

Orange Sponge 1 tablespoon gelatin 1-4 cup cold water 1 cup boiling water 3-4 cup sugar 1-4 cup lemon juice 1 cup orange juice 2 egg whites

Method: Soak the gelatin in the cold water for 5 minutes, then add the boiling water and stir until it is dissolved. Add the sugar, more if you like such puddings very sweet, and stir until this is dissolved.

RELAX INTO CALM SLEEP Many a beauty-minded woman has cured from becoming simply by doing relaxing exercises each night before even trying to go to sleep.

How Can I?? (By ANNE ASHLEY) Q How can I treat prickly heat? A. Sponge the affected parts with equal parts of vinegar and water. Dry the skin thoroughly and then powder with one part of boracic acid to two parts of cornstarch.

Q How can I prevent potatoes from falling to pieces when boiling them? A. Add a little salt to the potatoes when they are nearly done, and this will insure their floury consistency and also prevent them from falling to pieces.

Q How can I remove iodine stains from fabrics? A. Soak the spots in a strong solution of epsom salts. Let stand until the stains wash out easily.

Golden Sparkle 2 cups pineapple juice 1 cup strained orange juice 1 tablespoon lemon juice 1 pint ginger ale 1/2 cup sugar, if desired Maraschino cherries

Method: Mix the pineapple and orange juice, sweeten to taste if necessary. Stir in the lemon juice. When ready to serve, add the ginger ale and pour into tall chilled glasses. Drop a cherry into each and serve with a sprig of fresh mint.

The Housewife And Her Activities

Beef is quite delicious with sour cream added after the cooking. Stew it with not very much water, onions, carrots, cabbage leaves, bacon, parsley and thyme, peppercorns and salt. Pour off or thicken the gravy with flour, and stir in the sour cream and a squeeze of lemon. After this if you want to keep it warm you must be very careful not to let it boil.

Beetroot soup is good, nourishing food. Wash and cut up the beetroots, but let them only bleed into the water, they are being cooked in. Boil till tender, out through a sieve or mill back into the same water and warm up quickly. Take off the fire and stir in sour cream.

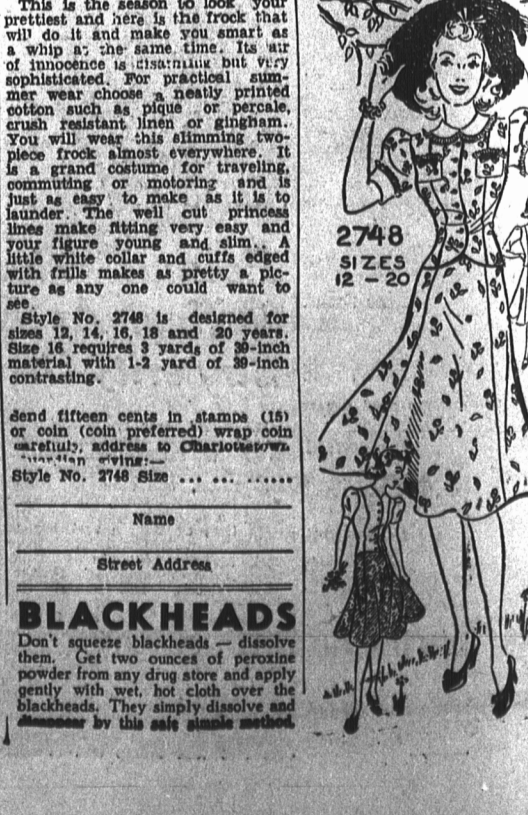
