Will Leave For Germany

MONTREAL (CP)—Ursula Schmidt, 27-year-old German divorcee accused of spying by United States authorities in Frankfurt, will leave for Germany before the end of the week, her lawyer, Harry Blank, said Monday.

Mr. Blank said the pretty German girl, ordered deported by Canadian immigration authorities, plans to demand a trial as soon as possible after reaching Frankfurt.

Miss Schmidt waived her right to appeal a deportation order because she feared the stigma of the U. S. charges would remain. She now is free on bail posted to assure her return to Germany.

Miss Schmidt, who worked as a clerk-typist for two years at a U.S. air base in Germany, said she never had access to secret information she is accused of handing over to the Communists.

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No Improvement In Condition Of Accident Victim

HALIFAX (CP) — The Victoria General hospital neurosurgical division reported Monday there has been "no improvement" in the condition of accident victim Helen Irving of Truro.

Miss Irving suffered severe head injuries a week ago when the car she was riding in collided with another on the Truro-New Glasgow highway. She was speeded to hospital here after preliminary treatment at Colchester County hospital at Truro.

A Victoria General spokesman said the 19-year-old blonde "spoke several times Sunday and she recognized her parents but she is still in a semi-comatose condition." The spokesman said this was normal for cases of Miss Irving's kind and it often was "several weeks" before they took a definite turn one way or the other.

Miss Irving was a passenger in an automobile driven by Cecil Perrin, also of Truro. Perrin was treated at Colchester County hospital for knee injuries.

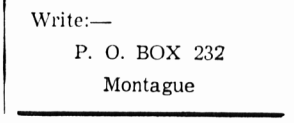

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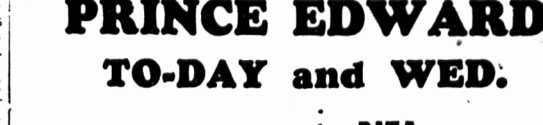
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
