

# Youth Club Defeats Montague 11-3 At Arena

## Kane Leads With 3 Goals

The Basilea Youth Club strengthened their hold on first place in the Island Senior "B" Hockey League at the Sports Arena last night when they lambasted the Montague Primroses 11-3, with winger Jackie Kane showing the way with a 3-goal, 3-assist performance.

The youth clubbers hit for four markers in the first frame, added two more in the second and whipped in 5 more in the free-scoring third.

B.Y.C. goaltender John Gebhrke came within 10 minutes, scoring the first shutout in Island play but the hard-driving Montague centerman Billy Hughes broke Gebhrke's spell at 9:58 of the third.

Merrill Pineau notched a pair for the B.Y.C. and singles went to Wally Shepherd, Brian Lewis, Lloyd Shepherd, Stu MacLure, Mousie Weatherble and Charlie MacDonald.

Dave MacLeod and Dick Carroll scored the other Montague markers.

Referees Moe Goodwin and Brian MacCallum dished out 18 penalties, 12 of which went to the B.Y.C., including a 10-minute misconduct to Merrill Pineau early in the second period.

On three occasions during the first contest the Primroses played with a 2-man advantage and, even though on one of the occasions they were 2-men up for almost 2 minutes, they couldn't break through the stout defensive play of Frank Smith and Lloyd Shepherd.

Wally Shepherd got the ball rolling for the B.Y.C. at 4:16 of the first period on a play with linemate Jack Burke. Newcomer Stu MacLure made it 2-0 five minutes later on a pass from Brian Lewis and at 17:41 Lewis came out from behind the Montague cage just in time to slap in Wally Shepherd's pass. The Primroses were playing 2 men short when Lloyd Shepherd struck for the fourth B.Y.C. goal when he took a goalmouth pass from Jack Kane.

Kane hit for number three at 12:41 and Pineau rounded out the B.Y.C. scoring a minute later.

At 15:20 scrappy Dick Carroll deflected in Hughes' long shot to make the final score read 11-3.

One of the biggest crowds of the season were on hand to watch the contest, with the Primroses bringing their own special cheering section from that Kings County town to give them some vocal support.

#### Two Claimants For The B. E. Heavyweight Title

In the happy-go-lucky realm of wrestling we often see or hear of two claimants to a world, county, or what-have-you title. In fact it is generally felt through matting circles that a grant and groan boy just isn't another during his long career he has not laid claim to son as 7th among Canada's Heavyweight world title or possibly two.

It happens too in boxing that occasionally two pugils will stake out a claim on a title and run for a claim office to have their rights protected.

On Monday night in Toronto James J. Parker, with the blessing of the Canadian Boxing Federation, signed his claim to the British Empire championship on the dotted line after being awarded an unanimous decision over Johnny Arthur. Meanwhile across the Atlantic in London, England, the staid members of the British Boxing Board of Control are shaking their heads in wonderment at all of these confusing doings over here in the colonies and point out that as anybody can tell you Don Cockell has been and continues to be the Empire's heavyweight champ.

Cockell, known to many of the irreverent as the "British Blimp", became very well known to North American fans when he gallantly took an unmerciful beating at the rock-like hands of Al Weill's meal-ticket Rocky Marciano, the undisputed champion of the world. Since that June night in San Francisco however Cockell hasn't shown up too often in rings in England or anywhere else, for indeed he has found solace and contentment in tilling fertile English soil.

### NCAA Imposes Restrictions On Can. Players

LOS ANGELES (AP)—The National Collegiate Athletic Association council Monday imposed restrictions on Canadians playing hockey for American colleges.

The council ruled that, effective immediately, Canadian athletes transferring to American colleges will be required to complete one year in residence before being allowed to play on college hockey teams. At present Canadians figure prominently on many U.S. teams including the University of Michigan, St. Lawrence University and Rensselaer Polytechnic Institute.

The council also announced that signing of an option agreement with a professional hockey club by a player would destroy his amateur standing.

PITTSBURGH (CP)—Willie Marshall's goal with 65 seconds remaining in regulation time gave the defending American Hockey League champion Pittsburgh Hornets a 4-4 overtime tie Tuesday night with the league's all-stars.

The all-stars went out front on a first-period score by Providence's Zello Toppazzini and second-period tallies by Cleveland's Fred Glover and Hershey's Obie O'Brien after Joe Klukay had scored for Pittsburgh early in the game.

But the Hornets rallied with goals by Bob Hassard at 19:43 of the second frame and Klukay's second of the night at 2:47 of the final frame.

Ken Wharram of Buffalo once more put the all-stars ahead but Marshall's goal sent the game into overtime.
