THE cargo of the steamer "Carroll," which sailed for Boston yesterday evening, consisted of 1,983 bags of potatoes, 549 cases of eggs, 189 cases of lobsters, 251 kerosene casks, and 80 bales of hay.

A HALF WITTED sailor named Wm. Nelson, apparently from the United States, was yesterday arrested for stealing a horse from Mr. Archibald Holmes, and another from Mr. P. Connolly. The horses were recovered, and Nelson was today sentenced to one month's imprisonment.

SIR LEONARD TILLEY was met at Moncton on the 31st by a large assembly headed by the band, and in response to repeated calls congratulated Moncton on its prosperity. Sir Leonard announced that he and Sir Charles Tupper would speak there at an early day. Rousing cheers were given for Sir Leonard and Sir Charles. Calls for cheers for Smith were received with derisive laughter.

THERE is very little sign of vegetation 20 miles north of Ottawa. In the woods the frost is still in the ground. In the fields the grass is only starting, and the settlers' cattle are looking hollow and half starved. In many of the back townships spring ploughing has only commenced, and seeding will not be over until the middle of June. It is the most backward season experienced since 1879.

It is said that H. R. H. the Princess Louise is being accompanied to Canada by Miss Harvey, lady-in-waiting; Lieut. Dowser, of the Coldstream Guards, who will remain here for some time; Hon. Mr. Bagot, cousin of Capt. Bagot, the present A.D.C., and Sir John C. McNeill, A.D.C., as quarry, who will remain for a fortnight. Major A. Collins will follow in a fortnight.

THE ICE.—The steamer "Valetta," which arrived at St. John's, Nfld., from Montreal, on the 31st ult., reports the St. Lawrence free from ice, but many large bergs in the Gulf. The steamers "Polino" and "Commodore" put into Sydney on Saturday, the former with bows badly damaged by coming in contact with an ice pack; the latter bound from Harbor Grace to Pictou, but failed to reach its destination, owing to ice floes. Three sailing vessels, "Ohan," "Vesta" and "Creola," are jammed fifteen miles from Sydney harbor.

SERIOUS LOSS.—We learn that a bailiff of the County Court, New Glasgow, who came to the city with the intention of celebrating Mr. Laird's declaration as an M. P., met with a serious loss. His pocket book, containing over forty executions, a number of writs and summonses, was, it is said, secured by the bailiff on the Jericho Road, and the County Court business of New Glasgow district, therefore, remains *status quo*. A reward of \$20 is offered for the recovery of the book. Debtors in New Glasgow are rejoicing.

UNABLE to meet successfully the facts and arguments adduced by THE EXAMINER, our Grit contemporary resorts to such paragrahs as the following, which we clip from the *Summerside Journal*:

"It is currently reported that Donald Ferguson, having resigned the editorship of the *Ch'town Examiner*, it has been assumed, since the 20th ult., by Mr. Louis Carvell. If true this will account for the manner and matter during the past ten days."

The fun of this is that Mr. Louis Carvell is not, and has not lately been, in the province. The editorship of THE EXAMINER is to the Grit brethren a great mystery.

A WORKMAN, formerly in the employ of Mr. Casson, foundryman in Longueuil, Que., sued his employer for \$9 balance of wages due him. The defendant thereupon entered an action for damages against the plaintiff for "boycotting" and intimidation, through which, after a strike, the foundry had to be closed. The Court held that the employee had acted illegally, and gave Mr. Casson a verdict of \$50 and costs, allowing the \$9 to be deducted therefrom. The Court said an employee has a right to leave off work and go elsewhere to better himself, but an attempt at "boycotting" or organized conspiracy with a view of hindering an employer from carrying on his business was illegal, and the law provided protection for all such cases.
