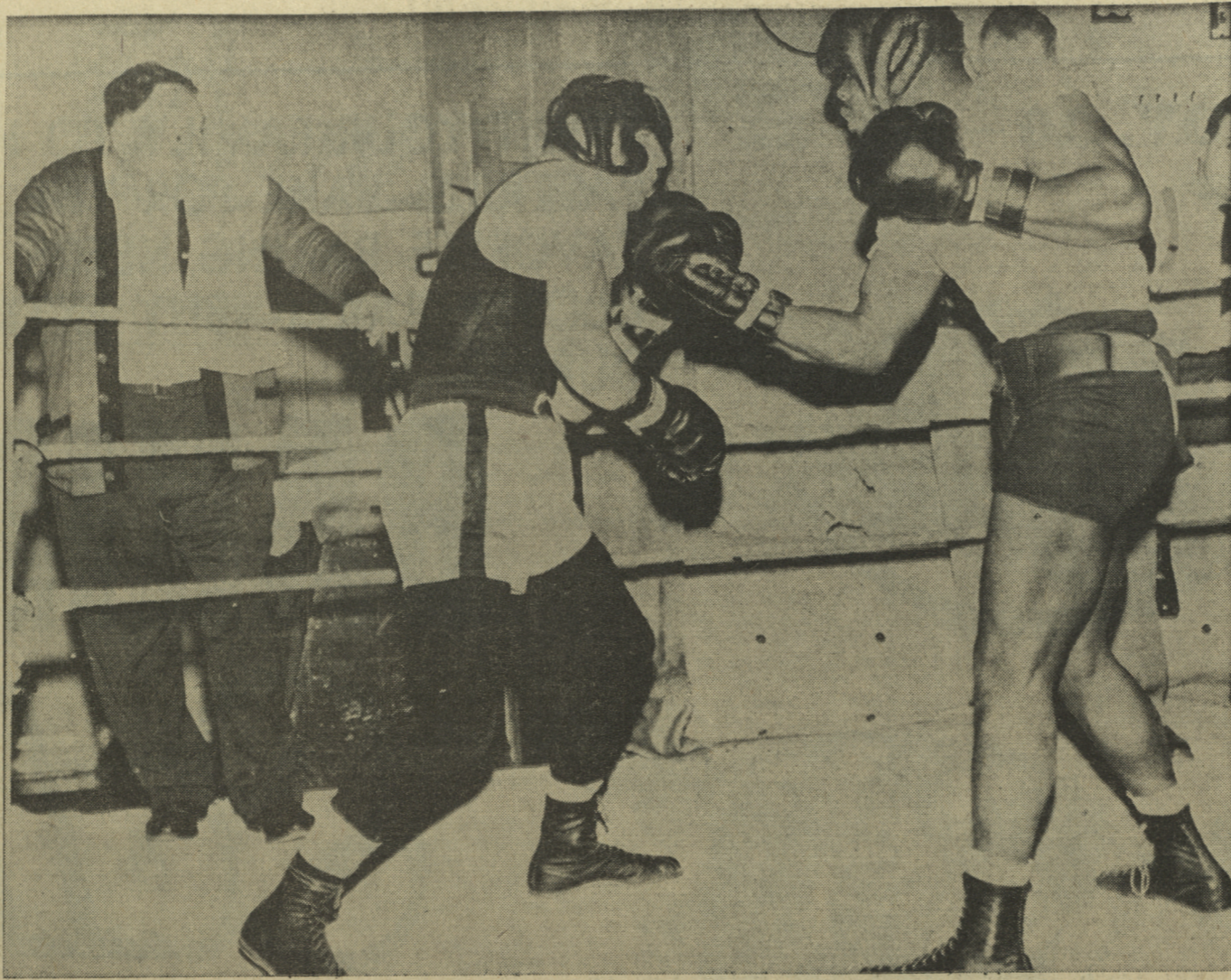
Packers Are Still Looking For Win

THE MINOR HOCKEY league program of any community is just about the most important anyone can think about. We are not talking from a spectator's point of view but from the point of view of the participants who will be the senior players of tomorrow.

These youngsters are far more important than any other group of players you can mention and if you forget about their activities you are forgetting to build up hockey players for future years.

HERE ON Prince Edward Island the youngsters are pretty well looked after through the Physical Fitness division and some other good friends. Included among the friends is the Maritime Amateur Hockey Association who, for the past several years, make an annual grant to the Physical Fitness. It is not nearly as much as the M.A.H.A. would like to give but it is the best they can do with their finances so limited.

WE AGREE that it's much nicer to give than to receive but there comes a time when you just can't give unless you do receive. After all the M.A.H.A. is nothing more than the hockey clubs in the Maritimes banded together under one head.

ON PRINCE EDWARD ISLAND we have no organized league in operation as yet. Each day the possibility of an Island League seems more remote. There are enough players to form two Charlottetown teams and these two along with Summerside and St. Dunstan's could operate as an Island League. One Charlottetown team is willing to take in Summerside but word is that there are not enough other capital city players who are agreeable to go along in a league with the boys from Prince County.

ATTEMPTS ARE being made to bring junior hockey back on Prince Edward Island. We are wholeheartedly behind such a move. However, that in no way interferes with the operation of a senior or intermediate loop. Indeed a strong junior club, strengthened by a few senior or intermediate players might well hold its own in any league formed here.

RIGHT NOW we are about the only spot in the Maritimes that hasn't come up with some sort of a league. We are just about the only people that haven't promised the Maritime Amateur Hockey Association support in the minor hockey program. Nobody can make us do what we don't want to do. However, we are convinced there are still enough folks around these parts that feel we can operate a league. And the operation of such a league, under the jurisdiction of the M.A.H.A., would mean we here on Prince Edward Island are doing our bit to see the young hockey players get the opportunities they deserve.

BILL REID has scheduled his tenth annual hockey school for here December 1 to 3. Once again Bill has been able to attract big names for the three-day session. This of course is nothing new. This year heading the parade will be National Hockey League president, Clarence Campbell and his top referee, Red Storey. Red will act as chief instructor and Mr. Campbell will deliver the opening address on Monday evening.

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DEAN PRENTICE SCORES 4

Rangers Whip Leafs 7-4; Black Hawks Nip Bruins

NEW YORK (AP)—Dean Prentice scored four goals, including the game-winner at 6:11 of the third period, and Andy Bathgate took over the National Hockey League's individual scoring lead with a goal and four assists Wednesday night as New York Rangers defeated Toronto Maple Leafs 7-4.

The victory was the fifth in a row for the Rangers—their longest winning streak in 17 years. Prentice, who went into the game with only four goals for the season, broke a 4-4 deadlock. He took Bathgate's neat feed and blistered the puck past Johnny Bower, who had a rough time in the Toronto nets.

Bathgate and little Camille Henry scored later in the third period. POINT TOTAL 25 Bathgate assisted on each of Prentice's goals. Andy increased his point total to 25, breaking a tie with Chicago's Eddie Litzenberger who had 20 going into Wednesday night's game with Boston Bruins.

Prentice scored twice within the first three minutes of the opening period. But before the session was over, Frank Mahovlich, Bob Pulford and Dick Duff tallied for Toronto and Ed Shack for New York to make it 3-3. Prentice scored his third goal early in the middle period. But the Leafs deadlocked matters eight minutes later on Billy Harris' marker.

The Hawks moved into a third-place tie with Boston and the idle Detroit Red Wings. Murphy scored his third goal of the season after taking a pass from linemate Eric Nesterenko. After the Bruins' Leo Labine evened the score in the second frame, Murphy rifled a shot past Bruin goalie Don Simmons from a scramble.

Bobby Hull scored for Chicago again a minute later. In the third period, referee Ed Powers sent Chicago defenceman Jack Evans to the penalty box for hooking and the Bruins narrowed the margin on Larry Regan's goal.
