Alberta General Election Called For August 5

Social Credit Party Will Seek Fifth Term

EDMONTON, June 29—(CP)—Alberta will vote in a general election Tuesday, Aug. 5. The Social Credit Party, which first swept to power 17 years ago under William Aberhart's leadership, will seek its fifth consecutive term of office.

Premier Ernest C. Manning, 43-year-old successor of the party founder who died in 1943, announced the election date Saturday. Nomination day is July 22. It will be the fourth provincial election this year. Saskatchewan voted June 11 and British Columbia the next day. Quebec will have a general election July 16.

Surprise Announcement
The election announcement was coupled with the surprise disclosure of the impending retirement from public life of Mines Minister Nathan E. Tanner, who has administered Alberta's oil resources since the first big strike at Leduc in 1947 transformed the fortunes of the province.

Mr. Tanner, 54, member of the Legislature for Cardston since 1935 and Minister of Mines for 15 months, will retire July 15.

Cites Increasing Cost of Ottawa Experimental Farm

OTTAWA, June 29—(Special)—Concern over the increasing cost to the Canadian taxpayer of the Experimental Farm at Ottawa was voiced in the Commons on Agriculture Department estimates here by W. Chester S. McLaure, Progressive Conservative member for Queens.

The Central Experimental Farm costs had been mounting on a scale of a quarter of a million dollars a year, Mr. McLaure said. At the same time, it appeared that very little revenue was derived from the Central Experimental Farm. Agriculture Minister Gardiner admitted that the revenue from the farm at Ottawa was low.

Police Investigating Suspected Attempt At Sabotaging 'Ran-a-tan'

At Miminegash Run late Friday night the mooring lines of the Ran-A-Tan, a large launch equipped for harvesting Irish moss, were cut in what was believed to be a deliberate attempt to sabotage the vessel.

Mr. Leonard Vatcher, a second man whose name could not be learned, who was sleeping aboard awoke just as the boat was drifting

out the harbour entrance. They managed to get the engines started in time to prevent the boat from drifting into the breakers at the entrance of the Run where they would have grounded with possible damage.
It is understood an investigation is underway by the R. C. M. P. in cooperation with the Fisheries Department.

N. B. Minister, Wife And Daughter Killed En Route To Wedding

KENT JUNCTION, N. B., June 29—(CP)—A railway crossing crash Saturday night claimed the lives of a United Church student minister, his wife and four-year-old daughter at this village 45 miles north of Moncton.

Dead are: A. Herbert Pond, formerly of Random Island, Nfld., his wife, and their daughter, Norma, 4. The Ponds had left the church manse in their car to drive to a wedding. The car was struck by a Moncton-bound freight train. The car was carried about 100 feet along the tracks and totally wrecked.

Mrs. Pond and the child died instantly. Mr. Pond was taken by ambulance to hospital at Rexton. He died shortly after being admitted.
Frantic efforts to prevent the tragedy were described by Mrs. Edward Leet, who was on her way to the Pond home to act as a babysitter in their absence.
"I saw the freight train coming and waved my arms at Mr. Pond to warn him to stop," she said. "Then the train passed between me and the car and I heard the crash."
Dr. L. McL. Atkinson, county coroner, ordered an inquest.
In other week-end fatalities, Mrs. Edith Chisholm, 78, St. John's, N.S., died of a heart attack. (Continued on page 5 col. 5)

Blonde From Finland Selected Miss Universe

LONG BEACH, Calif., June 29—(AP)—A golden blonde from Finland, 18-year-old Armi Helena Kuusela, captured the Miss Universe crown today, defeating lovely competitors from 29 other lands.

Blue eyes flashing and teeth sparkling, the poised daughter of a Finnish sausage manufacturer outshined the best of East and West in a hectic four-hour contest that wound up early today.

She was to be officially crowned with the one-time royal Russian nuptial tiara at a coronation ball tonight.
The winner is one of Finland's official guests for the Olympic Games next month. She plans to fly to Helsinki this week.
Her home is Muhos, Finland, north of the Arctic Circle.

Miss Hawaii, Elsa Kananiopua Edman, 19, of Honolulu, was placed second by the board of 10 judges.
Miss Greece, Daisy Mavraki, 18, of Crete, was third; Miss Hong Kong, Judy Dan, 21, fourth; Miss Germany, Renate Hoy, 21, Munich, fifth.

The Misses Hawaii, Greece and Hong Kong are brunettes. Miss Germany is an ash blonde.
Canada's entry was Ruth Carrier, 21, a brunette, 117-pound, Toronto model who won the title of Miss Toronto of 1951. She did not place.
Miss Finland, the "most beautiful girl in the world" is five feet five inches and weighs 110 pounds. Her bust-waist-hips measurements are 34-23-34 inches. Her baby-pink complexion made her a standout in the international competition.
She has studied English for five years and had planned to enter the University of Helsinki this fall. Now that probably will be changed.

The Miss Universe award includes a seven-year motion picture contract, a \$3,000 car, and a \$25,000 wrist watch.
All runners-up and Miss United States, Jackie Loughery, 21, of Brooklyn, also will receive movie contracts.
Others in the semi-finals were Mexico's Olga Lorenz-Castillo, South Africa's Catherine Higgins, Sweden's Anne Marie Tistler, and Uruguay's Gladys Rubio.

Acheson Given Warm Welcome At Vienna

VIENNA, Austria, June 29—(AP)—State Secretary Dean Acheson of the United States arrived here today amid ringing cheers of thousands of Austrians under Soviet occupation. He came from another Russian-ruled city—Berlin—where he also got a hearty welcome during a 24-hour visit.

His trips to Vienna and Berlin were intended to demonstrate to the two beleaguered cities that the West is determined to keep them free.
As Acheson rode through the Russian zone by train from Tullin air base 20 miles to Vienna, Austrians ignored Soviet soldiers and sailors along the route and cheered him loudly.
Communist threats to stage big protest demonstrations failed to materialize and no incidents were reported by the Red in Germany also ignored his visit—apparently on Russian orders.

Charge Slave Labor Follows The Red Flag
UNITED NATIONS, N. Y., June 29—(AP)—The United States has turned over to the United Nations a three-foot-high stack of documents it says provide shocking evidence Russia is spreading her slave labor system under the Red flag.

The U. S. was the first government to present such evidence to the United Nations special committee on forced labor. The committee winds up its second session of closed hearings with a preliminary appraisal Tuesday of testimony from refugee groups and international labor unions.
More than 18,000 statements from Polish soldiers who were Russian prisoners of war are included in the documents.
In addition, the U. S. produced several thousand more statements gathered by International Public Opinion Research, Inc., a New York group. Its investigators talked with returned German and Japanese prisoners of war who described how the Russians were over-working and starving their own people in concentration work camps up to 1950.

Moscow Reports Near Record Heat Wave
LONDON, June 29—(AP)—It's hot in Moscow, too.
Radio Moscow said Saturday the Soviet capital simmered in a record maximum temperature of 91.4 degrees.
It was the highest temperature ever recorded in Moscow on June 28 and only 3.6 degrees below the all-time high of 95 on June 21, 1901.

Independent Commission Move Rejected

OTTAWA, June 29—(CP)—The Commons voted 88 to 37 Saturday against a Progressive Conservative request for an independent commission to handle reallocation of seats in the Commons.
The proposal, calling for establishment of a commission to handle work now done by a parliamentary committee, was supported by Progressive Conservative and C. C. F. members along with J. L. Gibson (Ind — Comox-Alberni). Liberal and Social Credit members voted against the motion.

George Drew, Progressive Conservative leader, said in sponsoring the motion that only an impartial commission could take politics out of a reassignment of federal electoral constituencies.

He spoke before the Commons gave second reading — approval in principle — to a bill increasing membership in the Commons to 265 from 262. The bill stems from the 1951 census.

The bill was referred to the committee on redistribution. The committee, at a brief session, appended to the bill a schedule outlining the boundaries of the 265 constituencies. The schedule contained boundary changes approved at previous meetings of the committee.

The legislation then was reported back to the Commons. Debate on the proposed changes is expected to start Monday. Once approved, the changes in constituencies will become effective with the next Federal election.

Session Delayed
It had been expected that the session would adjourn Saturday. However, some members believe it now will take at least two more days to complete the work. The redistribution legislation and the estimates of several departments still must be passed.
The day brought these other developments:

Airliner Escapes In Mid-Air Collision
DALLAS, Tex., June 29—(AP)—A big airliner and a small plane collided in the air Saturday at Dallas Love Field. The airliner landed safely with its 55 passengers but the small aircraft crashed, killing its two occupants. The American airlines plane suffered a small dent to one of its four propellers.

Would Nationalize Liquor Industry
TORONTO, June 29—(CP)—The executive of the Board of Evangelism and Social Service of the United Church of Canada said in a statement Saturday it believes the Federal Government should nationalize the liquor industry.
The executive has asked Prime Minister St. Laurent and Justice Minister Garson to have the beer, wine and liquor industries of Canada surveyed by the combines investigation authorities to ascertain if a monopoly or nonopolis are being established.

Author Is Charged With Passport Fraud
OTTAWA, June 29—(CP)—A Canadian writer linked with Communism was arrested Saturday for passport fraud after a long investigation by the R. C. M. P.'s anti-subversive branch.
Raymond Arthur Davies of Montreal, author of several books and contributor to magazines, was picked up Saturday at Whitby, Ont., and taken to Ottawa to face trial on a charge of making an "untrue or misleading statement" to get a Canadian passport.
The 44-year-old writer, born Rudolf Shohan of Polish parentage in Montreal, has been associated with the Communist Party for 15 years or more. He is a former leader in the Young Communist League, the youth arm of the party, and later he was an executive in the Labor-Progressive Party, Communism's current political organization in Canada.
In a news story from Montreal Friday, the "Toronto Telegram" without identifying Davies by name—said:
"Police information tends to substantiate the suspicion that the suspect provided a link with world-wide activities of the Communist Party."
"The man is definitely suspected of having maintained close relations with two children.

Death Yesterday Of Prominent S'side Man

The death occurred at his home in Summerside on Sunday morning at seven o'clock of Maynard Freeman Schurman, President of M. F. Schurman Co., Ltd., in his 90th year. Death came peacefully after an illness of two weeks, and brought to a close a life of one of the most prominent men of our time, a life of great achievement devoted not only to the advancement of the company which bears his name, but dedicated to all matters concerning the betterment of the community in which he lived.

It was well and truly said of him by his life long friend, Dr. John MacNeill, "He interested himself in all things that were for the betterment of his friends, his neighbors, and the community at large."

A son of the late Mr. and Mrs. Robert Schurman (nee Lydia Gouldrup) he was born on May 24th, 1863, at Preetown. Here he received his early education and lived until 1888. In that year he was asked to become manager of the Kensington branch of the Schurman, Clark and Company, wood workers and builders.

It is noteworthy that Mr. Schurman had always been interested in lumber. He liked the clean, pungent smell of wood and therefore the offer to go to Kensington had some attractions but instead of going to Kensington he went to Leadville, Colorado where he (Continued on page 13 col. 2)

Rev. G. E. Moffat Appointed To St. Peter's Cathedral

It was announced yesterday that the Rt. Rev. Bishop R. H. Waterman, Lord Bishop of the Diocese of Nova Scotia, has appointed the Rev. Gerald E. Moffat to succeed Rev. Canon E. M. Malone, D.D., as incumbent of St. Peter's Cathedral.

The Rev. Mr. Moffat, at present incumbent of St. Paul's Church, Lorne Park, Toronto, is a graduate of Rothesay Collegiate, Bishop's University, and the Faculty of Divinity of Trinity College, University of Toronto, and holds Master of Arts and Bachelor of Divinity degrees. He was for a time a lecturer for many years at Bishop's College.

The Rev. Mr. Moffat will assume his duties as incumbent of St. Peter's in late September, when Canon Malone, who is resigning after thirty one years incumbency will go to Halifax to lecture for a year at King's College.
