

Russia Believed Ready To Cut Armed Forces In Middle Europe

LONDON (AP)—Prime Minister Wilson said here he believes Soviet Russia may be ready to join the West in a balanced reduction of forces in middle Europe.

The British leader has had two meetings with Premier Alexei Kosygin in Moscow this year in which he pressed the proposition for East-West troop cuts.

A reporter asked Wilson if he thinks East-West tensions have eased to the point where countries of the North Atlantic Treaty Organization and the Warsaw Alliance can safely negotiate force reductions in central Europe.

"This is a matter for inter-Allied study, Wilson replied. "In my visits to the Soviet Union, this is a proposition I have pressed very strongly on Mr. Kosygin and, without disclosing the results of confidential discussions, I feel there could well be a readiness on the other side to respond to initiative here."

CUT GARRISONS IF SAFE
Britain, the United States and West Germany are reappraising NATO force needs in Europe. Both the British and Americans would like to cut their garrisons in Germany if they conclude this can safely be done.

Wilson made these other points in an interview: "The labor government's 1964 decision rejecting currency devaluation as a cure for Britain's economic woes was right... and I have never regretted it."

Wilson said he had never regretted a move to a role by ministerial or party colleagues to assist him as prime minister. In July was a "fiction of overheated and underemployed journalistic imagination."

Some opposition Conservatives and financial authorities had talked loosely during the summer economic crisis of forming a coalition govern-

ment but this "was rightly treated with contempt."

His government is confident that its "controversial, tough, unpopular" measures for a cure of Britain's economic ills will succeed without creating conditions for a lasting recession.

"The world is approaching the time for a radical advance towards improved non-monetary and credit arrangements, needed to lubricate the channels of trade."

Peace in Viet Nam still depends on Hanoi. Better chances exist today for a world agreement against the spread of nuclear weapons. Such a treaty would in no way clash with the British government's commitment to "internationalize" its own nuclear armory.

SURPLUS IN SIGHT
Asked if he would have Britain's balance of payments righted by next summer, Wilson said:

"We inherited a deficit of nearly 800,000,000 (\$2,400,000,000) on our overseas payments in 1964. Last year this was cut to 320,000,000. Our hopes of getting into balance this year have been affected by a number of factors... But now the signs are in favor of not only balance in our overseas payments by next year, but a growing surplus to follow."

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UNESCO To Observe 20th Birthday Friday

OTTAWA (CP)—A worldwide organization promoting peace through non-political channels will be 20 years old Friday.

The United Nations Educational, Scientific and Cultural Organization (UNESCO) began with 20 member countries and a budget of \$7,000,000. This year it has 120 members and a biennial budget of \$22,000,000.

"Ideas are its stock in trade," D. W. Bartlett, secretary-general of the Canadian national commission for UNESCO, said in an interview Wednesday.

"No government ever had an idea in its life. Only people have ideas—and therefore, we must find a way to reach beyond governments to individuals and groups."

Within the United Nations system, UNESCO is an independent agency, working with UN headquarters and organizations around the world.

Small staff
The Canadian headquarters staff consists of Mr. Bartlett, two project officers and two part-time librarians.

The Canadian commission is part of the Canada Council. From a Wellington Street office across from the Parliament Hill they direct the research, informational and educational projects involving affiliated individuals and groups across Canada.

International UNESCO originated the International Geographical Year, and the International Hydrological Decade launched in 1965 to help fight the world's growing water shortage.

Educational projects are stressed, with 500 schools participating in a worldwide twinning program. More than 12,000 travel grants to teachers have been given since 1952.

Next year a project to raise the status of women through education, science and culture will begin.

CONTRACT BRIDGE

TEST YOUR PLAY

1. You are declarer with the West hand at Six Notrump. North leads the jack of clubs. How would you play the hand?

2. You are declarer with the West hand at Five Clubs doubled. The bidding has been:

North East South West
1 ♠ Dblo 3 ♠ 4 ♠
4 ♠ 5 ♠ Pass Pass

North leads the nine of diamonds. How would you play the hand?

1. Win the club, cash the ace of spades, and lead a low heart. If North follows low, play the seven from dummy. This sequence of plays will make the contract in every case where the hearts are divided 3-2, as well as in those cases where one opponent has the doubleton queen of spades.

It would be incorrect to cash the ace of spades and then lead a heart to the ace with the intention of next discarding a diamond on the king of spades. Assuming that the spade queen

did not fall, you would be in danger of going down, if the player who took the third round of hearts, when you attempted to establish the suit, was now able to cash the queen of spades.

There is a much better chance of making the contract by conceding a heart trick on the first round of the suit instead of a later round.

2. The bidding indicates that North has the ace of clubs as part of his opening bid, while the lead indicates that North probably has a singleton diamond. If you attack trumps immediately, you run the danger that North will take the ace and put his partner on lead with a spade for the killing diamond return.

You should therefore take steps to prevent this from happening. The best way of trying to stop the ruff is to lead the ace of hearts at trick two and then continue with the queen. Assuming that South follows low, discard your spade on the queen.

North takes the heart with the king, but he can no longer do you in. He has no way of putting South on lead for the diamond return and the only other trick you lose is to the ace of clubs. What you do, in effect, is substitute a heart loser for a spade loser. But, in the course of the substitution, you remove North's fangs.

Car Plant Agreement Is Signed

SYDNEY, N.S. (CP)—An agreement allowing Canadian Motor Industries Ltd. to convert two buildings at the nearby Point Edward naval base into an automobile assembly plant was signed here by CMI officials and Industrial Estates Ltd.

CMI President N. Yano, Chairman J. C. MacKenzie of the Board of IEL and Robert W. M. Manguie, IEL general manager, jointly signed the agreement. IEL is a provincial industry-promotion agency.

The plant, to initially produce 1,000 cars—Isuzu Bellett sedans—is expected to be in operation by May when about 50 workers would be employed. Employment could swell to 100 in three years when production is expected to reach 3,500 units.

The agreement involves a 20-year lease on an 80-acre site, including rail, road and wharf access. The agreement also includes renewable options covering a further 60-year period.

Plans call for construction of a \$4,500,000 assembly plant within three years. The plant would be designed to produce 10,000 Isuzu and Toyota automobiles a year and could eventually employ 1,000 persons.

Mr. Yano told a news conference the company now is exploring the possibility of marketing Cape Breton-built Isuzu Belletts west as far as the Prairies and in the eastern United States.
