Britain, U.S. Seem Split Over NATO Nuclear Force

WASHINGTON (AP) — Britain and the United States appear to be split over how urgently to push for formation of an Allied nuclear force within NATO.

Britain evidently favors priority for negotiation with Russia on a treaty to prevent the spread of nuclear weapons. The U.S. wants to speed the NATO force project. Efforts to overcome this difference and at least agree on common tactics for dealing with these two problems were to be made Monday by State Secretary Dean Rusk and British Foreign Secretary Michael Stewart in a series of policy talks at the state department.

"We want NATO to be effective," Stewart said here Sunday. "But we don't want to occupy ourselves with NATO so exclusively that we ignore opportunities for political settlement with the Soviet Union and the countries of Eastern Europe."

He said in an interview on the CBS radio-television program Face the Nation that the Western Allies must maintain a careful balance between preserving their security and seeking agreements with the Soviet Union.

The British more recently proposed what they call an Allied Nuclear Force (ANF) which apparently would be a looser and more co-operative kind of organization than the MLF.

"We put forward the ANF," Stewart said, "because we thought it would be useful to NATO and that it would not constitute a proliferation of nuclear weapons."

At the same time, he said, the Soviet government has taken the position that any kind of NATO nuclear system including Germany would mean the pro-

Astronomer Drops Big Bombshell

LONDON (AP) — Professor Fred Hoyle, Britain's foremost astronomer, has dropped a scientific bombshell. He said he probably has been wrong for 20 years about the nature of the universe.

One of the most brilliant minds in modern astronomy, Hoyle has been the chief proponent of the steady-state theory of the universe. This theory holds that matter is being created continuously out of energy and the universe has always been much the same as it now is.

By his theory, the creation of new matter caused the universe to expand and the galaxies—the island universes of stars—to move away from each other.

Against this theory, many astronomers argued that the universe started with an explosion—the so-called "big bang" theory. By their account, this is the reason for the movement of the galaxies away from each other. But many an astronomer sided with Hoyle.

IN STATE OF FLUX
In an article in the scientific journal Nature, Hoyle did not go over to the "big bang" theory. He said he now believes the universe probably is in a state of flux, expanding for billions of years, then contracting to what amounts to a dense ball of matter, then expanding again.

Or it may be possible that only parts of the universe are pulsating, including our corner, while other parts remain unchanged, the Cambridge astronomer added.

His new ideas are based on recent observations, especially those of quasi stellar radio sources. These faint and undetected but huge "quasars" are on the edge of the visible universe.

He says recent observations point to the theory that the universe was much denser in the past than it now is. If that is the case, the steady-state theory is null.

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liferation of nuclear weapons into German hands. Everything he said on the point indicated that he favored stalling on the nuclear weapons project while sounding out Russia on what it would be willing to do on the treaty.

Dief Blamed For Raising Bogus Issues

OTTAWA (CP)—Finance Minister Gordon, Liberal campaign chairman, accused Conservative Leader Diefenbaker Tuesday of raising phony issues in the Nov. 8 election campaign. The latest example, he said, was Mr. Diefenbaker's demand to see correspondence between the justice department and Judge Bruce J. S. Macdonald when he was chairman of the Ontario police commission. The commission produced a report on organized crime.

Mr. Gordon told reporters at the Liberals' weekly campaign briefing Mr. Diefenbaker was "thrashing around" asking for something that was tabled in the Commons last year. At first, aides said Mr. Gordon was referring to correspondence tabled last Dec. 17 dealing with the deportation of Onofrio Minaudo, later killed in Sicily, and Giuseppe Catalonotte, two men with crime links.

However, an independent check later showed there were no letters from Judge Macdonald in the correspondence tabled Dec. 17, but two letters from the judge were in correspondence tabled March 30 this year.

LINK WITH MAFIA
Minaudo was reported to have connections with the Mafia—the international crime syndicate. Catalonotte had a record of convictions in the U.S. for narcotics possession and threatening extortion.

Mr. Diefenbaker has also asked to see a special justice department report on a Quebec bankruptcy racket. Prime Minister Pearson said there is no such report.

Mr. Gordon said Mr. Diefenbaker "will go on raising other bogeys, I suppose." He said that Mr. Diefenbaker had suggested there was something mysterious about files he had asked to see. Now he can see the Sefkind files and doesn't want to.

Mr. Gordon said the Liberal campaign thus far had gone about the way he wanted. "If I have been surprised at all, it was over the exaggerated statements of the leader of the opposition."

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Election Act Regulations Are Criticized

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But in a message to viewers Monday night, CHAT-TV said it could not be responsible for network broadcasts which might contain political news. These were to continue, the station said.

Tom Gunter, operations manager of Radio CHAT, said the move is a result of the broadcasting act.

Under the act, partisan political broadcasts are prohibited for 48 hours preceding federal, provincial or municipal elections and on election day. Civil elections will be held in Alberta Oct. 13.

"We know it is rather ridiculous, but there is nothing we can do about it," Mr. Gunter said.

In Red Deer, Gordon Stackman, manager of CKRD radio and television, said CKRD will carry neither local nor national programs with partisan political content.
