Seventeen individual craftsmen will represent the five island Handicraft Groups: Ken-Isle Weavers from Kensington, Eastern Kings Art and Crafts from Louisbourg, Crafts from Tyne Valley, Acadia Handicraft Guild from Abraham's Village and the Esmont Bay Art and Craft from Esmont Bay.

The fair, which will be held from 10 a.m. to 9 p.m. Nov. 20 and from 9 a.m. to 6 p.m. Nov. 21, will include the following: weaving, printing - hasty notes and post cards - textile painting, copper enamelling, silver jewelry, wood turning, wood sculpture, aluminum etching and homestead crafts such as hooked rugs.

Joseph Hughes, 83, a long-time sportsman and barber, died in the Charlottetown Hospital Tuesday night after a lingering illness.

Mr. Hughes learned his barbering trade in the long ago shop of Joseph Gillis and Walter Arking and later worked in the shops of the Barber brothers, Jack and Tice. He opened his own shop on Queen Street, where the postoffice now stands, and was in business there for 43 years. When the block was moved to a new location on Grafton Street where he stayed until falling eyelid forced his retirement. He delighted in a recalling his early days barbering when it cost eight cents for a shave and 12 cents for a haircut.

He was keenly interested in all sports from harness racing to bowling, but the latter was his favorite and he bowled on championship teams with many of the great city bowlers of the past. One of the kindest and most friendly men in the city, his passing will be regretted by a large circle of friends he made over the years.

Surviving are his wife, the former Rose Kelly, and two children, Maurice and Gladys (Mrs. Vincent Pineda).

## Three Special Exhibits Open At Confederation Gallery

This week three special exhibitions are on view at the Confederation Art Gallery, the courtesy of the Winnipeg Art Gallery, Manitoba.

The artist represented are Oskar Laske and Gustav Klimt who were both regarded in their day as leading Viennese painters.

Oskar Laske was born in 1874 and died in 1951. As a painter, he was self-taught. Thus no technical skill or artistic routine appears in his work. Everything is based on first-hand experience. His watercolours are colourful and gay and they present a wonderful record of places visited all over Europe by a man who had also travelled in the Orient and northern Africa.

Gustav Klimt's exhibition is represented by delicate and beautiful figure drawings and portrait sketches. As a young man, he established a reputation as a mural painter. For some of the most important buildings of the era of Franz Joseph. At the time, his paintings caused such a scandal that even the minister of education had to resign. His drawings are regarded as perfect works of art. A most meaningful expression of the time and of the eternal was. He was born in 1882 and died in 1918 at the age of 36.

By contrast, the third exhibition from Winnipeg, consists of contemporary prints by Ken Esler who is a painter. Born in Pilot Mound in 1935 he was first a bank accountant and then became an artist-teacher. After his graduation from the school of art, University of Manitoba, he has been seen in numerous Canadian and American exhibitions, where he has won several prizes and awards.

The marker for the late president will be flanked by small tablets marking the graves of the two Kennedy children who died at or shortly after birth. The eternal flame will burn to the rear of the tablets emerging from a three pronged bronze foot.

The backdrop for the flame is to be a long, low wall bearing the presidential seal.

The plans for the grave site were announced at a press conference Monday, six days before the first anniversary of Kennedy's assassination 11 a.m. Nov. 22 in Dallas, Tex. Defence Secretary Robert S. McNamara and Architect John Carl Wanknecke were in charge of releasing the details.
