Sealing Ships Prepare To Sail

ST. JOHN'S, Nfld. (CP)—Crews of three sealing ships will have their chests for free X-rays here today a few days before their vessels begin slipping quietly and separately away to the seal ice off the northeast coast.

The Terra Nova will sail March 7 under command of Capt. Gus Carter. The Algerine sails March 8 under Capt. H. Laite. Both are owned by Bowring Brothers here and are the only Newfoundland ships to enter the seal fishery this year.

The Halifax-owned Arctic Fowler will sail with its Newfoundland crew early in the week. The Arctic Sealer, out of Halifax but also with a Newfoundland crew under Capt. William Moss, sailed from St. John's for the Gulf of St. Lawrence last week.

Atlantic Music Festival Possible

SAINT JOHN'S, N.B. (CP)—Possibility of an Atlantic provinces music festival here has been discussed by executive members of the New Brunswick festival. They suggested such a regional event might follow N.B. festival week in May and eventually become a semi-annual for a national festival. Supporters of the idea proposed that contestants for an Atlantic festival be chosen by adjudicators of local festivals at St. John's, Nfld., Sydney, New Glasgow, Charlottetown, Halifax and Saint John.

OTTAWA (CP)—Appointment of Cmdr. Orval Walter Beetz, 36, of Verwood, Sask., as director of underwater weapons was announced Saturday by naval headquarters. He will take up the appointment next month. Also announced was the appointment of Lt. Cdr. Edward P. Shaw, 40, of Halifax and Charlotte town as commander the coastal escort Oshawa, scheduled to be commissioned April 1. He will hold the additional appointment of commander of the 12th Canadian Esco Squadron based at Esquimalt, B. C.

Lt. Cdr. Frederick Little, 41, of Victoria and Hamilton will succeed Lt. Cdr. Shaw as gunnery staff officer on the staff of the flag officer Atlantic coast March 12.

Moscow Plan For Bering Strait Dam

LONDON. (Reuters)—Moscow radio Saturday outlined a plan to build a dam across the 55-mile Bering straits, which separate Siberia from Alaska, to permit heating the waters of the Arctic ocean by nuclear energy.

The dam would carry a railroad line which, the radio report said, could link London and Washington by land transportation by way of Moscow. It said the plan was the work of a Russian engineer named Shumilin. It provided for huge heaters, operating by an atomic power station of between 2,000-3,000,000 kilowatts capacity. The heating elements would be submerged at the foot of the dam in sluices letting the waters of the Pacific flow into the Arctic ocean.

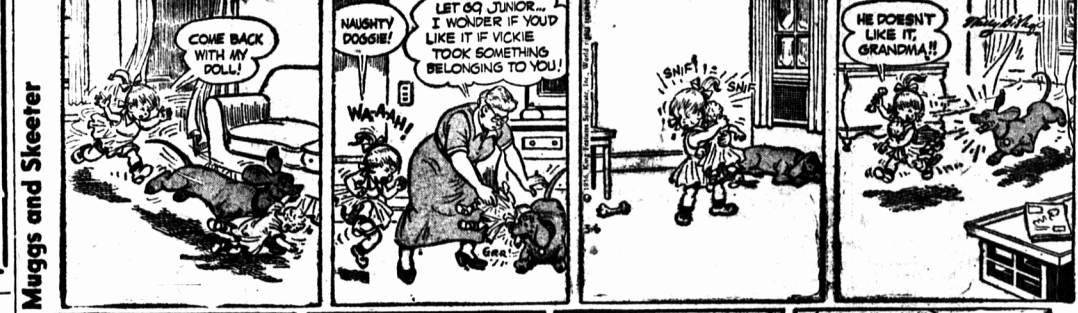
