**CAMPAIGN IN KINGS**

**A Splendid Meeting in Murray River Hall.**

The local campaign in the 4th district of King's opened in Murray River Hall on Tuesday night, the Liberal - Conservative candidates scoring a grand success.

Immediately, on Jas. Saunders, Esq., being called to the chair, the Boer tactics of the organized hypocrisy began to show. The party heelers made a determined effort to shut off discussion by a motion that the candidates be restricted to half an hour each. The Conservatives were anxious for a full discussion of the questions of the day and assisted by the better element of the Liberals succeeded in demolishing the barb wire defence of the government party.

Mr. A. F. Bruce, in the Liberal interest, led off in a short speech, the burden of which was that as the Laurier Government is in power we should have a Liberal government here or we could not obtain our rights. He mentioned the financial question merely to say he would not go into it at all. In speaking of the branch railway he said: the railway without the bridge was like a cow with one horn cut off, when Mr. McKinnon replied, —the cow with one horn might be just as good a milker as one with two. The humor of Mr. Bruce's argument began to trickle through the most thick-skinned Grit. The "free and independent" roared, and Mr. Bruce was convinced his was the bon mot of the evening.

J. A. Mathieson, Esq., on coming forward was most cordially received. He handled the questions of the day in a masterly, logical manner and was repeatedly applauded as he made a succession of telling points against the Government. He said the Conservative Government was punished for having a small debt, after carrying on the business of the country for many years without taxation. The Grit government denounced this as a serious offence. They promised to make ends meet. They put a tax on everything they could touch, and now the country is over one-twentieth of a million in debt. Can the electors of this country, the taxpayers of this country, condone such a scandalous breach of trust? He advocated a radical change in the Public Works service, with a view of securing efficiency, economy and honesty in this department, that there never may be a recurrence of a deficit of \$119,000 in an election year for the purpose of debauching the electorate with their own money. He made a powerful arraignment of the Government on the dark and gloomy record of the past nine years, a record unparalleled in the history of this country, and culminating in the past year in the spectacle of a government, in utter disregard of constitutional usage, existing an executing the functions of government, without an Attorney-General for a whole year, by the grace of Mr. Pineau. Mr. Mathieson was loudly applauded at the close of his speech.

Mr. Annear next addressed the meeting. He received a good quiet hearing. Like his colleague Mr. Bruce, he avoided the financial ques-

tion, saying Mr. Inman would attend to that. They left the electors under the impression that if the Government is sustained the same wasteful expenditure and ruinous piling up of debt shall be continued. They had not even a promise from Sir Louis to offer.

Our representative, Mr. McKinnon, on coming forward received a grand welcome which testified to the high esteem in which this popular and talented young farmer is held by his brother farmers of the Murray Harbor District. He was not speaking very long when he showed the audience very clearly that he was not afraid to handle any of the public questions of the day. He went over the ground very fully knocking down the slender props on which his opponent built his hopes with the precision and ease of a skilled debator. He showed that the Conservatives in the last House were not opposed to the Hillsborough Bridge but were opposed to the plan submitted as inadequate. Mr. McKinnon was loudly applauded.

Mr. Inman now had his inning and made quite a long speech, in the course of which he had to be put straight a good many times. He went back to ancient history in the futile attempt to take some of the blackness out of the Pineau episode by citing a case where, he said, another man had been bought and paid for. This is the new Liberal political morality standard. Anything lower cannot well be. According to this grit doctrine any villiany is justifiable if you can show a precedent. Mr. Inman received a patient hearing.

J. Livingston, one of the farmers present, replied to Mr. Inman in a short but very effective speech.

Mr. Bruce made a few closing remarks. A vote of thanks was given Mr. Saunders for his good conduct as chairman, and all started to face the raging elements out of doors, carrying with them a distinct impression of the weakness of the Liberal cause when fully exposed by the Conservative candidates.

**Smart Work.**

PRETORIA, Dec. 1.—Gen. Smith-Dorrien's column has returned to Belmont after a five day march from Bullstroom. They had only one casualty.

On the return journey, the Canadians, while scouting, rode close to an ambush prepared by the Boers. Realizing their position they sprang from their horses, turned them loose, and sent them galloping back to the column. They then sought cover on a slight ridge and poured a hot and accurate fire into the Boers, killing several of them. They held their position until the column of infantry arrived, and did not sustain a single casualty.

**A Object Lesson.**

The expressions of sympathy which Mr. Kruger is receiving from Ireland should have a good effect on him, if he stops to consider all that they mean. There is no other power whose subjects would be allowed to so freely express their sympathy for a national enemy. It is an easy yoke that British conquest has put on the Boers.—Montreal Gazette.

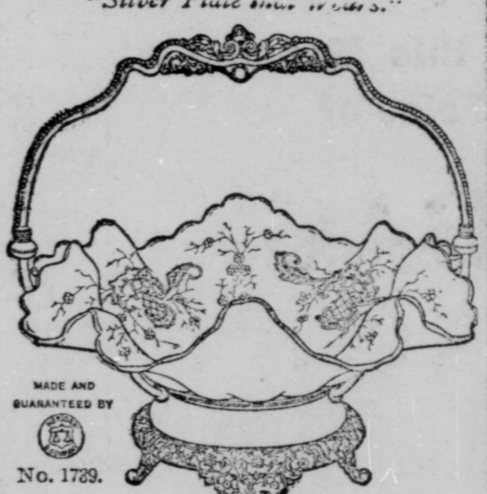

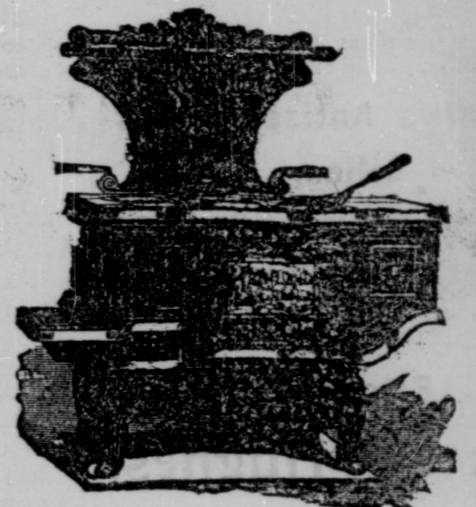
