

LOCAL AND OTHER ITEMS.

FLUENT LIGHTS.—The town of Bear River, N. S., is to be lighted by electricity.

NEW ORANGE LODGE.—A ladies Orange Lodge was organized at Ottawa on Friday night, with a membership of thirteen.

PEAK OF THE SEASON.—Strawberry blossoms, picked in the garden of Mr. H. W. Vanasse, Fitzroy street, this morning have been placed on THE EXAMINER'S editorial table.

FIRE.—The residence of Mr. Donald Carr, at Freeland, Lot 11, was destroyed by fire one day last week. Most of the household furniture was saved. The fire is attributed to a defective flue. The house was insured for \$500.

FOR THE WEST INDIES.—The Summerside Pioneer says: Mr. Wood Avaril sent away for Halifax on Friday last seven horses which are said to be destined for the West Indies, to be used as draft horses for the British soldiers there. On Thursday morning Messrs. Deacon & Drummond sent away 200 fine lambs for Boston.

BEARS IN NOVA SCOTIA.—The Parrishboro Leader says: The bear crop appears to be unusually large this season. David Bentley and John Hughes, of Diligent River, have already harvested six in dead falls and two more were secured in the same way at New Prospect last Saturday by Frank Fulton and James McAleese.

CASE AGAIN.—If the person who was endeavoring to steal the silk handkerchiefs from the show window of Stanley Bros' store last evening will call at that establishment he may obtain the portion of the large handkerchief which he could not get through the small hole in the window. The Messrs Stanley would like very well to see him.

POTATOES CHEAP.—All the storekeepers and merchants warehouses at Indiantown are filled with potatoes. It is the time to lay in a winter's stock. They are being sold at Indiantown at from 80 cents to \$1.25 per bushel, and probably in a few days will be still lower in price. The river boats bring down from 500 to 600 barrels a day.—St. John Telegraph.

FORSE DEAD.—Mrs. James Mulholland, 55 years of age, was found dead in bed at her residence, Brunswick street, St. John, on Friday evening. Mrs. Mulholland lived alone. She was in poor circumstances, but her wants were attended to by kind neighbors. She had not been seen since Wednesday, and it is supposed she died on that night.

AT CAPE TORMENTINE.—Messrs. Rhodes, Curry & Co., of Amherst, have been awarded the contract to build the ice boat and life boat house at Cape Tormentine. The structure is to be 30 feet square, two stories, and will be erected near the new pier at that point. In the future passengers to the island by the ice boats will be saved the two mile drive to Cape Jourdain to take the boats but will be as highly appreciated by the large audience that will assemble at the Opera House tomorrow night as it was by those who were privileged to be present at the rehearsal on Saturday evening.

HOME FROM THE UNITED STATES.—Parkside the trotting stallion owned by Mr. W. A. Brennan of the Summerside Journal, and his driver and trainer, Mr. James Houghton, arrived home on Friday evening last. Shortly after their landing from the steamer a complimentary address was read to Mr. Brennan, and a handsome rug presented by the citizens was placed upon Parkside by Mr. Richard H. Brennan. The proceedings closed with hearty cheers for Mr. Houghton and Parkside.

DEERS REHEARSAL.—A golly number of ladies and gentlemen were present at the full dress rehearsal of "A Russian Homestead" in the Masonic Temple Opera House on Saturday evening. The play is a capital one. It is put on in good form, and the ladies and gentlemen presenting it are well up in their respective parts. RAILWAY ACCIDENT.—A peculiar accident occurred a few days ago at Rayville, Ohio, to a well-known passenger train on the Cincinnati, Hamilton and Dayton railroad. The train was an express under full speed, making 50 miles an hour, suddenly and without warning the boiler of the engine exploded with a loud report and was torn to pieces. Although the engine was blown to pieces and parts of it scattered about one hundred feet away, both engineer and fireman escaped with only a few cuts and bruises. The passengers escaped with only a bad frightening and a severe shaking up.

THE WORLD'S FAIR.—The World's Fair management has requested the Chicago park commissioners to extend the time for the removal of the buildings and structures erected by the Exposition and the State and foreign committees within Jackson Park and the Midway Pleasure to one year from the day originally fixed, and that the exposition be permitted to retain possession of the park and grounds until May 1, 1894. After this all buildings at the Fair will be open to the public from 8 a. m. to 4 p. m. only, and the grounds will be closed each night at 9 o'clock.

BACK FROM THE FAIR.—Hon. J. W. Richards and Hon. John Yeo, of Prince Edward Island, were at the Royal yesterday on their return from the World's Fair. These gentlemen expressed themselves as being greatly pleased with what they saw and did at the fair. They were greatly impressed with the educational influence of the fair and the magnificent scale on which everything was done, and speak in high terms of the treatment they had received at the hands of the Chicagoans whom they met. The hon. gentlemen leave by the early train this morning for their homes in P. E. I.—St. John Telegraph.

ENORMOUS FIRE LOSSES.—The Chicago Evening Post says: "Fire losses in the United States during the first nine months of 1893 were \$26,841,000 greater than the corresponding period of 1892. Not less than a dozen strong companies are preparing to go out of business between now and the first of January. Low rates, heavy losses and enormous State taxation are driving capital into safer and more profitable fields of employment. The active companies have paid out over \$9,000,000 from their aggregate surplus funds thus far this year, and the January statement will show an enormous shrinkage in the securities held by the companies. Since January 1 thirty-five of the weaker companies have gone to the wall."

POLICE COURT.—This morning John Ring, charged with vagrancy, was sentenced to four months imprisonment with hard labour; Andrew McQuillan, for being drunk and disorderly, was fined \$4 or 20 days; and James Beagar, for being drunk and incapable, was fined \$3 or 14 days.

JUMPED TO HIS DEATH.—A Fall River, Mass., on Thursday night lost a young man named Michael Sullivan, while suffering from delirium tremens, jumped from a third story window. In falling he was caught by the throat in a gutter line, 40 feet from the ground and dangled in the air until he choked to death. He leaves a widow and five children.

MATCH RACE.—The match race between Balston and Harry C., took place on the Souris Driving Park on Saturday. Five heats were trotted. Advice from Souris state that Harry C. captured the first heat in 2:37 and the third in 2:29. Balston won the second heat in 2:29, the fourth in 2:32, and the fifth in 2:37.
