Egypt Accepts Cease Fire On Condition

UNITED NATIONS, N.Y. (AP) — Egypt Friday night accepted the UN ceasefire resolution on condition attacking armies cease what Egypt called their "aggression against us."
UN Secretary-General Dag Hammarskjöld announced receipt of the following communication from the Egyptian delegate:
"The Egyptian government instructs me to inform your excellency it accepts the resolution adopted this morning, 2 November 1956, by the special extraordinary session of the General Assembly; on the condition of course that it could not implement the resolution in case the attacking armies continue their aggression."
The secretary-general has not announced any replies from Britain, France or Israel.

Canada Leads In Helicopter Use But Subsidies Needed

QUEBEC (CP)—Helicopters are getting up in the world, judging by conversation at the 22nd annual convention of the Air Industries and Transport Association here.

There now are seven helicopter companies in Canada, and they use the machines for everything from studying the love life of fish to patrolling oil pipe lines.

Mr. Agar, 54, of Vancouver, told in an interview about the growth of Okanagan Helicopters Limited, a \$2,000,000 outfit of which he is pioneer vice-president. Okanagan was founded in 1927, one year after the first commercially licensed helicopter in the world made its appearance.

OKANAGAN, which started with one helicopter on a fruit-tree spraying operation, now has 34 working in regions from British Columbia to Newfoundland.

In Newfoundland, Okanagan helicopters handle mercy missions and carry fisheries experts to remote places.

Helicopters also do mineral and other survey work.

Mr. Agar feels "bus service" helicopters are still some years away, especially in such low-density population countries as Canada. There is still no twin-engine helicopter on the market.

One reason is cost. "Egg-beaters" operated by Okanagan cost up to \$280,000 each. A machine of this kind can carry only 14 passengers, or a total cargo load of 4,000 pounds.

"It is more than likely that some subsidy will have to be given to initial helicopter operations in Canada the same as was done with airlines," says Mr. Agar.

He added that Canada "today probably has the highest number of helicopter pilots per capita of any country in the world."

Was In Mine For Friend Who Went Hunting

Editor's note: Murray Terris is a survivor of the Springhill mine explosion. He is married and has one small child. This is his story.

Written for The Canadian Press By MURRAY TERRIS SPRINGHILL, N.S. (CP) — I went in the pit about seven Thursday morning. Everything was all right through the day.

My buddy, Raymond Smith, wanted to go deer hunting. They asked for two of the three workers' trapped.

Ten minutes later Jack Fraser came in from the bottom and knocked us off (dismissed us). We started out to the main bottom from our 6,100-foot wall.

When we got there, everything was a blue smoke. Next thing we heard was men moaning. We grabbed some men—Eddie McCallum and Henry Macleod — and started back into the 5,700-foot level.

When we got in we went up to No. 1 head (a ventilating passage) and broke a way through an air stop. We came over to the 5,400-foot level and ran into Con Embree, a short firer.

He advised us to stay between the trap doors. Then we turned on the compressed air. From there we travelled back and forth to the back slope.

Water was rushing down the slope like a river. We figured the mine was on fire at that time. We went back to between the doors. Every two hours we came out to the slope. We were helping men off the slope. At that time there were 53 men there.

Later the gas started pushing in on us both ways. We took hose and cut 53 poutholes and hooked the hose to the compressed air. We plugged our noses with pieces of shirts and breathed in on our mouthpieces.

About 18 hours later we decided we had to find a way out. Six volunteers led by Charlie Burton started an overman started out for gas. I was behind him and tested for gas. I was behind him and tested for gas. I was behind him and tested for gas.

As we moved up we opened the air line and this let air come down on the men below. We rapped on the pipe five times for help.

Two hundred feet from the main bottom I faded away. Next thing I remember, I was in hospital.

Looking back I remember many of the boys saying prayers. On the way up we bumped into a lot of men and they seemed to be dead.

I figured if I was going to die I would die trying to make it home.
