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New Navigation Course Opens At S'side Monday

No. 3 specialist navigation course will commence at R. C. A. F. station, Summerside on Monday, October 16th. This is the top navigation course in the Air Force. It lasts for six months and only one is held a year. It is given each year to eight R. C. A. F. officers and one officer from the United States Air Force.

The course is designed to qualify an officer for any navigational position in any air force in the world. This is the course that usually makes quite a bit of news due to the long distance flights taken as part of the training.

Last year the course visited the United States, Great Britain and spent some time in the far north. During these trips visits are made to instrument manufacturing, visiting, research centers and other establishments of interest to navigators.

The American officer taking the course this year is Captain R. K. Hassel, who comes from March Air Force Base, Riverside, California. The R. C. A. F. officers on the present stations are as follows: S-L. C. J. Watlie, Air Force headquarters, Ottawa; F-L. A. R. McAlpine, Greenwood, N. S.; F-L. D. O. Lawrence, Greenwood, N. S.; S-L. J. F. Corrigan, North West Air Command headquarters, Edmonton, Alta.; F-L. H. D. Thomas, Summerside; F-L. M. K. Dibble, Summerside; F-L. L. K. Clark, Summerside; F-O R. J. Flying Officer Clark (the last named) is a pilot and the first pilot ever to take the course here at Summerside.—S.

Canadians Advised To Submit Visas For Revalidation

MONTREAL, Oct. 12 — (CP) — Canada's holding United States visas tonight were "advised" by the American Consulate-General here to submit their visas to U. S. consular officers "for examination and revalidation."
The Consulate-General's press statement followed announcement in Washington earlier of a temporary, world-wide "freeze" on passport visas to aliens seeking to enter the United States.
"Failure on the part of any visa holder to secure revalidation prior to his travel to the United States may result in serious embarrassment and delay at ports of entry either along the United States-Canadian border or at airports and seaports in the United States," said the Montreal Consulate-General's statement.

age as one means of solving the surplus problem, but there was no indication how this could be accomplished to the satisfaction of both the Government and the grower.

It is possible, too, he said, that if potato-growing control were instituted, a potato scarcity might result in years of a poor harvest.

This year, Canada expects to produce more than 90,000,000 bushels of potatoes. Federal officials believe there is a steady, continuing market for about 75,000,000 bushels and that is what the crop should be.

Last year the United States market absorbed about 9,500,000 bushels of Canadian potatoes. This year's total is expected to decline. The heavier U.S. crop, which resulted in a reduction in the U.S. support price for American potatoes, caused a decline in the New York price. It dropped about one cent a pound, just about what the profit a Canadian shipper formerly could expect from his shipments to the U.S.

Says Dogma Would Raise New Obstacles To Christian Unity

YORK, England, Oct. 12 — (Reuters) — The Archbishop of York, Dr. Cyril Garbett, said today the Pope's intention to proclaim the bodily assumption of the Virgin Mary into heaven as a dogma of the Roman Catholic Church will raise a new obstacle to Christian unity.
In countries where Roman Catholicism is often the only alternative to atheism, educated men "on the threshold of the faith" might withdraw from it rather than accept a dogma which their reason rejected, he said in his presidential address to the convocation of York.
The Church of England can not accept a dogma which had neither scriptural, historical nor doctrinal foundation, he added.
"The claim that Christianity is an historical belief will be prejudiced if a pious belief, with no shred of history to support it, is treated as a fact of history in the same sense as the resurrection of Jesus Christ."
There was widespread respect for the life and wisdom of the present Pope, but there was nothing to justify the claim that was the holiest and wisest of men was infallible in his decisions as to the faith of the church, and had been given the right to make new dogmas which had no warrant in scripture.
The dogma proclaimed by a bad or foolish pope would be equally binding upon the faithful, Dr. Garbett said.
The Archbishop said the Church of England appealed to sound learning in support of its principles.
"Our church dislikes coercive methods in the defence of truth and trusts in the efficacy of free discussion and argument."

Maritime Board To Meet At Moncton

MONCTON, N. B., Oct. 12 — (CP) — Men prominent in business and governmental life of Canada have been invited to attend the annual meeting of the Maritime Board of Trade, to be held in Moncton November 8 and 9. It was announced today by Dr. C. H. Bakeny, president of the board. Agenda for consideration at this meeting has not yet been formulated, he added, although it is expected that many items of considerable interest to the Maritime Provinces will be studied. Over 100 will attend the sessions, it is expected.

Halifax Weekly Changes Hands

DARTMOUTH, N.S., Oct. 12 — (CP) — Edmund Morris, publisher of the weekly Dartmouth Patriot, announced tonight he has purchased the Citizen, only weekly remaining in Halifax.
The Citizen, established in 1919 was once edited by Premier Joseph Smallwood of Newfoundland and has devoted most of its editorial space to labor news.
Mr. Morris declined to disclose the price he paid for the newspaper. He said policy of the paper would be unchanged. No mechanical equipment was involved in the purchase.

Capt. Jeffrey Brock of the Royal Canadian Navy said that in addition to the Chonglin attack, two other Canadian destroyers on patrol had hit east coast points. He did not identify them. He added that the Reds appeared to be hurriedly digging in, expecting an assault from the sea.

S'side Poppy Committee Meets

The poppy committee of Summerside branch, Canadian Legion, held a meeting last evening under the chairmanship of Dr. H. E. Clark and the campaign to sell wreaths to business houses and organizations will commence on Monday. Dr. Clark pointed out to the committee that the need is great this year as the demands on the poppy fund are increasing. He made it clear that the poppy fund does not provide a regular source of assistance for wounded or destitute veterans but enables help to be given quickly in an emergency.

He said that while the poppy fund is a national appeal, money raised in Summerside is used to help local people and does not go in the national fund. Of the money raised 60 per cent remains entirely here and the balance goes to the wounded veterans that make the poppies and this is their only means of livelihood. He stressed, though, that the financial aspect is only one side of the poppy campaign and it is hoped that every citizen will wear a poppy on Remembrance Day as a mark of honor and remembrance to those who lost their lives in two world wars.

Farm Prices

OTTAWA, Oct. 12 — (CP) — The official index of farm prices dropped 10.4 points during August from this year's high of 262.0 in July to 251.6. The Bureau of Statistics reported today.

The decline was attributed for the most part to a reduction in the initial price of western wheat to \$1.40 a bushel for No. 1 northern from last year's \$1.75.

This decline in wheat prices, said the Bureau, together with a slight decline in potato prices more than offset advancing prices for livestock, poultry and eggs.

The index is based on 1935-39 prices equaling 100. In August 1949 it was 252.8.

Factory Wages

OTTAWA, Oct. 12 — (CP) — Hourly-paid workers in Canadian manufacturing averaged a record \$1.04 an hour at Aug. 1, the Dominion Bureau of Statistics reported today.

This was one-tenth of a cent above the average for a month earlier and was up from 99 cents a year previously. The average weekly wage was \$42.50.
