Missionary is Guest Speaker

Rev. Elinor Leard, Missionary of furlough from Central India, was guest speaker at the September meeting of Alberton United Church W.M.S. Auxiliary. In reviewing the general situation in India Mrs. Leard compared the difficulties facing missionaries today with those faced by the pioneers eighty years ago. Opposition today is more subtle, she said, but just as real. In a most interesting and informative address, Mrs. Leard

made reference to the need for education to begin in the villages rather than to be centred in towns and cities, to India's new system of basic education, to state hospitals, and the influence these changes are likely to have on Christian missions. She also spoke of the union of Christian Churches in North India and of the rural life movement. As she held the close attention of twenty-five members of the auxiliary and invited guests, Mrs. Leard left impressions that this period of transition in India, this period of development of the United Church of North India, is indeed a time of challenge, of

responsibility and of privilege for Christian workers there, whether they be missionaries or native leaders. The meeting was held at the parsonage with Mrs. J.M. Sproule as hostess. The president, Mrs. A.C. Green conducted the meeting and worship was led by Mrs. Gordon Hardy, assisted by Mrs. Fred Leard. A donation of \$1,000 to the Prince County Hospital was authorized last evening by the membership of the Summerside branch of the Canadian Legion at their regular monthly meeting with the president, Dr. Hubert MacNeill presiding. This donation equals a similar one made by the Summerside Legion to the hospital last year a part of an undertaking in which the branch will endeavour to pay \$10,500.00 to the hospital over a ten-year period as a memorial to the 103 veterans from this area who died while on active service with the Canadian armed forces during the two world wars and the Korean conflict.

Yellowknife A Real Surprise To Visiting Mining Delegates

By FORBES RHUDE Canadian Press Business Editor YELLOWKNIFE, N.W.T. (CP) Yellowknife is a real surprise to anyone who comes upon it out of the vast wilderness of the Mackenzie district of the Northwest Territories.

It was certainly a surprise to touring delegates of the Commonwealth Mining and Metallurgical Congress including every Canadian who had not been here before.

They expected a rugged mining community but found one of the best laid out and ordered communities one could find anywhere, with wide paved streets and nearly every building neat and gleaming with newness, and virtually every city facility.

C. B. Anderson, South African delegate, said at a dinner given to the visitors Sunday night, he first saw the Northwest Territories 23 years ago and "if anyone had told me then that today there would be a modern community of 3,000 people sitting on this site I could not have believed him."

Though the present site of Yellowknife is only a dozen years removed from the bush there is also an old town which sprang up on a nearby rocky island from a tent city which came into

being with various mineral discoveries in 1946. This older site was found unsuitable for the provision of services and so the new site was decided upon. A large number of people still live in the old town. Yellowknife is more than a mining centre. It is a port on the north shore of Great Slave Lake. Mines and communication are its great concern. By air it is served by Canadian Pacific Airways from Edmonton.

By water in the summer navigation season it is on the long water route which extends from Waterways, Alta. to the Arctic Ocean.

By highway a winter road connects it with Hay River on the south side of Great Slave Lake and thus with the Mackenzie Highway which connects it with Edmonton via the Peace River area. Construction now is underway to provide permanent all-year highway communication over this route.

By water in the summer navigation season it is on the long water route which extends from Waterways, Alta. to the Arctic Ocean.
