CHICAGO (AP) - Chicago Black Hawks blasted the hapless Boston Bruins 8-0 in a free-wheeling National Hockey League game Sunday night.

By winning, the third-place Chicagoans remained three points behind Toronto in their race for the No. 2 spot in the Stanley Cup playoffs.

The Hawks opened their bombardment in the first period when Bill Hay and Ab McDonald slapped the puck behind Boston goalie Bruce Gamble, who was credited with 14 stops in the period.

The Chicago margin went to 4-0 in the second period when ex-Bruin Bronco Horvath and Murray Balfour scored.

Bobby Hull added to his league-leading goal total when he scored his 39th of the year to open up the third-period assault. The marker tied Hull's

own all-time Black Hawks goal record for a single season. Hull set the record of 39 two years ago when he led the loop scorers.

Rangers Battle Canadiens To 3-All Stalemate Sun.

NEW YORK (AP) - New York Rangers, getting good and often spectacular - goaltending from Gump Worsley, escaped from a swift, brutal National Hockey League game with a 3-3 tie with the leading Montreal Canadiens Sunday night.

The game kept 15,416 fans on the edge of their seats. Worsley was credited with 48 saves as the Canadiens twice blew leads, then put on a feverish last-period charge and came from behind.

The Canadiens, streaking toward their fifth straight regular season championship, now have lost only twice in their last 22 games. In the stretch they have won 17 and tied three.

Worsley, a stubby little veteran, didn't have a chance on the Canadiens' tying goal. Bobby Rousseau deflected Tom Johnson's slapshot from near the blue line at 16:11 of the final period, the puck caroming past the surprised goalie.

Richard Opens Scoring. Henri Richard gave the Canadiens a 1-0 lead in the middle of the opening period. But New York's Andy Bathgate matched it before the session was over.

Big Jean Beliveau gave Montreal a second lead with a picture play in the second period, but Dean Prentice tied it again. A freak goal by Al Langlois, which hopped crazily off a Montreal defenceman's stick, gave New York a 3-2 lead at 12:06 of the middle period.

From then on, Worsley was under almost constant bombardment by the swift, angry Habs. He turned back solo rushes by Billy Hicke and Bernie Geoffrion and made a remarkable stop on Richard before Rousseau managed the equalizer at 16:11 of the last period.

DETROIT (CP) - Toronto Maple Leafs ran up a 4-0 lead Sunday night and then coasted to an 8-2 victory over Detroit Red Wings to further dim Detroit's chances of making the Stanley Cup playoffs.

Charlottetown's Forbie Kennedy, who has having an outstanding season with Edmonton Flyers, was recalled by the Red Wings for the weekend games. Forbie previously played with the Wings and earlier with Chicago Black Hawks.

Toronto's line of Ed Litzenberger, Dave Keon and George Armstrong was the big unit with each player scoring a goal as the Leafs handed Detroit its third straight defeat. The Wings have yielded 20 goals in the three games.

The defeat, coupled with New York's tie with Montreal, dropped Detroit three points out of fourth place, the final playoff spot, and Detroit must play six of its next seven games on the road.

Armstrong and defenceman Tim Horton gave Toronto a 2-0 first period lead and Litzenberger and Bob Pulford clicked in the second period before Detroit was able to score on a power play.

In the final 20 minutes Worsley was called on for 16 saves while Jacques Plante, the Canadiens masked goalie, had to stop only three Rangers shots.

Plante was one of four players injured in the fast game. He was checked by Ken Schinkel after coming out of the nets late in the middle period and fell backwards, striking his head on the post. He was helped from the ice.

A 10-minute intermission was called and he returned to the nets when play was resumed. After taking a leading pass from Rousseau, he skated behind New York defenceman Pete Goggin and roared in alone. He faked the charging Worsley off his feet and flicked the puck into an open net.

Prentice's 19th goal, a short shot to the near side, came after a Bathgate assist, which gave the league's leading scorer 77 points.

Langlois' marker came on a slapshot which was partially deflected by Jean Gauthier and hopped into the net.

The victory left Montreal with a 6-1-5 edge over the Rangers for the season.
