THE PROB.—Strong winds and gales, north westerly to westerly, clearing and decidedly cold; continued decidedly cold Friday.

CITY SCHOOL BOARD.—Mr. John D. Reid has been appointed a member of the City School Board in the place of Mr. Archibald Kennedy, who has resigned. The appointment was made by the Provincial Government.

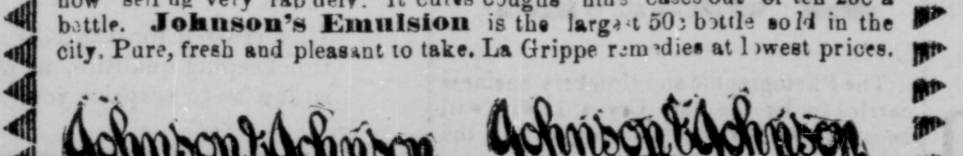
