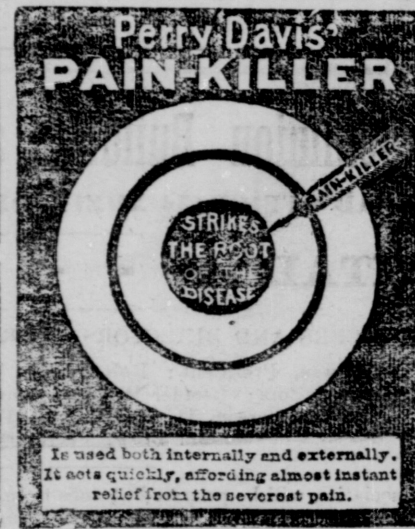

A Reasonable Judgment.

(The Empire.)

The majority report recognizes that the head of the department is officially, though not personally, responsible in the eye of the public for the operations of his subordinates, and distinct records the opinion that the confidence of Sir Hector in his officials "accomplished results which are greatly to be regretted as regards the administration of the department." That is exactly the view the public will take, that while there is no evidence to show the Minister knew frauds were being perpetrated, yet being Minister and official head of the department it is most unfortunate that his reliance on others should have been so complete and unquestioning as to have resulted in contractors being able to successfully plunder the treasury.

And surely it is permissible to pronounce this judgment with regret; surely no one but a hide-bound partisan will think it unreasonable that in recording the misplaced confidence of Sir Hector Langevin and the disastrous consequences it brought upon the administration of the department, public opinion should assume a tone of great regret that a career spent largely in the public service, crowded with many able services, and endorsed on more occasions than one with the thanks and approval of his fellow-citizens, should have been so marred at its close. The people of Canada do not want any man vindictively pursued by the hatred of partisan prejudice, and when Parliament is asked to say that the action of Sir Hector in his official relations produced "regrettable results regarding the administration of the department" it is being called upon to do all that the evidence in this case warrants and all that even-handed justice demands.

Justice Has Been Done.

(The Empire.)

That the majority and minority reports of the Privileges and Elections Committee substantially agree in condemning the frauds against the Public Works Department, in naming the offenders as brought out in evidence, in acquitting the Minister of personally receiving money, and only differ when they come to the responsibility of Sir Hector for the conspiracy amongst contractors to rob the treasury, is a matter for general congratulation. It shows that justice has been done. Both parties agree, in the main, upon that, the only divergence being where the Opposition refuse to be bound by the evidence before them and insist upon bringing in a supplementary verdict against Sir Hector upon vague inference and partisan suspicion.

The general wish is, as we understand it, that Sir Hector Langevin should be judged according to the evidence adduced, and no fair tribunal in existence could bring in any other verdict than one founded on the testimony before it.

News Notes.

Navigation on the Tweed is dangerous on account of floating trees and wreckage. Immense quantities of corn are floating down river.

Two of the 100-ton engines for the Chignecto Ship Railway have been built. The remaining two will not be ready for service till spring.

While in Vancouver, the other day, it was intimated by President VanHorne that hereafter the three Canada Pacific Company's steamers, Empress of India, Empress of Japan, and Empress of China, would run from Vancouver to San Francisco and return each trip. He said this is done in order to meet the aggressive measures and competition of San Francisco boats.

Organs friendly to the British Government are denying that any large Irish emigration scheme is intended in connection with Hon. Horace Plunkett's visit to Canada. Mr. Plunkett is a member of the congested districts board organized under Mr. Balfour's land purchase act, and is merely taking advantage of his visit to see what the prospects are for persons from the congested districts of Ireland whom the board may desire to assist to emigrate.

PROGIE TO THE FRONT.—A white Chester sow belonging to Thomas D. Durling, of Waterville, Kings, N. S., recently gave birth to 17 pigs, of which 14 are living. The sow is three years old and has had 71 pigs, of which 50 were raised, realizing \$114.

Items of Interest.

The Vatican contains 208 staircases and 1100 different rooms.

The Pacific Ocean was discovered by Vasco Nunez de Balboa on September 29, 1513.

The product of gold in the United States the last sixteen years has aggregated the enormous sum of \$572,900,000.

The manufacture of false teeth for horses is a new industry just opened in Paris with a capital of 2,000,000 francs.

The gross revenue from tobacco in Great Britain last year was £9,717,784. There is no free trade in tobacco in England.

The highest inhabited place in the world is the Buddhist monastery, Haine, in Thibet, Asia, 16,000 feet above the sea.

One hundred years ago there were in the South 54,258 colored people to every 100,000 white people. To day there are but 41,478.

The smallest church in the world is at St. Lawrence, near Ventnor, Isle of Wight. It has a seating capacity of twelve persons.

Wednesday was the hottest September day ever known in Minnesota and the Dakotas. The thermometer registered 100° in the shade at many places.

In eight minutes a cyclone near Leon, Nicaragua, on September 9th, destroyed many houses, uprooted trees and injured many people.

A Pittsburg despatch says the threatened strike of window glass workers has been averted, and work will be generally resumed October 1st.

There are 1,930 foreign students at German universities. 333 of them are from Russia, 194 from Austria, 225 are Swiss, 117 English, and 436 Americans, mostly from the United States.

Humboldt calculated the mean level of North America to be 743 feet above the sea, and he found that in 4,500,000 years the whole of North America might be worn down to the sea level.

Sir Julian Pauncefote has notified the United States Government that the modus vivendi in regard to Behring sea seal fishing has been violated by the North American Commercial Company, who have killed more than the stipulated number.

Finley Clark, son of Gilbert Clark, of South Maryborough, slipped when stepping from a mow on Thursday, and his right leg slipped into the cylinder of a threshing machine. The leg was pulverized up to the groin. Amputation was resorted to, but the man died.

Yesterday a number of teams were engaged in transferring them to the New York pier warehouse.—St. John Telegraph.

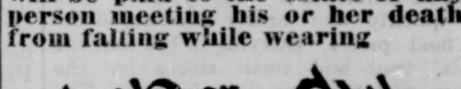
