DAIRY PRODUCE.

The latest Montreal advices state that cheese exhibits no change business ruling quiet; being in fact at a standstill as buyers and sellers are apart. Nominally the range may be given at 7 1/2c to 8c.

The question of fodder cheese was considered at a meeting of the Butter and Cheese Association held a few days ago, and after some strong speeches urging that producers would be extremely foolish to make any this spring the following resolution was unanimously adopted:

Whereas the price of finest cheese today is lower than it has been at this period of the year for the past twenty seasons, the market being in a most stagnant state, the supply exceeding the demand; therefore it would appear that there is an over-production of this article, and

Whereas it is a fact that the consumption of cheese, does not relatively increase with the gain in population in the same ratio as butter, and

Whereas the butter market today in Canada, the United States, England and other countries is in a most healthy position, at relatively much higher prices than cheese, and

Whereas, the make of fodder cheese is at all times very hurtful, tending to depress the market, its inferior quality restricting the consumption thus demising the chances of the fine qualities of full grass cheese, which is made in large quantities,—

Therefore, be it resolved, in view of these facts that in the wisdom and opinion of this association no hay or fodder cheese should be made this spring, and that farmers should consider well the advisability of increasing the make of butter and limiting the production of cheese, during the ensuing and following seasons.

The butter market is steady to firm with trading in finest creamery at 19 1/2c to 20c, and held goods at 19c. The latter seems to be pretty well cleaned up for it is becoming increasingly difficult to fill an order for it even at extreme prices. Dairy stock is steady at 17c in tubs and 16c in rolls.

THE PROVISION MARKET.

A fair local trade of a jobbing character is reported in provisions and prices show no change. The Montreal Gazette quotes as follows:—Canadian pork, \$16 50 to \$17 per barrel; pure Canadian lard, in pairs at 8c to 8 1/2c; and compound refined at 5 1/2c to 5 3/4c per lb.; hams 11 1/2c to 12 1/2c; bacon, 12c to 12 1/2c per lb.

The Chicago provision market is rather weak and the recent advances in prices were pretty nearly all lost. Pork declined 17 1/2c to 20c, closing \$10.42 1/2 March, \$10.47 1/2 May; \$10.52 1/2 July. Lard closed 7 1/2c to 10c lower, at \$5 15 March; \$5 20 May; \$5 27 1/2 July. Short ribs closed at \$5 15 March; \$5 15 May; \$5 22 1/2 July.

In the Liverpool provision market, lard and short cut light bacon advanced 6d. Pork closed 5 1/2s 3d, lard 2 1/2s 6d; boneless long cut, heavy bacon 29s 6d; long cut, heavy bacon, 29s 6d; long cut light, 29s; short cut, light, 29s; and tallow, 20s.

Cash quotations on provisions closed at Chicago:—Mess pork, \$10.45 to \$10.50; lard, \$5.15 to \$5.17; short ribs, sides, \$5; to \$5.40; dry salted shoulders, 4 1/2c to 5c; short clear sides, \$5.35 to \$5.55.

BOUY SERVICE AT GRAND RIVER.

Sir,—As the opening of navigation is near at hand, I wish through the columns of your paper to draw the attention of the Agent of Marine in Charlottetown to the deplorable condition, during the past year, of the buoy service at Grand River, P. E. Island. If I mistake not, the matter was ventilated to a certain extent in the columns of this paper last fall. Instead, however, of making the needed improvements suggested by "Mariner," the contractor allowed the service to become if that were possible, even less efficient than before.

The specifications for the buoy service for the Grand River call for a can buoy outside the bar at entrance to river; now, I ask any one possessing common sense, if a beer cask to which an upper story consisting of a few slabs, has been attached—a can buoy? During the fall of the last year in which the former contractor had charge of the service, the can buoy went adrift. On notifying the Agent of Marine he was in formed that he could replace it with a rum puncheon for the remainder of the season, it being certainly understood that a new and proper can buoy would in the following spring replace the one lost. Yet the beer cask still guards the entrance to the harbor. The specification also calls for two black spar buoys, one on each side of the bar, yet our contractor disregarding his instructions paints one red and the other black.

Chain moorings must also be used, I would like very much to know if he used them in all cases. I would also like to know if all spar buoys put out were a vertical height of six feet from water line. The contractor must provide and keep on hand not only all buoys above specified but also spare buoys with moorings complete one ten of each kind included in the contract. Now sir will the contractor over his own name truthfully tell us in what manner he fulfilled this part of his contract? As one interested to some extent in the shipping which frequents this port I sincerely hope that during the present season the service will be in a more satisfactory condition, NAVIGATOR.
